#### OKLAHOMA BOARD OF CORRECTIONS REGULAR MEETING MINUTES February 28, 2023

#### 1. Call to Order

Chairman Hastings Siegfried called the meeting of the Oklahoma Board of Corrections (BOC) to order at 1:08 p.m., on Tuesday, February 28, 2023, at Davis Correctional Facility, 6888 E133 Road, Holdenville, OK 74848.

The meeting was preceded by advance notice of the date, time, and place, filed with the Oklahoma Secretary of State on Tuesday, November 29, 2022. An announcement was also given at least twenty-four (24) hours in advance by posting notice of the date, time, place, and agenda of the meeting at 12:00 p.m., on Monday, February 27, 2023, at the principal office of the Oklahoma Department of Corrections (ODOC), located at 3400 North Martin Luther King Avenue in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73111.

3. Chairman's Update

Chairman Siegfried welcomed everyone to the BOC meeting and introduced new member Rhonda Bear. Chairman Siegfried reviewed P-010200 Part I. D.3 "Any vacancy occurring in the office of vice chair or secretary may be filled by the chair by appointment for the remaining term of office." Randy Chandler has been appointed as vice chair and Stephan Moore as secretary.

#### 4. Facility Warden Welcome

Warden Joe Norwood welcomed everyone and provided an overview of Davis Correctional Facility. CoreCivic and the Department of Corrections has had a partnership since 1996. Davis Correctional Facility has 1,304 inmates and has the capacity to house 1,624. This facility has maximum and medium security levels. They have recently given raises to their correctional officers, added temporary housing for new employees moving to the area and have been advertising through INDEED, billboards and social media to increase correctional officer recruitment. They are currently 82% staffed. A drone detection system has been implemented and has enhanced the ability to combat contraband entering the prison through drone drops. The facility has been updating their locking control systems. The medium security sections are complete and the work has transitioned to the maximum security sections.

#### 5. Director's Update

#### A. Leadership Reorganization

Director Harpe gave a brief overview of the DOC leadership reorganization.

#### B. Budget Hearing Update

Director Harpe gave a brief overview of the Senate and House Budget Hearing that occurred in January. The budget has remained flat for DOC and the hearing did not reflect any significant questions.

#### 6. Legislative Update

#### A. Spring FY23 DOC Legislative Session Initiatives

Legislative Liaison Shawna English provided an overview of the agency's current relevant bills and where they were in the process. A copy of the overview was included in the BOC packet for February 28, 2023.

#### 7. Critical Correctional Officer Staffing Monitor Dashboard

Special Operations Manager Tammy Hise discussed the creation of a real-time staffing dashboard that will show critical correctional officer staffing needs at all facilities. As the monitoring process becomes live at all facilities and there is viable data for reporting, additional information will be provided to the members.

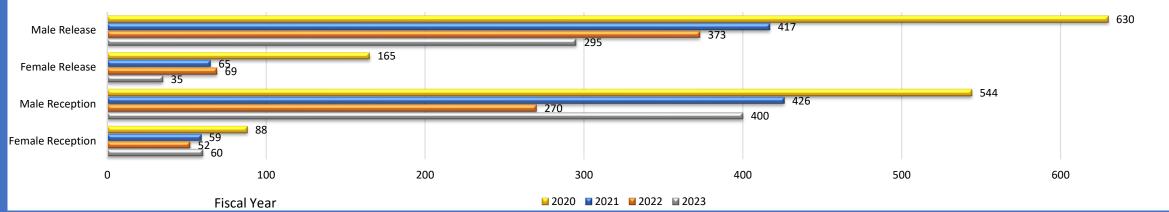

Title 57 Oklahoma Statute 57-571: Definitions

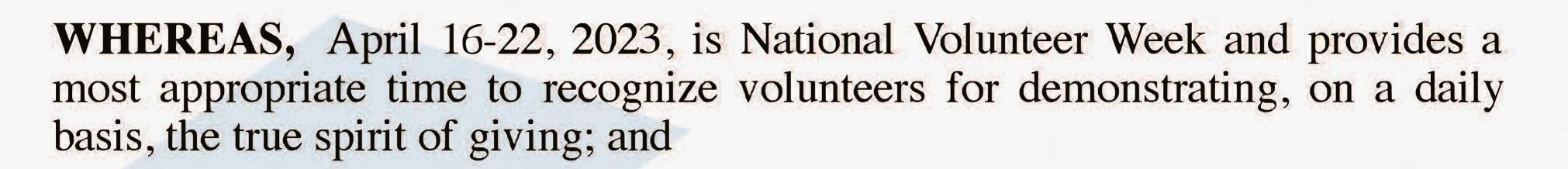
1. "Capacity" means the actual available bed space as certified by the Board of Corrections subject to applicable federal state laws and the rules and regulations promulgated under such laws;

January 2022 Oklahoma Department of Corrections Office of the Chief of Operations/Division of Institutions requested the closure Jess Dunn Correctional Center Unit D-West due to the unit's proximity to the rest of the facility. 169 minimum security inmates were dispersed throughout the Oklahoma Department of Corrections minimum security facilities. The closure of this unit led to a savings of \$10,302.24 daily for the Department of Corrections.

January 2023 Oklahoma Department of Corrections Office of the Chief of Operations/Division of Community Corrections requested the closure of Oklahoma City Community Correctional Center due to the lack of need for the beds. 262 community supervision level female beds were redistributed to Eddie Warrior Correctional Center and Mable Bassett Correctional Center. The closure of OKCCCC led to a savings of \$21,908.44 daily for the Department of Corrections.

Upon removal of these beds from Department of Corrections count the new total operating capacity for state facilities will be 18,738

# **PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT**

#### Unit Name Professional Development

#### Staffing

Currently, Professional Development has six employees. The Professional Development Unit consists of three divisions: Curriculum Design and Development, Leadership Development and the training division of Probation and Parole. Our unit is responsible for creating professional development for over 3500 employees.

### **Current Initiatives**

#### **ACTION MAPPING**

We're changing how we design training. The DOC has used the Instructional Theory into Practice model for over 20 years. That changed this month as we adopted a new design model, Action Mapping.

Most training focuses on what employees need to <u>KNOW</u>. The lesson may start with a video or a game, then a lecture including history and lots of other information, a practice section, and finally, knowledge is tested with a paper exam. Again, the focus is on what employees need to <u>KNOW</u>.

Action Mapping focuses on what employees need to <u>DO</u>. All training starts with a measurable goal. How much do we want to decrease or increase the goal? What ACTION will staff need to <u>DO</u> in order to accomplish the goal? For example, an Action Mapping course might start with this goal:

*Inmate suicide will decrease 10% by the end of 2023 as correctional staff properly assess an inmate's suicide risk during current precipitating events* (e.g.: receiving bad news from home, legal setbacks, etc.).

Action Mapping begins with changing correctional staff behavior first. What do COs need to <u>DO</u> to reach our goal of *decreasing inmate suicide by 10% by the end of the year*. Action Mapping is performance and goal driven.

#### THE 5 VOICES

*The 5 Voices* is a leadership tool based on the principle that everyone has a leadership voice, and we all have the ability to lead others.



*The 5 Voices* helps you do three distinctly powerful things: 1) discover your leadership voice, 2) communicate more effectively, and 3) increase performance.

The DOC has plans to certify Correctional Training Officers, including P&P Training Officers, Training Specialists and Training Supervisors in order to implement *The 5 Voices* throughout the organization.

#### THE 100X LEADER

Our Leadership Development division will, again, offer Command College. Command College is a 12-month leadership course designed for management level law enforcement officers and professional staff at ODOC. The focus of this Command College will be **The 100X Leader**.

The 100X Leader is all about becoming the leader that people actually <u>want</u> to follow. 100X leaders do everything they can to get to 100% health in their leadership. That's the 100. Once leaders reach and maintain 100%, the X is added which is all about multiplying others to help them be their best. In short: 100X is a formula for Leadership Success – transformation of the leader and multiplication to those you lead.

#### THE SCIENCE AND POWER OF HOPE

Over 2,000 published studies confirm **HOPE** is the leading indicator of success and wellbeing in children, adults, and families. Research indicates that HOPE can lead to significant improvements in job satisfaction, increased retention rates, and reduction of burnout. That's why the DOC is embracing the Sarah Stitt Hope Rising Oklahoma Initiative to bring the science of hope to DOC employees and all of those we serve.

Hope is the belief that the future will be better than today, and we each have the power to make it so. The DOC will use the Science of HOPE to build a HOPE-centered organization by developing, modeling, and serving others in a manner that nurtures HOPE.

#### **MICRO-CREDENTIALS**

Micro-credentials are industry-recognized, skill-specific certifications. Made up of one or more subjects from an accredited college or university, micro-credentials allow employees to remain competitive in the workforce with degree-level learning, without committing to a full degree.

Currently, we are exploring the micro-credentialling programs from five Oklahoma colleges and universities. For example, SWOSU offers two courses at no cost to the student or DOC. However, employees can earn college credit for these courses should they choose to pay college tuition. Seminole College offers five courses and will award 30 scholarships at half the price of tuition. The employee would pay the other half plus the cost of books. This would earn



the employee 15 hours of micro-credentials, and 15 hours towards an Associate's degree. We will meet with NWOSU, UCO, and North Oklahoma College later this week to discuss their proposals.

#### WARRIOR'S REST

We all know how rewarding and how difficult a career in Corrections can be. We see, first-hand, the long-term effects of chronic stress, trauma, critical incidents, and loss. Unfortunately, this can result in addition, suicide, and broken families.

Warrior's Rest is a nationally-recognized program that helps First Responders understand they are not alone. This is accomplished by using peer support/crisis intervention techniques. Warrior's Rest instructors will train peer support teams that go beyond crisis intervention training. These instructors will also mentor teams on how to perform various techniques to help our employees understand they are not alone and there is help during times of crisis.
