Although facility administrators agree that there are probably always LGBTI residents in the facility, they say that no residents currently at the facility desire to identify in these categories. Additionally, residents explain that they are so pleased to finally get to a program where they can be employed, they focus narrowly on their vocational goals and try not think about identities and relationships they will have once discharged. Additionally, they do not share much sensitive personal information because they do not want anyone to misunderstand them out of ignorance, or be distracted by them. Some residents also speculate that some staff and residents are LGBTI, and that LGBTI residents would be safe at Bridgeway. Some residents also state a belief that Bridgeway administrators will protect confidentiality.

Volunteers are only at the facility briefly and afterhours. None were available during the On-Site review. The facility has some characteristics of a minimum security group home, but requires everyone to have or seek employment. The large number of residents who work reduces the number who remain at the facility and require supervision. Bridgeway is the only facility of its kind in the state and is highly sought after by ODOC inmates who can prove they are trustworthy and appropriate. Bridgeway has some residents for more than one year. Longer stays reduce the number of admissions administrators must complete. Admissions are scheduled in advance, allowing the same administrators to conduct screenings and PREA education that are reliably uniform and consistent.

	Bridgeway has a written policy mandating zero tolerance toward all forms of sexual abuse and sexual harassment. They have a written policy outlining how they will implement the agency's approach to preventing, detecting, and responding to sexual abuse and sexual harassment. The Bridgeway Halfway House PREA Policy and Guidelines include definitions of prohibited behaviors regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment, sanctions for those found to have participated in prohibited behaviors, and a description of agency strategies and responses to reduce and prevent sexual abuse and sexual harassment of residents. The zero-tolerance policy is also repeated on handouts, on a card attached to the employee ID, in trainings, and on posters and notices throughout the facility. Bridgeway employs an upper-level, agency-wide PREA Coordinator, who answers directly to the President/CEO. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with the PREA Coordinator and the CEO; PREA Policy 3-1 and 4-1; and the Agency Organizational Chart. The agency and facility comply materially with what is required by this Standard.

115.212	Contracting with other entities for the confinement of residents

	Bridgeway takes residents from the Oklahoma Department of Corrections (ODOC), through a contractual agreement, but does not contract out for the confinement of its residents, with one possible exception. There is a contract with Kay County that was developed in 2012 that allows for the confinement of Bridgeway residents in limited circumstances. The contract does not mention PREA. Bridgeway is aware of its obligations under PREA when it renews the contract. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: PAQ documentation received, contracts reviewed, and interviews with the agency Contract Administrator, as well as the ODOC Contract Monitor, and other agency administrators. Through a triangulation of evidence, the agency and facility is compliant with this Standard.

	Auditor Discussion
	Bridgeway develops and documents a staffing plan that provides for adequate levels of staffing and video monitoring to protect residents against sexual abuse. In calculating adequate staffing levels and determining the need for video monitoring, they consider the physical layout of the facility, the composition of the resident population, the prevalence of substantiated and unsubstantiated incidents of sexual abuse, and any other relevant factors. Staff and resident interviews indicate no deviations from the staffing plan, and no concern about inadequate supervision. Deviations would have to be documented and justified. Whenever necessary, but no less frequently than once each year, Bridgeway assesses, determines, and documents whether staffing plan adjustments are needed. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with the CEO, the PREA Coordinator, and intermediate-level staff; Documentation of staffing plan development process; Staffing plan; Work Schedule; Minutes of Staffing Meetings; and Documentation of Annual Reviews. The agency/ facility has provided proof of minimum compliance with all provisions of this Standard.

115.215	Limits to cross-gender viewing and searches

	Auditor Discussion Bridgeway policy forbids body cavity searches. Cross-gender searches are forbidden. Exceptions must be documented. Policies and procedures have been implemented and verified that enable residents to shower, perform bodily functions, and change clothing without non-medical staff of the opposite gender viewing their breasts, buttocks, or genitalia, except in exigent circumstances or when such viewing is incidental to routine cell checks (this includes viewing via video camera). These policies require staff of the opposite gender to announce their presence when entering a resident housing unit. Policy prohibits staff from searching or physically examining a transgender or inter-sex resident for the sole purpose of determining the resident's genital status. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with randomly selected staff and residents; Policies governing searches and the other provisions of this Standard (PREA Policy section I subsections E and F, page 18); forms to be used for exceptions and exigent circumstances; Training curricula regarding cross-gender pat-down searches and searches of transgender and intersex residents; Employee Handbook; and Staff training logs. 	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard Auditor Discussion Bridgeway has established procedures to provide disabled residents with equal opportunity to participate in or benefit from all aspects of the agency's efforts to prevent, detect, and respond to sexual abuse and sexual harassment. They have established procedures to provide residents who have limited English proficiency with equal opportunity to participate in or benefit from all aspects of the agency's efforts to prevent, detect, and respond to sexual abuse and sexual harassment. Agency policy prohibits use of resident interpreters, resident readers, or other types of resident assistants, except in limited circumstances where an extended delay in obtaining an effective interpreter could compromise the resident's safety, the performance of first-response duties under §115.264, and/or the investigation of the resident allegations. The agency is required to document the limited circumstances in individual cases where resident interpreters, readers, or other types of resident assistants are used, although there have been no exceptions in the past year. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes the following. Interviews with the Agency Head, randomly selected staff, and residents were conducted. Policies relating to this Standard were reviewed, as found in PREA

	Policy, Section V, along with other written materials used for effective communication about PREA with residents with disabilities, limited reading skills, or limited English proficiency; and documentation of staff training on PREA-compliant practices for residents with disabilities. Interviews with residents with physical challenges indicated facility practices consistent with this Standard. For example, when medical appointments or new glasses are needed, the facility quickly facilitates these services. A triangulation of evidence verifies compliance with this Standard.
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115.217	Hiring and promotion decisions
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion Bridgeway's PREA policy prohibits hiring or promoting anyone who may have contact with residents, and prohibits enlisting the services of any contractor who may have contact with residents, who have engaged in sexual abuse in a prison, jail, lockup, community confinement facility, juvenile facility, or other institution (as defined in 42 U.S.C. 1997); has been convicted of engaging or attempting to engage in sexual activity in the community facilitated by force, overt or implied threats of force, or coercion, or if the victim did not consent or was unable to consent or refuse; or has been civilly or administratively adjudicated to have engaged in any of this activity. Agency policy requires the consideration of any incidents of sexual harassment in determining whether to hire or promote anyone, or to enlist the services of any contractor, who may have contact with residents. Policy requires each of the following: (1) that before the facility hires any new employees who may have contact with residents, it conducts criminal background record checks; and, consistent with federal, state, and local law, it makes its best efforts to contact all prior institutional employers for information on substantiated allegations of sexual abuse or any resignation during a pending investigation of an allegation of sexual abuse; (2) that a criminal background record check be completed before enlisting the services of any contractor who may have contact with residents; and (3) that either criminal background record checks are conducted at least every five years for current employees and contractors who may have contact with residents; or, that a system is in place for otherwise capturing such information for current employees. Policy clearly states that material omissions regarding such misconduct, or the provision of materially false information, shall be grounds for termination. Policy also clearly states that all applicants and employees who may have contact with residents will be asked directly about previous misconduct described in paragraph (a) of this section, in written applications or interviews for hiring or promotions, and in any interviews or written self-evaluations conducted as part of reviews of current employees. All interviews with administrators involved in hiring confirm these policies are being followed. The agency also imposes upon employees a continuing affirmative duty to disclose any such misconduct. Moreover, their policies clearly

	state that unless prohibited by law, the agency will provide information on substantiated allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment involving a former employee upon receiving a request from an institutional employer for whom such employee has applied to work. Ten personnel files were randomly pulled, verifying current background checks have been performed. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with Human Resources staff. Policies on promotions and hiring of employees and contractors, including policies governing criminal background checks, of current employees and contractors who may have contact with residents (PREA Policy III D pg. 12). Files of persons hired or promoted in the last 12 months, to determine whether proper criminal record background checks have been conducted, and whether questions regarding past conduct were asked and answered. Files of personnel hired in the past 12 months, to determine that the agency has completed checks consistent with 115.317(c). Documentation of background records checks of current employees at five-year intervals, when applicable.
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115.218	Upgrades to facilities and technology
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion Bridgeway has neither acquired a new facility nor made a substantial expansion or modification to their existing correctional facility since the last Audit. Their video monitoring system has only had minor camera updates. They have acquired some rooms in an adjacent building that they use for their out-patient counseling services, and for staff trainings and meetings. This area is rarely available to facility residents. Sexual safety was considered in the process of acquiring and setting up this space. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews were conducted with the CEO and the PC, as well as with staff who have worked at the facility many years.

115.221	Evidence protocol and forensic medical examinations
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion Bridgeway is not responsible for conducting administrative or criminal sexual abuse investigations (including resident-on-resident sexual abuse or staff sexual misconduct). ODOC and local law enforcement are responsible for conducting

	administrative and criminal investigations at Bridgeway, and these agencies follow PREA and professional standards for investigating, as required by Bridgeway policy. All residents who experience sexual abuse have access to forensic medical examinations at an outside facility, without financial cost to the victim. Where possible, examinations are conducted by Sexual Assault Forensic Examiners (SAFEs) or Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANEs). SANEs and advocates are available via the MOU with the Dearing House, but when SANEs or SAFEs are not available, a qualified medical practitioner performs forensic medical examinations. The facility documents efforts to provide SANEs or SAFEs. In the past 12 months, there have been no forensic medical exams conducted. The facility attempts to make a victim advocate from a rape crisis center available to the victim, either in person or by other means, and these efforts are documented. When a rape crisis center is not available to provide victim advocate services, the facility provides a qualified staff member from a community-based organization or a qualified agency staff member. If requested by the victim, a victim advocate, qualified agency staff member, or qualified community-based organization staff member accompanies and supports the victim through the forensic medical examination process and investigatory interviews and provides emotional support, crisis intervention, information, and referrals. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with randomly selected staff and the SANE Nurse at the local hospital. Documentation that forensic medical exams are offered for free. PREA Policy page 21, #6. Documentation of agreement with rape crisis center for services. Documentation that a qualified community-based organization staff member accompanies and supports the victim, per Standard 115.321(e), if requested by the victim. The documentation provided, along with interviews to verify community services, and interviews with staff and residents, verify compliance with this Standard.
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115.222	Policies to ensure referrals of allegations for investigations
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion Bridgeway ensures that an administrative or criminal investigation is completed for all allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment (including resident-on-resident sexual abuse and staff sexual misconduct). In the past 12 months, there was one allegation of sexual abuse or sexual harassment. The agency has a policy that requires that criminal allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment be referred for investigation to an agency with the legal authority to conduct criminal investigations, which would include the ODOC and the Ponca City Police Department. ODOC completes administrative investigations. Agency policy regarding the referral of allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment for investigation is available to the public. The agency documents all referrals of

	allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment for investigation. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with Agency Head; contract with Oklahoma Department of Corrections; interview with ODOC Contract Monitor; documentation verifying that the allegations was investigated by ODOC; and PREA Policy III A, page 11. In addition, the Audit Team reviewed the website and public postings, tested the reporting system, and questioned residents regarding whether they believed there would be any problem making reports of sexual abuse and/or sexual harassment.
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115.231	Employee training
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion Bridgeway trains all employees who may have contact with residents on: (1) Its zero-tolerance policy for sexual abuse and sexual harassment; (2) How to fulfill their responsibilities under agency sexual abuse and sexual harassment prevention, detection, reporting, and response policies and procedures; (3) Residents' right to be free from sexual abuse and sexual harassment; (4) The right of residents and employees to be free from retaliation for reporting sexual abuse and sexual harassment; (5) The dynamics of sexual abuse and sexual harassment in confinement; (6) The common reactions of sexual abuse and sexual harassment victims; (7) How to detect and respond to signs of threatened and actual sexual abuse; (8) How to avoid inappropriate relationships with residents; (9) How to communicate effectively and professionally with residents, including lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex, or gender nonconforming residents; and (10) How to comply with relevant laws related to mandatory reporting of sexual abuse to outside authorities. Training is tailored to the gender of the residents at the facility, all of whom are male. Between trainings, the agency provides all employees who may have contact with residents with annual refresher information about current policies regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment, which include reviews, updates, and new information. The agency documents that employees understand the training they received through their signatures. Also, each section of the training is initialed by the employee. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with randomly selected staff; training policy and procedures (DOC OP030601; 12, IV); staff training curricula; and ten randomly selected staff files documenting staff training regarding compliance with this Standard. Documentation includes the record of training as well as staff acknowledgments of the training. These sources culminate in a triangulation of compliance with this Standard.

115.232	Volunteer and contractor training
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	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	All volunteers and contractors who have contact with Bridgeway residents are to be trained on their responsibilities under the agency's policies and procedures regarding sexual abuse/harassment prevention, detection, and response. Residents who attend church activities, attend these off-site. Transportation is provided by trained Bridgeway staff when needed, but most church services attended by residents are within walking distance. The level and type of training provided to volunteers and contractors is to be based on the services they provide and the level of contact they have with residents. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard is as follows. The training policy that is used when they do have contractors and volunteers was reviewed (DOC OP030601; 12, IV). Interviews with Bridgeway administrators, and documentation provided (including training curriculum), confirm that they make sure that all volunteers and contractors who will have contact with residents will at least be informed of the agency's zero-tolerance policy regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment, and informed how to report such incidents. They currently have no contractors who have contact with residents. They have ten volunteers who have been recently trained through the Oklahoma Dept of Corrections Volunteer program. A triangulation of evidence verifies compliance with this Standard.

115.233	Resident education
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	At the time of Intake, residents receive information about the zero-tolerance policy, how to report incidents or suspicions of sexual abuse or harassment, and their rights: to be free from sexual abuse and sexual harassment, to be free from retaliation for reporting such incidents, and regarding agency policies and procedures for responding to such incidents. Resident PREA education is available in accessible formats for all residents, including those who are limited in English proficiency, deaf, visually impaired, otherwise disabled, and/or limited in reading skills. The agency ensures that key information about the agency's PREA policies is continuously and readily available or visible through posters, resident handbooks, or other written formats. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with Intake Staff and randomly selected residents. Agency policy governing PREA education of residents, Policy (DOC OP030601; 15, IV). Intake records of 10 randomly selected residents. Signatures on the Offender Acknowledgment of Training. Resident educational materials are in formats accessible to those who are limited in English proficiency, deaf, visually impaired, or

	otherwise disabled, as well as to those who have limited reading skills. Log of PREA education being completed within ten days of Intake. Education and informational materials (posters) in compliance with the Standard. Interviews, documentation, and the Site Review all conclude that the facility complies with this Standard.
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115.234	Specialized training: Investigations
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	Bridgeway and ODOC policies require that investigators are trained in conducting sexual abuse investigations in confinement settings. Bridgeway does not have any trained sexual abuse investigators at this time, but it does not conduct its own investigations. The Bridgeway policy mirrors ODOC policy, requiring that whichever agency does investigations maintain documentation showing that investigators have completed the necessary training. According to this policy, and interviews with Bridgeway administration, the Auditor is assured that, in addition to the general training provided to all employees pursuant to § 115.231, the agency will ensure that, to the extent the agency itself would conduct sexual abuse investigations, its investigators would have received training in conducting such investigations in confinement settings. Specialized training includes techniques for interviewing sexual abuse victims, proper use of Miranda and Garrity warnings, sexual abuse evidence collection in confinement settings, and the criteria and evidence required to substantiate a case for administrative action or prosecution referral. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard emphasizes an interview with the Agency Head, indicating that all investigations are done by Oklahoma Department of Corrections Staff. In addition, the interview with the DOC contract monitor and the DOC contract itself, appears consistent with this Standard.

115.235	Specialized training: Medical and mental health care
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	Bridgeway also has a policy related to the training of medical and mental health practitioners. All medical and mental health care practitioners who may work with victims of sexual abuse are to be properly trained. Although medical and mental health care will probably be provided by the Dearing House, ODOC, or other providers, medical staff who conduct forensic exams are to be properly trained, and their employing agency should maintain documentation of this training. The training must include: how to detect and assess signs of sexual abuse and sexual

	harassment; how to preserve physical evidence of sexual abuse, how to respond effectively and professionally to victims of sexual abuse and sexual harassment, and how and to whom to report allegations or suspicions of sexual abuse and sexual harassment. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with the Agency head, indicating that all medical and mental health services are facilitated via the Oklahoma Department of Corrections Staff. Forms used for this purpose were reviewed, and residents who have received this care, for minor issues not related to sexual abuse, were interviewed. The content of policy, DOC contract, and interviews were consistent with compliance with this Standard.
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115.241	Screening for risk of victimization and abusiveness
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion Bridgeway has a policy and practice such that, within 72 hours of each resident's Intake, the facility is required to screen each resident for risk of sexual abuse victimization and sexual abusiveness toward other residents. This risk assessment is conducted using an objective screening instrument, and policy also requires that the facility reassess each resident's risk of victimization or abusiveness within a set time period, not to exceed 30 days after the resident's arrival at the facility based upon any additional, relevant information received by the facility since the Intake screening. The screening considers whether the resident has a mental, physical, or developmental disability; the age of the resident; the physical build of the resident; whether the resident has previously been incarcerated; whether the resident's criminal history is exclusively nonviolent; whether the resident has prior convictions for sex offenses against an adult or child; whether the resident is or is perceived to be gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, intersex, or gender non-conforming; whether the resident has previously experienced sexual victimization; and the resident's own perception of vulnerability. Policy prohibits disciplining residents for not disclosing completely regarding, or refusing to answer, questions regarding whether or not the resident has a mental, physical, or developmental disability; whether or not the resident is or is perceived to be gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, intersex, or gender non-conforming; whether the resident has previously experienced sexual victimization; and the resident's own perception of vulnerability. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes the following. Interviews were conducted with Risk Screening staff, with randomly selected residents, and with the PREA Coordinator. Agency policy and procedures governing screening of residents upon admission to the facility or transfer to another facility and during reassessments were reviewed (PREA Policy 178-VI). A screening instrument used to determine the risk of victimization or abusiveness was reviewed. And records for ten randomly selected residents from a list of all residents that have been in the facility at any point in the past 12 months. The residents

	interviewed indicated they have been screened and that they believe the information collected is kept confidential and is being discreetly used to keep them safe. Interviews from all levels of staff and residents, in addition to policy and randomly selected screenings as proof of practice, indicate that the facility is compliant with this Standard.
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115.242	Use of screening information
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	Bridgeway uses information from the risk screening required by § 115.241 to inform housing, bed, work, education, and program assignments, with the goal of keeping separate those residents at high risk of being sexually victimized from those at high risk of being sexually abusive. Bridgeway makes housing and program assignments for transgender or inter-sex residents in the facility on a case-by-case basis. A transgender or intersex resident's own view with respect to their own safety is given serious consideration. All residents at Bridgeway shower separately and are forbidden to share bathrooms or showers. This provides a guarantee that a transgender resident would be able to shower separately, as required in policy. The agency does not place gay, bisexual, transgender, or intersex residents in dedicated facilities, units, or wings solely based on such identification or status. Interviews indicate that very few residents have identified as LGBTI, and those that who do so, only do so to some people. Staff indicate they treat such information with discretion and confidentiality while treating all residents with equal dignity and respect. Analysis: Case managers and the PREA Coordinator do the screenings and make individualized determinations about how to ensure the safety of each resident, according to the information they gave to the Auditor during interviews. Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes the following. Interviews were conducted with the PREA Coordinator and Risk Screening Staff; Documentation was reviewed of the use of screening information of 10 randomly selected residents to assure that it was used to inform housing, bed, work, education, and program assignments, as applicable, with the goal of keeping all residents safe and free from sexual abuse. For those residents whose stay has lasted longer than 30 days, the facility's 30-day reviews were examined. Facility policies regarding all the provisions of this Standard were reviewed and are found in Policy 179-VII. Additional documentation supporting compliance with this Standard are Self Reports and Cell Assessments.

115.251	Resident reporting
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

	Auditor Discussion Bridgeway has established procedures allowing for multiple internal ways for residents to report privately to agency officials about sexual abuse or sexual harassment, retaliation by other residents or staff for reporting sexual abuse and sexual harassment, and staff neglect or violation of responsibilities that may have contributed to such incidents. The agency provides at least one way for residents to report abuse or harassment to an entity that is not part of the agency. In addition to being able to report to the Director, PREA Coordinator, Case Manager, or staff, they can call the DOC PREA Hotline (855-871-4139). Moreover, Dearing House is an external source of support, providing advocacy and assistance by phone (580-762-5266), and advocacy and counseling, in person or by writing (Dearing House, 311 South 13th St. Ponca City, Oklahoma 74601). Bridgeway also has a policy mandating that staff accept reports of sexual abuse and sexual harassment made verbally, in writing, anonymously, and from third parties. Staff are required to document verbal reports either immediately or by the end of the shift. The agency has established procedures for staff to privately report sexual abuse and sexual harassment of residents. They can report privately through the PREA hotline, through the DOC website, or by email. Staff and residents are informed of these procedures through their original training, their refresher training, signs posted around the facility, handouts, and their employee orientation packets. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: (1) Interviews with randomly selected staff and residents; and (2) Reviews of all of the following policies and agreements: resident reporting policy; documentation on resident reporting; documentation of agreement with outside entity responsible for taking reports; resident reporting policy relevant to reporting to outside entity (PREA policy 15-V); policy mandating that staff accept reports of sexual abuse and sexual harassment made verbally, in writing, anonymously and from third parties; and policy and documentation (e.g., staff handbooks) outlining procedures for staff to privately report sexual abuse and sexual harassment of residents. Verification of reporting systems, along with interviews conducted and policies reviewed, verify compliance with this Standard.
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115.252	Exhaustion of administrative remedies
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard Auditor Discussion Bridgeway has an administrative procedure for dealing with resident grievances regarding sexual abuse. Agency policy or procedure allows a resident to submit a grievance regarding an allegation of sexual abuse at any time, regardless of when the incident is alleged to have occurred. The policy does not require a resident to use an informal grievance process, nor otherwise to attempt to resolve with staff, an alleged incident of sexual abuse. Agency policy requires that a resident grievance

	alleging sexual abuse not be referred to the staff member who is the subject of the complaint. A decision on the merits of any grievance or portion of a grievance alleging sexual abuse must be made within 90 days of the filing of the grievance. The agency always notifies the resident in writing when the agency files for an extension, including notice of the date by which a decision will be made. Third parties, including fellow residents, staff members, family members, attorneys, and outside advocates, may assist residents in filing requests for administrative remedies relating to allegations of sexual abuse, and to file such requests on behalf of residents. If the resident declines to have third-party assistance in filing a grievance alleging sexual abuse, the agency documents the resident's decision to decline. The agency also has a policy and established procedures for filing an emergency grievance alleging that a resident is subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse. These require an initial response within 48 hours and a final agency decision within five days. Policy limits the ability to discipline a resident for filing a grievance alleging sexual abuse to occasions where the agency demonstrates that the resident filed the grievance in bad faith. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: policy regarding resident grievances of sexual abuse; policy for filing an emergency grievance alleging that a resident is subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse; policy limiting the agency's ability to discipline a resident for filing a grievance related to alleged sexual abuse to occasions where the agency demonstrates that the resident filed the grievance in bad faith (PREA Policy 20-IX); Resident Handouts and educational materials. Since no grievances regarding sexual abuse or sexual harassment were received, the Auditor reviewed a grievance regarding another matter. Interviews with staff and residents verify that the grievance system is assessable and effective. Documentation of practices and policies, along with interviews of individuals deemed credible regarding how grievances are handled at Bridgeway, culminate in verifying compliance with this Standard.
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115.253	Resident access to outside confidential support services
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion Bridgeway provides residents with access to outside victim advocates for emotional support services related to sexual abuse by giving residents mailing addresses and telephone numbers (including toll-free hotline numbers) for local, state, or national victim advocacy or rape crisis organizations, and by enabling reasonable communication between residents and these organizations in as confidential a manner as possible. The facility informs residents, prior to giving them access to outside support services, of the extent to which such communications will be monitored, and of mandatory reporting rules governing privacy, confidentiality, and/or privilege that apply to disclosures of sexual abuse made to outside victim

	advocates, including any limits to confidentiality under relevant federal, state, or local law. Bridgeway maintains a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with Dearing House to provide residents with emotional support services related to sexual abuse. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with randomly selected residents the Director, and a Dearing House advocate; Policies governing resident access to outside victim advocates for emotional support services related to sexual abuse (PREA Policy 20-IX); Resident handout pertinent to reporting sexual abuse and access to support services; and the MOU with Dearing House. A triangulation of evidence serves to verify compliance with this Standard.
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115.254	Third party reporting
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion Bridgeway and ODOC provide methods to receive third-party reports of resident sexual abuse or sexual harassment. These can be given by phone, in writing, verbally, and through the ODOC website. They publicly distribute information on how to report resident sexual abuse or sexual harassment on behalf of residents through posters, handbooks, handouts, and through the ODOC website. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes publicly distributed information on how to report sexual abuse or sexual harassment on behalf of residents, the DOC website, Site Review, and PREA Policy 30-IX. Verification of reporting systems, along with interviews and documentation, also serves to verify compliance with this Standard.

115.261	Staff and agency reporting duties
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion Bridgeway requires all staff to report immediately, and according to agency policy, any knowledge, suspicion, or information they receive regarding an incident of sexual abuse or sexual harassment that occurred in a facility, whether or not it is part of the agency. They are also required to report any retaliation against residents or staff who reported such an incident. In addition, they must report any staff neglect or violation of responsibilities that may have contributed to an incident or retaliation. These requirements also apply to information received from third parties and anonymous sources. Apart from reporting to designated supervisors or officials

	and designated state or local service agencies, agency policy prohibits staff from revealing any information related to a sexual abuse report to anyone, other than to the extent necessary to make treatment, investigation, and other security and management decisions. At the initiation of services, medical and mental health practitioners are required to report sexual abuse, and to inform residents of the practitioner's duty to report, and of the limitations of confidentiality. If the alleged victim is considered a vulnerable adult under a State or local vulnerable persons statute, the agency will report the allegation to Adult Protective Services. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with randomly selected staff, and with the administrators; and policy and training materials governing the reporting by staff of incidents of sexual abuse or sexual harassment (PREA Policy 20-IX). Staff and offenders interviewed were asked whether they had made any reports of sexual abuse or harassment or knew of any that had been made within the past year regarding Bridgeway. They verified that they knew how to make reports and would be able to do so if the need arose. They believe that if a report is made, appropriate steps will be taken. Interviews, policies, and practices combine to verify compliance with this Standard.
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115.262	Agency protection duties
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	When Bridgeway learns that a resident is subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse, it takes immediate action to protect the resident (i.e., it takes some action to assess and implement appropriate protective measures without unreasonable delay). Analysis: In the past 12 months, there have been no times the agency determined that a resident was subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse. This information was verified by both a reading of policy and interviews with residents and staff. Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with the Agency and Facility administrators, and with randomly selected staff; and relevant policy governing the agency's protection duties, when residents are subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse (PREA Policy 3-I). All the information available to the Audit Team indicates that the facility is fully compliant with this Standard.

115.263	Reporting to other confinement facilities
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion

	Bridgeway policy requires that, upon receiving an allegation that a resident was sexually abused while confined at another facility, the head of the Bridgeway facility must notify the head of the other facility or the appropriate office of the other agency or facility where sexual abuse is alleged to have occurred. Policy also requires the facility head to provide such notification as soon as possible, but no later than 72 hours after receiving the allegation, and to document such notification within 72 hours of receiving the allegation. In addition, the agency policy requires that allegations received from other facilities/agencies are investigated in accordance with the PREA Standards. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with the Agency Head and facility leadership; Agency policy regarding reporting allegations of sexual abuse of residents while confined at another facility; and Agency policy requiring that allegations of sexual abuse of residents received from other agencies or facilities are investigated in accordance with the PREA Standards (PREA Policy 23-X). In the past 12 months, there have been no allegations the facility received that a resident was abused while confined at another facility. Likewise, there were no allegations of sexual abuse the facility received from other facilities regarding abuse at Bridgeway, so the Auditor was not able to review such documentation and response. Information received during interviews, along with a review of facilities practices and policies, indicate the facility's readiness to deal with the types of allegations specifically identified in this Standard.
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115.264	Staff first responder duties
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion Bridgeway has a First Responder policy for allegations of sexual abuse. This policy requires that, upon learning of an allegation that a resident was sexually abused, the first security staff member to respond to the report will be required to separate the alleged victim and abuser and to preserve and protect any crime scene until appropriate steps can be taken to collect any evidence. If the abuse occurred within a time period that still allows for the collection of physical evidence, the First Responder is to request that the alleged victim not take any actions that could destroy physical evidence, including, as appropriate, washing, brushing teeth, changing clothes, urinating, defecating, smoking, drinking, or eating. If the abuse occurred within a time period that still allows for the collection of physical evidence, staff is to ensure that the alleged abuser does not take any actions that could destroy physical evidence, including, as appropriate, washing, brushing teeth, changing clothes, urinating, defecating, smoking, drinking, or eating. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with administrators and staff, training materials, and PREA Policy 20-IX. Documentation relating to the immediate response to the allegation received (and eventually investigated by the Oklahoma Department of Corrections), along with

	interviews with staff, indicate readiness by facility employees to follow first responder duties in practice any time they are called upon to do so. A triangulation of evidence verifies compliance with this Standard.
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115.265	Coordinated response
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	Bridgeway has developed a written institutional plan, among staff First Responders, medical and mental health practitioners, investigators, and facility leadership, to coordinate actions taken in response to an incident of sexual abuse. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with staff and administrators; Agency policy (PREA Policy 20-IX); training materials; and the Coordinated Response Plan. The MOU with the Dearing House and the contract with DOC are consistent with this plan, as well. Compliance with this Standard is verified via a triangulation of evidence.

115.266	Preservation of ability to protect residents from contact with abusers
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	The agency has neither entered into nor renewed any collective bargaining agreement or other agreement since the last Audit. They retain the ability to protect residents from abuse. Analysis: No sources indicate any lack of compliance with this Standard.

115.267	Agency protection against retaliation
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	Bridgeway has a policy to protect all residents and staff who report sexual abuse or sexual harassment, or who cooperate with sexual abuse or sexual harassment investigations, from retaliation by other residents or staff. The PREA Coordinator and the Facility Director monitor for retaliation themselves, and they delegate staff

	member(s) to assist with monitoring for possible retaliation, on a case-by-case basis, to assure full compliance with this Standard. They indicate that they monitor through checking with the entire chain of command, and in reviewing and monitoring all reports. Policy and interviews indicate they monitor the conduct or treatment of residents or staff who reported sexual abuse, and of residents who were reported to have suffered sexual abuse, to see if there are any changes that may suggest possible retaliation by residents or staff. They indicate they will utilize shift supervisors, as well, in monitoring conduct and treatment for 90 days, or longer if indicated, and to act promptly to remedy any retaliation. They use multiple protection measures, such as housing changes or transfers for resident victims or abusers, removal of alleged staff or resident abusers from contact with victims, and emotional support services for residents or staff who fear retaliation for reporting sexual abuse or sexual harassment or for cooperating with investigations. They monitor resident disciplinary reports, housing, and program changes, as well as negative performance reviews and reassignments of staff. Monitoring includes periodic status checks. Analysis: No logs of retaliation monitoring are available due to no allegations being made in recent years. Policy protecting residents and staff from retaliation found in PREA Policy 22-IX C, training materials, and interviews with agency and facility staff responsible for retaliation monitoring were utilized to determine compliance with this Standard.
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115.271	Criminal and administrative agency investigations
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion Bridgeway and ODOC have written policy related to criminal and administrative agency investigations, neither of which are performed by the facility, itself. Substantiated allegations of conduct that appear to be criminal are referred for prosecution. There were no allegations of sexual abuse or harassment in the past 12 months. Policy requires the agency to retain all written reports pertaining to the administrative or criminal investigations of alleged sexual abuse or sexual harassment for as long as the alleged abuser is incarcerated or employed by the agency, plus five years. Investigations are to be done promptly, thoroughly, and objectively for all allegations, including third-party and anonymous reports. Investigators who have received special training in sexual abuse investigations must be used (by the State and/or law enforcement). Investigators will gather and preserve direct and circumstantial evidence, including any available physical and DNA evidence and any available electronic monitoring data; will interview alleged victims, suspected perpetrators, and witnesses; and will review prior complaints and reports of sexual abuse involving the suspected perpetrator. When the quality of evidence appears to support criminal prosecution, the agency will conduct compelled interviews only after consulting with prosecutors as to whether

	compelled interviews may be an obstacle for subsequent criminal prosecution. The credibility of an alleged victim, suspect, or witness will be assessed on an individual basis and will not be determined by the person's status as resident or staff. No polygraph examination or other truth-telling device is required as a condition for proceeding with the investigation of such an allegation. Administrative investigations will include an effort to determine whether staff actions or failures to act contributed to the abuse; and will be documented in written reports that include a description of the physical and testimonial evidence, the reasoning behind credibility assessments, and investigative facts and findings. Criminal investigations will be documented in a written report that contains a thorough description of physical, testimonial, and documentary evidence, and copies of all documentary evidence will be attached where feasible. All written reports are retained for as long as the alleged abuser is incarcerated or employed by the agency, plus five years. The departure of the alleged abuser or victim from the employment or control of the facility or agency will not provide a basis for terminating an investigation. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with the Director and with the PREA Coordinator. Agency and DOC policies related to criminal and administrative agency investigations (PREA Policy 23-X). All investigations are conducted by the Ponca City Police Department and/or the Oklahoma Department of Corrections Staff. The example provided as proof of practice during the past year was consistent with Bridgeway being in compliance with this Standard.
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115.272	Evidentiary standard for administrative investigations
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion Both Bridgeway and ODOC policy state, and interviews verify, that the agencies impose a standard of a preponderance of the evidence, or a lower standard of proof, when determining whether allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment are substantiated Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: PREA Policy 5-II and interviews with agency staff from Bridgeway as well as DOC. Training materials, and investigative materials reviewed, are also consistent with this Standard.

115.273	Reporting to residents
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion

	The agency has a policy requiring that any resident who makes an allegation that he suffered sexual abuse in an agency facility is informed, verbally or in writing, as to whether the allegation has been determined to be substantiated, unsubstantiated, or unfounded following an investigation by the agency. According to policy and interviews with the PREA Coordinator, if an outside entity conducts such investigations, the agency requests the relevant information from the investigative entity in order to inform the resident of the outcome of the investigation. Also, following a resident's allegation that a staff member has committed sexual abuse against the resident, the agency/facility subsequently informs the resident (unless the agency has determined that the allegation is unfounded), whenever the staff member is no longer posted within the residence, the staff member is no longer employed at the facility, the agency learns that the staff member has been indicted on a charge related to sexual abuse within the facility, or the agency learns that the staff member has been convicted on a charge related to sexual abuse within the facility. Following a resident's allegation that another resident has sexually abused him in an agency (ODOC) facility, the agency subsequently informs the alleged victim whenever the agency learns that the alleged abuser has been indicted on a charge related to sexual abuse within the facility, or the agency learns that the alleged abuser has been convicted on a charge related to sexual abuse within the facility. By policy, and by contractual agreement with ODOC, all notifications to residents described under this Standard are documented. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with the CEO and facility administrators. Agency PREA Policy 27-XI. All investigations are conducted by the Ponca City Policy Department and/or the Oklahoma Department of Corrections Staff. Investigative materials reviewed were consistent with this Standard in practice.
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115.276	Disciplinary sanctions for staff
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard Auditor Discussion Bridgeway staff are subject to disciplinary sanctions, up to and including termination, for violating agency sexual abuse or sexual harassment policies. Disciplinary sanctions for violations of agency policies relating to sexual abuse or sexual harassment (other than actually engaging in sexual abuse) are commensurate with the nature and circumstances of the acts committed, the staff member's disciplinary history, and the sanction imposed for comparable offenses by other staff with similar histories. All terminations for violations of agency sexual abuse or sexual harassment policies, or resignations by staff who would have been terminated if not for their resignation, are reported to law enforcement agencies, unless the activity was clearly not criminal, and to any relevant licensing bodies. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Staff disciplinary policy regarding violations of Agency sexual abuse or sexual

	harassment policies (PREA Policy 28-XI B). There was one staff from the facility who have been alleged to have violated agency sexual abuse or sexual harassment policies in the past 12 months. Documents provided were consistent with this Standard being followed in practice, and with interviews which indicate that supervisors are familiar with, and committed to, the policy regarding the discipline of staff. A clear triangulation of evidence verifies compliance with this Standard.
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115.277	Corrective action for contractors and volunteers
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion Bridgeway policy requires that any contractor or volunteer who engages in sexual abuse be reported to law enforcement agencies, unless the activity was clearly not criminal, and to relevant licensing bodies. Agency policy requires that any contractor or volunteer who engages in sexual abuse be prohibited from contact with residents. Bridgeway takes appropriate remedial measures and considers whether to prohibit further contact with residents in the case of any other violation of agency sexual abuse or sexual harassment policies by a contractor or volunteer, but the Director and the PREA Coordinator indicate that any violation will probably result in the volunteer being dismissed. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: An interview with the CEO, staff who supervise contractors/volunteers, and Agency policy requiring that any contractor or volunteer who engages in sexual abuse against an inmate shall be reported to law enforcement, unless the activity clearly was not criminal in nature (PREA Policy 28-XI C). No contractors or volunteers have been reported to law enforcement agencies and relevant licensing bodies for engaging in sexual abuse of residents, since there have been no allegations against them. No information obtained during the Audit was inconsistent with this Standard.

115.278	Disciplinary sanctions for residents
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion Residents are subject to disciplinary sanctions only pursuant to a formal disciplinary process following an administrative finding that the resident engaged in resident-on-resident sexual abuse. Sanctions are commensurate with the nature and circumstances of the abuse committed, the resident's disciplinary history, and the sanctions imposed for comparable offenses by other residents with similar histories. The disciplinary process considers whether a resident's mental disabilities or mental

	illness contributed to his behavior when determining what type of sanction, if any, should be imposed. Bridgeway offers therapy, counseling, or other interventions designed to address and correct the underlying reasons or motivations for abuse. The facility considers whether to require the offending resident to participate in such interventions as a condition of access to programming or other benefits, but since Bridgeway is a halfway house not set up to provide such interventions, the offender would likely go back to ODOC for assistance. Bridgeway disciplines residents for sexual conduct with staff only upon finding that the staff member did not consent to such contact. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Interviews with agency administrators; and policy which states that residents are subject to disciplinary sanctions only pursuant to a formal disciplinary process following an administrative finding that the resident engaged in resident-on-resident sexual abuse (PREA Policy 29-XI D). The policy reviewed, along with interviews which indicate investigators and administrators are ready and able to follow the policy, is consistent with this Standard.
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115.282	Access to emergency medical and mental health services
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	Bridgeway resident victims of sexual abuse receive timely, unimpeded access to emergency medical treatment and crisis intervention services. The nature and scope of such services are determined by medical and mental health practitioners according to their professional judgment. Medical and mental health staff maintain secondary materials documenting the timeliness of emergency medical treatment and crisis intervention services that were provided the appropriate response by non-health staff, in the event health staff are not present at the time the incident is reported, and the provision of appropriate and timely information and services concerning sexually transmitted infection prophylaxis. Treatment services are provided to every victim without financial cost, and regardless of whether the victim names the abuser or cooperates with any investigation arising out of the incident. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: There are no onsite emergency medical or mental health services, but staff who provide these services were interviewed. Policy (PREA policy 30 XIII) and the contract with the Oklahoma Department of Corrections indicate residents must be provided these services. The DOC contract monitor was interviewed and indicates compliance with these obligations. All these sources are consistent with this Standard.

115.283	Ongoing medical and mental health care for sexual abuse victims and abusers
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	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	Bridgeway offers medical and mental health evaluation and, as appropriate, treatment, to all residents who have been victimized by sexual abuse in any prison, jail, lockup, or juvenile facility. Since they do not house female residents, portions of the Standards dealing with female residents are not applicable. Resident victims of sexual abuse, while incarcerated, are offered tests for sexually transmitted infections as medically appropriate, and treatment services are provided to the victim without financial cost, regardless of whether the victim names the abuser or cooperates with any investigation arising out of the incident. The facility attempts to conduct a mental health evaluation of all known resident-on-resident abusers within 60 days of learning of such abuse history and offers treatment (in the community) when deemed appropriate by mental health practitioners. Analysis: Evidence used to determine compliance with this Standard includes: Policy and procedures governing ongoing medical and mental health care for sexual abuse victims and abusers (PREA Policy 29-XI D) and interviews with administrators and residents. Moreover, a review of counseling services available to residents of Bridgeway in the community, as well as at DOC facilities to which they are transported regularly to the host facility in Enid, was also helpful in determining compliance with this Standard.

115.286	Sexual abuse incident reviews
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	Policy requires that the facility conduct sexual abuse Incident Reviews within 30 days of the conclusion of every criminal or administrative sexual abuse investigation, unless the allegation has been determined to be unfounded. Interviews with the Director and the PREA Coordinator verify that the Review Team considers whether the allegation or investigation indicates a need to change policy or practice to better prevent, detect, or respond to sexual abuse. Also, the Review Team considers whether the incident or allegation was motivated by race; ethnicity; gender identity; lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or intersex identification, status, or perceived status; or gang affiliation; or was motivated or otherwise caused by other group dynamics at the facility. They examine the area in the facility where the incident allegedly occurred, to assess whether physical barriers in the area may enable abuse. They assess the adequacy of staffing levels in that area during different shifts. They assess whether monitoring technology should be augmented to supplement supervision by staff. They prepare a report of findings and implement the changes or document why changes could not be implemented. The sexual abuse Incident Review Team includes upper-level management officials,

	and it allows for input from line supervisors, investigators, and medical or mental health practitioners.
