I'm</p> <p>18 going to start to commission status reports. I need</p> <p>19 to change this, it says, "OEM Grant"; it's not OEM,</p> <p>20 it's Homeland Security.</p> <p>21 So if there's any updates,</p> <p>22 Mr. Mahoney, about the grants?</p> <p>23 MR. MAHONEY: Are you talking about the</p> <p>24 training?</p> <p>25 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Yes. Yeah, yes.</p>

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1 MR. MAHONEY: Yeah. Out of our 2025
 2 funding, we had \$139,996.17 that we spent on 1,452
 3 responders trained, that was tech refreshers. The
 4 ops refreshers was \$94,989.64 for 1,024 first
 5 responders trained.

6 At the awareness level, the
 7 academies, we had \$34,656.07 and we trained 698
 8 responders. The ops academies, we spent \$149,214.66
 9 training 521 responders. At the tech academies, we
 10 had \$67,408.80 and we trained 115 responders.

11 The flammable liquids and gas
 12 academies, we spent \$37,459.44 and we trained 188
 13 responders. CAMEO, we spent \$1,857.57 and we
 14 trained 10 responders. HAZWOPER refreshers, we
 15 spent \$1,628.87 and we trained 69 responders. Decon
 16 training, we spent \$392.10 for 24 responders.

17 And basically, all the curriculum
 18 development for Haz-Mat, we spent \$84,000 for
 19 training that, and the Haz-Mat annual conference, we
 20 spent \$100,000 in grant funding between HMEP and
 21 Homeland Security grant funds for that.

22 The next Haz-Mat conference will be
 23 March 11th through the 14th, and we should have --
 24 probably a little after January, we'll probably open
 25 up enrollment for that. And we've got -- we're

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1 still working through what instructors we're going
 2 to have and all that.

3 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Excellent. All right.
 4 Thank you.

5 Because I know we have some more
 6 about the Haz-Mat Conference under the agenda, so
 7 I'm sure we'll talk about that in a second. We have
 8 the DEQ report, and that will be given by Tommy.

9 MR. HOLBROOK: Yeah, so let's go through
 10 this real quick. So as of December 2, 2025, DEQ has
 11 received 44,134 Tier II reports. The total for the
 12 reports are broken down into different types of
 13 sites. So RMP Sites, we've got 239; EHS Sites,
 14 1,276; Non EHS sites, 3,192; Wind Turbines, we have
 15 5,345; and Oil & Gas, we have 3,482; for a total of
 16 44,134.

17 For Fiscal Year 25, DEQ received 69
 18 of the 77 MOAs from the counties, 54 of 77 payment
 19 applications were processed. For Fiscal Year 26,
 20 DEQ has received 51 of the 77 MOAs of this season,
 21 and payment application will be sent out in March
 22 after the data is distributed.

23 DEQ will host a Tier II training over
 24 Zoom on December 17th at 10:00 a.m. This will be
 25 the annual Tier II workshop and a recording will be

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1 posted online soon after.

2 DEQ will host the next statewide LEPC
 3 meeting on December 10th at 1:30 via Zoom. The
 4 agenda will cover Tier II reporting, CAMEO 101, and
 5 School Chemical Cleanup Program at DEQ.

6 With reports due on July 1st as of
 7 this update, the 2025 Toxics Release Inventory data
 8 has not been released by EPA.

9 DEQ staff attended the following
 10 events in 2025 since June. We had the NASTTPO
 11 Mid-Year Conference in Rogers, Arkansas; the
 12 Oklahoma Homeland Security Conference; one Oklahoma
 13 HAZMAT teams CAMEO update; and then eight CAMEO 101
 14 trainings were given and LEPC 101s.

15 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Awesome. Thank you,
 16 Tommy. Just some built-in clarifications on these,
 17 as well, too. For those that don't know, back on
 18 number 2, those MOAs are because in Oklahoma, we
 19 have a special built-in program with the Tier II
 20 chemical reports so a facility doesn't have to
 21 submit three times.

22 They submit it once with the DEQ, and
 23 then we have basically agreements with the LEPCs
 24 across the state, saying, "We'll take the Tier II
 25 data and then we promise to disburse that data down

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1 to you guys". So that's why the MOAs are there.

2 And then the payment apps are because
 3 once they're done, the county can submit that
 4 payment application and we will give them \$1,000
 5 piece of the overall Tier II collection fees to kind
 6 of help go towards funding the LEPCs in all the
 7 counties.

8 The December Tier II training over
 9 Zoom, it's scheduled for December 17th; that could
 10 change because we still haven't seen the Tier II
 11 software yet. Due to the federal shutdown, the
 12 coders of the software are a tad bit behind on
 13 everything. So, hopefully this software is released
 14 by that training date as well, too.

15 And then we started something new.
 16 Tommy mentioned the CAMEO 101s. These were just
 17 half-day classes that I did around the state where
 18 I'd pop in.

19 Like, for example, I did one up in
 20 Ponca City. I drove up to Ponca City that morning,
 21 started about 8:30, just kind of did a brief
 22 introduction on all aspects of the CAMEO software
 23 suite, and then by the time I left at lunchtime, we
 24 were doing kind of small-scale plume modeling and
 25 everything else.

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1 Included in those CAMEO trainings, we
 2 have done those -- we have done two out of the three
 3 shifts for OKC HAZMAT, as well, too, in those CAMEO
 4 refreshers, so -- all right. Any questions on the
 5 training updates or the DEQ data management reports
 6 from anyone?
 7 All right. Item C on 5, any other
 8 agency updates? I know this is -- you found out
 9 about this meeting 45 minutes ago, but if there's
 10 anything you want to -- OEM, you would like to bring
 11 to the group or the --
 12 MR. ENLOE: I'm Kevin Enloe, I'm the
 13 Preparedness and Response Director for OEM, hello.
 14 We're still trying to decide and the director have
 15 asked who is going to sit for her on this board.
 16 She apologies for not being able to be here today,
 17 she had other arrangements.
 18 But as far as reporting, we really
 19 have none other than most recently, we've had two
 20 EOC operation activations earlier this week for
 21 weather, and again tonight and tomorrow for weather,
 22 freezing weather conditions.
 23 Low impact for most, but those that
 24 were on the roads that didn't pay attention to the
 25 icy bridges, it was very impactful. And I know,

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1 sir, your division was very busy, so --
 2 MAJOR LAY: The phone rang early that day.
 3 MR. ENLOE: Yeah. So for the rest of the
 4 state and as far as water system impacts and those
 5 types of things, we see very little impact for
 6 tonight and tomorrow because the freezing
 7 temperatures are not going to be prolonged. So that
 8 would be my update.
 9 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Well, again, it's very
 10 nice to have OEM back at the table here for the
 11 Commission. For those that don't know, EPCRA is
 12 actually split between DEQ and OEM.
 13 Whereas the DEQ does all of the
 14 reporting for spills and Tier IIs and Tier Is and
 15 the LEPCs, OMES's supposed to be the stop point for
 16 anyone who has questions on how to do their
 17 emergency plans.
 18 So now that we have someone back on
 19 here, we can start, you know, sending more people
 20 for questions for facilities that, you know, are
 21 starting to do more emergency ops plans that don't
 22 know what to do, so it's great to have you guys
 23 around.
 24 Anything from you guys, Mr. Lay,
 25 Graves, and Mr. Weaver, anything -- any updates or

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1 are you guys just kind of catching your breath again
 2 from Monday and preparing for -- all right.
 3 Anything else?
 4 MR. GRAVES: No.
 5 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Perfect. All right.
 6 Part D, just discussion of any
 7 Spills/Responses/Trainings. I think we have -- you
 8 know, or at least briefly talk about it. We're
 9 going to make it an agenda item probably this summer
 10 about the ammonia spill in Weatherford a few weeks
 11 ago.
 12 I know many people in this room were
 13 involved in that, in the response for that, so I
 14 don't know if Loree has any updates or stories that
 15 she has or I know, Mike, with the HAZMAT teams, if
 16 there's anything you guys want to talk about the
 17 spill?
 18 MS. BOYANTON: I don't have too many
 19 updates. We have been getting calls, you know, for
 20 copies of the spill report and, you know, just
 21 making sure that we've got all the details at least
 22 from our end put into our -- we all call it our
 23 complaints system, but we also track our spills and
 24 response in that application, as well.
 25 So we have been getting some calls,

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1 maybe because of the attorney advertising on the
 2 news and stuff, but we haven't had anything -- we
 3 have not received any fish kills or any downstream
 4 impacts that we're aware of, so we've just being
 5 sort of monitoring and making sure that there's not
 6 any long-term effects.
 7 But other than that, or if anybody
 8 has any questions for me.
 9 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Thank you.
 10 MR. MAHONEY: The response, we had -- OEM
 11 called me and Kevin, we were in Florida at the time,
 12 so that was pretty interesting, but we worked
 13 through them and we contacted -- the Oklahoma City
 14 unit responded out there because, just so happens,
 15 where the other HAZMAT teams are, they really can't
 16 get there any quicker than Oklahoma City.
 17 Oklahoma City sent their HAZMAT Unit
 18 55 out there with four personnel. The 63rd CST, I
 19 called them and notified them, and they sent a team
 20 out. The Oklahoma City team got there about 20
 21 minutes before the CST.
 22 And Weatherford was doing a great
 23 job, they were already evacuating and using fog
 24 spray to try and put the ammonia down. They tried
 25 to stop the leak and were unsuccessful, and

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1 basically the 63rd hung around and done a lot of
 2 monitoring, so they were very helpful in trying to
 3 get businesses back open and making sure that that
 4 hotel -- they were still getting pretty high
 5 readings the next day, so they were monitoring that.
 6 They monitored the runoff and -- as far as pH level
 7 and all that. And I'm trying to think if there was
 8 anything else.
 9 But I don't know if we're going to
 10 have an after-action or not, I got to talk to them.
 11 Because with all the lawsuits and everything, I
 12 don't know who's willing to talk and who's not
 13 willing to talk now, so that kind of puts a damper
 14 on things.
 15 So we had an ORE, just so happened,
 16 the week before, and the individuals that actually
 17 responded had all met at our ORE and so they knew
 18 faces and everything, so it worked really well -- it
 19 just so happened it really worked well that they all
 20 knew each other. And that's always great to have
 21 that your people that are responding together can
 22 know that, but that's my update from that.
 23 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Awesome. Very nice.
 24 No, just a funny story to go along with that. Like
 25 we said, we've been doing these CAMEO 101s, and that

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1 next day after the spill, I was doing one for the
 2 shift at OKC HAZMAT.
 3 And so one of the first questions I
 4 asked, you know, the HAZMAT team was, "Are you guys
 5 familiar with the CAMEO software and have you guys
 6 ever used it before?", and they all kind of
 7 chuckled. And this one guy goes, "Yeah, I used it
 8 last night on the drive out to Weatherford", and so,
 9 I'm like, "All right, I'm going to call on you here
 10 in a little bit".
 11 And so at the very end, like I said,
 12 we do kind of mock scenarios, like for example, one
 13 of the scenarios is a tanker spill and, you know,
 14 instead of ammonia, it's hydrogen fluoride. But we
 15 got to that spill and I called on the guy and said,
 16 "All right, we're going to go through, step by step,
 17 everything you did last night and kind of show the
 18 rest of the guys", and I was like, "Walk through
 19 your processes".
 20 And so he was telling a story about
 21 how on the drive out there, he was doing multiple
 22 models between CAMEO and PEAC and comparing them
 23 all, and then he got out there and he was comparing
 24 his two with the one the 63rd had already done.
 25 And then he continued to tell the

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1 story that as he was on the wrench, trying to close
 2 the tanker, he realized the gap in the tank was much
 3 bigger, so he radioed over and said, "You need to
 4 fix my model". He's like, "I only guessed for a
 5 1-inch hole and this thing's, you know, closer to
 6 3 inches", and so they're updating the model as he's
 7 pulling on the wrench and it's freezing on him,
 8 so...
 9 But I thought it was a pretty
 10 interesting thing, and then the rest of the time,
 11 for the rest of the shifts, I kind of scrapped
 12 everything and we just kind of did an after-action
 13 on everything going on -- everything that happened
 14 with the spill, the different type of plumes.
 15 Because not only did they plume for
 16 the spill, they also did one for the IDLH and they
 17 also did one for the odor threshold -- you know,
 18 odor level so they could kind of tell people, "Hey,
 19 if someone calls within this plume, they could
 20 theoretically smell this, if they're calling outside
 21 the plume, maybe not", you know, so they kind of had
 22 their area of, you know, where they anticipated the
 23 smell of the odor to happen to.
 24 But no, again, you know, from
 25 everything we said it was -- you know, that I had

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1 heard about things they do about -- you know, a week
 2 or two before, everyone got together and so kind of
 3 knew everyone, and that's kind of, again, the
 4 purpose of all these trainings we do and the LEPCs,
 5 too, to get everyone's, you know, face familiar
 6 before that happens, so that was great.
 7 No, like I said, we'll probably do
 8 some more this summer once things kind of, you know,
 9 settle down for more after-action, but once again,
 10 we kind of needed to talk about it in this group
 11 right now.
 12 So with that, we'll move on to action
 13 item 6. We kind of mentioned it earlier, but
 14 anything else about the Oklahoma Haz-Mat Conference?
 15 MR. SMITH: Other than it's scheduled the
 16 11th through the 14th and we've got several other
 17 states that are reaching out and they're going to
 18 use some of their HMEP funding for their folks to
 19 come. We had many states coming in last year, we
 20 got more coming in this year, so --
 21 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Yeah, so at our fall
 22 NASTTPO meeting, I advertised that to the group and
 23 then as soon as we broke, I had four or five
 24 different states --
 25 MR. SMITH: You could tell.

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1 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: -- coming up and --

2 MR. MAHONEY: Yeah, you could definitely

3 tell.

4 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Yeah, and I gave them

5 all your name, don't worry, so --

6 MR. SMITH: Yeah, that's fine, I've got --

7 it's --

8 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Yes, so -- exactly.

9 Some folks, I think it was Tennessee, New Mexico,

10 and then a few others were --

11 MR. SMITH: Tennessee and New Mexico both

12 reached out and they plan on -- they do their HMEP a

13 little differently, and so they're going to be

14 allowing their teams that they help with HMEP

15 funding to comment.

16 So we're pretty excited about it,

17 it's getting bigger and bigger. And we're probably

18 going to outgrow, which is kind of neat, so --

19 that's about all we got.

20 Like Mike said, we should open up

21 registration right after the first of the year.

22 We've got -- I can't remember the guy's name that is

23 our --

24 MR. MAHONEY: Carpenter, I think is the

25 last name. Wasn't it Carpenter?

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1 MR. SMITH: No, it's not --

2 MR. MAHONEY: Brian -- anyway, he's a

3 Medal of --

4 MR. SMITH: Medal of Honor winner that's

5 going to be our keynote, so it ought to be pretty

6 fun and exciting, so we're looking forward to it.

7 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Very nice. Well, if

8 there's anything we can do here at DEQ or this

9 Commission for classes or anything else, you just

10 let us know, we'd be happy to go on the agendas for

11 you, so --

12 MR. SMITH: Awesome.

13 MR. MAHONEY: Did you enjoy the Radiation

14 101 class?

15 MS. BOYANTON: Oh, I'm sorry.

16 MR. MAHONEY: Did you enjoy the Radiation

17 101?

18 MS. BOYANTON: Yes, I did. I was telling

19 -- I went back and told -- because we have all the

20 field staff across the state, I went back and told

21 my leadership that we needed to -- that our staff

22 would love to have that training.

23 MR. SMITH: He's going to do it again at

24 Haz-Mat Conference, we decided that today at lunch,

25 so...

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1 MS. BOYANTON: It was very good, I enjoyed

2 it.

3 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Excellent. Well, thank

4 you, guys. Let's see, do we have questions about

5 the Oklahoma Haz-Mat?

6 All right. Next is something we

7 talked about this past June, but it's alive and well

8 right now, we talked about it earlier.

9 All right. So we talked about it

10 this past June, over here on the screen, about ways

11 to expedite getting the Tier II data from the state

12 level to the locals, considering we can't really use

13 email anymore because the files are too big.

14 So we created, with the help of our

15 IT staff here, this kind of password protected -- it

16 says, "LEPC Resources", but it's actually kind of

17 whoever first responder in the state wants it, we

18 can create access to them for this.

19 And this is kind of a state

20 depository of Tier II data right here. So it's all

21 broken down by county, it's posted in three

22 different formats; we could always do more. It's

23 posted for the Google Earth mapping file, there's

24 one for the MARPLOT aspect of CAMEO, as well as the

25 actual CAMEO data manager Tier II file. But again,

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1 we could post on here whatever styles and types of

2 county or someone needs for that data.

3 The nice thing about this, too, is

4 here in the middle column, there's a "Modified"

5 column right here, too, so you can filter this by

6 newest to oldest. So anytime this data gets

7 updated, it'll tell you the last time that data was

8 updated.

9 So you could theoretically come in

10 here and check this on the first of every month and

11 find out if there's a new file for your county,

12 download it and up upload it, or if you're, like,

13 some of the smaller ones that haven't had any

14 updates since March, then you know that you're good

15 to go on all these updates, as well, too.

16 We've been updating these as files

17 have been coming in about once a month, and then as

18 you can see after September, the files kind of just

19 die off, you know, for the year, so...

20 But this is open to all first

21 responders, and so we kind of have a list of -- it's

22 a nice list of emergency managers and LEPC contacts

23 as well as fire chiefs around the state have access

24 to this now, too, that they can come in and get this

25 data whenever they want, so -- which is nice.

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1 And then, again, we could post
 2 whatever we want here for the counties and it's a
 3 way to get that data to them faster than email and
 4 everything else, so --
 5 MR. SMITH: Is there a spot on the link
 6 that you can put in to get a username and password
 7 for it or do they need to reach out to you?
 8 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: So yeah, in order to get
 9 an account, just reach out to me and I can add you
 10 guys. It's going to be easier for state employees
 11 because you're already in the system, but I worked
 12 with the IT staff that the system now allows people
 13 outside of the state agencies to have access, too.
 14 So yeah, if you want access, just let
 15 me know and then I can kind of -- I can send you the
 16 sign-in --
 17 MR. SMITH: I also want to promote it,
 18 that's why I -- yeah, I want to promote this for
 19 you, so --
 20 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Oh, perfect, yeah.
 21 MR. GRAVES: Can I get access?
 22 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Absolutely.
 23 And that I found out, too, the one
 24 last thing is there were some counties that reached
 25 out that said, "Hey, you know, I'm" -- like, for

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1 example, we'll just use in here. "I'm up in Edmond,
 2 so I need Oklahoma County data, but also I reach out
 3 into Logan County", you know, and so they have
 4 access to that Logan County data that backs right up
 5 to their line, too. So people can download multiple
 6 counties, as well, too, if their jurisdiction backs
 7 up to another county.
 8 MR. GRAVES: Well, that would be good,
 9 because we have a Region 8 trailer, so we'd --
 10 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Exactly.
 11 MR. GRAVES: -- probably get that whole
 12 region, area right there.
 13 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Oh, you can do whatever
 14 you want. Like, when I did this for Oklahoma City,
 15 again, they went through and they got the entire
 16 surrounding county that's now plugged into the
 17 system. They have access to I think, you know,
 18 5,500 to 6,000 reports that they can play with now,
 19 so they went in and just got the entire region,
 20 so...
 21 But yeah, no, anytime. And then so
 22 this data will be static here until the Tier II
 23 season that starts in January and then you'll start
 24 seeing updates after March. So we'll probably --
 25 we'll try to get one up as soon as we can once the

1 deadline reaches in March, and then Tommy and I will
 2 quickly do some QA/QC of the data and try to have
 3 everything up by spring break, and then as stuff
 4 trickles in after the audit, we'll start updating
 5 these every month for then, too, so...
 6 But no, this is out here, it's being
 7 supported by our agency, as well, but if anyone
 8 emails me, then I can create an account for them,
 9 too, and you'll be good to go. So I'll start
 10 working on that for you guys once we leave here
 11 today, so -- cool.
 12 Any questions on the LEPC/First
 13 Responder Tier II portal?
 14 All right. Next we'll go through
 15 some proposed dates for 2026 meetings. We've got
 16 Wednesday, June 3rd and then Wednesday,
 17 December 9th.
 18 The December meeting got pushed back
 19 a week just because we're trying to figure out --
 20 it's a struggle since this is the first week back
 21 after Thanksgiving and kind of scrambling, so it's
 22 been pushed back a week to December 9th.
 23 But with that, any discussion on
 24 proposed dates for 2026? Hearing none, I'll make a
 25 motion to approve the 2026 Commission dates. Do I

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1 hear --
 2 MR. GRAVES: Second.
 3 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Yeah, I got a second. I
 4 mean is there a motion?
 5 MS. FIELDS: I thought you motioned it.
 6 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Oh, I'm sorry, yeah,
 7 okay, and then we had a second over here then.
 8 So all in favor?
 9 ALL: Aye.
 10 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: Opposed? All right.
 11 Those are our dates for 2026.
 12 New business. I do have something on
 13 new business that I remembered as soon as I posted
 14 the agenda. So again, I think we talked about this
 15 past June - I gave you samples, too - there's this
 16 handy flyer right here now that we have put together
 17 that we can disburse to the LEPCs and anyone else
 18 who wants it.
 19 We borrowed this idea from our
 20 friends up in Wisconsin, it's a quick reference
 21 guide. So -- and there's places for LEPCs to come
 22 in and they can amend this to their local contact
 23 information, as well.
 24 But it kind of, you know, gives them
 25 and whoever passes this out a basic rundown of what


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1 are the responsibilities of the LEPC, who needs to
 2 be at the LEPC meetings, how much we recommend an
 3 LEPC should meet.
 4 And then also on the front, too, is
 5 some -- the jurisdictional - I'm sorry, not
 6 jurisdictional - the statutes that kind of lay out
 7 everything for the LEPCs, as well, but we send this
 8 out to everyone that they can amend.
 9 I had a few that quickly updated this
 10 and sent it back to me and I said, "That's great,
 11 send it out to your members and your community, as
 12 well, too", so -- but we have these now available to
 13 all the counties to use as a template to update, as
 14 well, and that was a pretty good, successful summer
 15 project, as well.
 16 So I gave everyone a copy of that and
 17 then I'll send it out to the LEPC contacts at the
 18 meeting next week, so...
 19 So, yeah, with that, any other new
 20 business from anyone else? All right. Hearing
 21 none.
 22 Anything from the public or the
 23 guests? All right. Hearing none, then I will make
 24 a motion to adjourn the meeting and we'll meet back
 25 here on June 3, 2026. Do I hear a second?

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1 MR. MAHONEY: Second.
 2 CHAIRMAN WORMUS: All right. With that,
 3 see you guys in June.
