# What is ARPA and how does it impact Oklahoma?

In addition to funding households, small businesses, and schools, the **American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)** provides relief funds to state, local and tribal governments that have been negatively impacted by the coronavirus pandemic. These funds can be used by governments to:

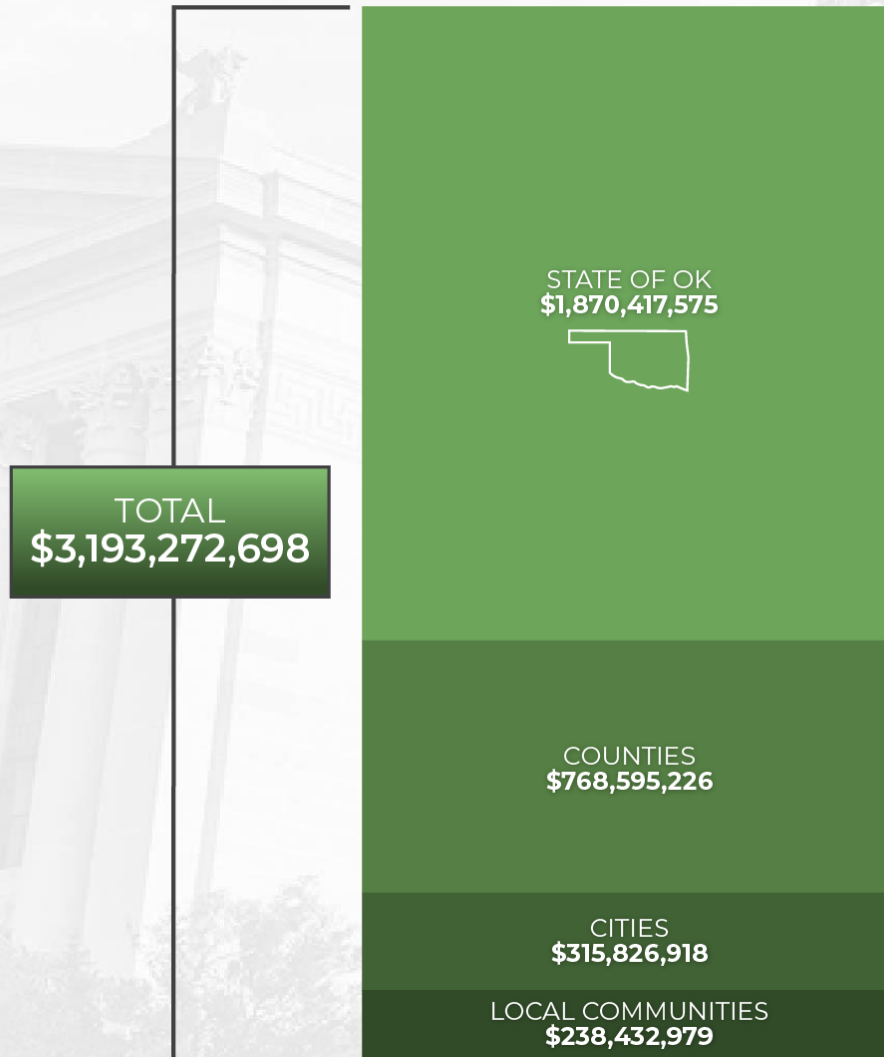
- Respond to the public health and economic emergency;
- Provide premium pay to essential workers;
- Replace revenue lost due to the pandemic; and
- Make necessary investments in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure.



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# How much ARPA funding is available to Oklahoma?



In total, State and Local governments in Oklahoma will receive **\$3.19 billion** in federal dollars. These funds will be distributed among **local communities, municipalities, counties and state projects.**

- Enhance capabilities of state services for the wellbeing of all citizens, especially the most vulnerable.
- Invest in physical and digital infrastructure to expand economic growth.

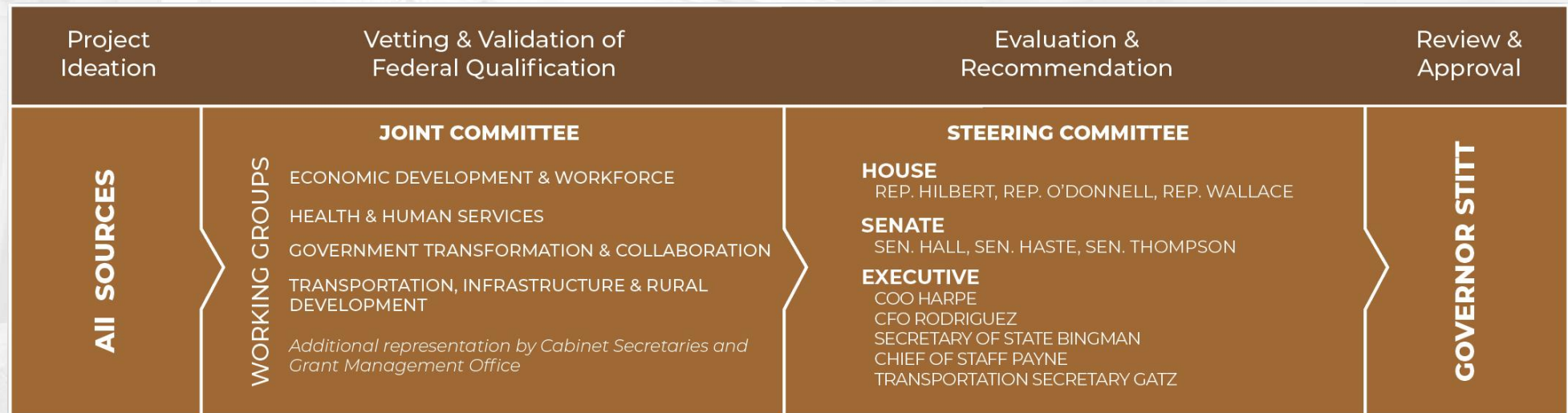


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# What is the process to decide the State of Oklahoma ARPA projects?

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# What is the timeline for utilizing ARPA funding?

ARPA funds must be allocated for specific projects by December 2024, with funds expended by December 2026. Reporting to the U.S. Treasury will occur quarterly, with performance reporting occurring annually. Reports will be made available online.
