Three Oklahomans received scholarships: Victoria Nwankwo, Oklahoma Central Region vice president, Francis Tuttle Technology Center, a \$1,000 HIMSS Foundation Scholarship; Arshad, \$1,000 David McNeese Memorial Scholarship; and Cheyenne Holman, Green Country Technology Center, \$1,000 National Healthcareer Association Scholarship.

Oklahoma HOSA advisers helped facilitate four of the 90-plus student competition events, including the newly introduced respiratory therapy and phlebotomy skills events.

In addition, all Oklahoma students who were recognized at the State Leadership Conference for receiving Barbara James Service awards and National Service Project Awards were also featured and received certificates and pins at ILC.
