Zero tolerance of sexual abuse and sexual harassment; PREA coordinator

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

- (a) An agency has a written policy, OP-030601, mandating zero tolerance toward all forms of sexual abuse and sexual harassment and outlines the agency's approach to preventing, detecting, and responding to such conduct, as evidenced by the facility's Coordinated Response Plan and policy OSR 030601-01.
- (b) The agency employs an upper-level, agency-wide PREA coordinator with sufficient time and authority to develop, implement, and oversee agency efforts to comply with the PREA standards in all of its facilities, as evidenced by review of the organizational chart. The PREA Coordinator reports to the General Counsel. This was verified by the PREA Coordinator during an interview.
- (c) The agency operates more than one facility, therefore, the facility has designated the Deputy Warden to serve as the PREA Compliance Manager for OSR with sufficient time and authority to coordinate the facility's efforts to comply with the PREA standards, as evidenced by review of facility organizational chart. As noted in the PAQ, the Deputy Warden reports to the Warden. This was verified by the PREA

Compliance Manager during an interview.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.12 Contracting with other entities for the confinement of inmates

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

As noted in the PAQ, the agency has not entered into or renewed a contract for the confinement of inmates since the last PREA audit.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.13 Supervision and monitoring

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

- (a) As evidenced by the agency staffing plan and observations of supervision practices made during the site review, the agency ensures that each facility it operates develops, documents, and makes its best efforts to comply on a regular basis with a staffing plan that provides for adequate levels of staffing, and, where applicable, video monitoring, to protect inmates against sexual abuse. In calculating adequate staffing levels and determining the need for video monitoring, the facility takes into consideration: (1) Generally accepted detention and correctional practices; (2) Any judicial findings of inadequacy; (3) Any findings of inadequacy from Federal investigative agencies; (4) Any findings of inadequacy from internal or external oversight bodies; (5) All components of the facility's physical plant (including "blindspots" or areas where staff or inmates may be isolated); (6) The composition of the inmate population; (7) The number and placement of supervisory staff; (8) Institution programs occurring on a particular shift; (9) Any applicable State or local laws, regulations, or standards; (10) The prevalence of substantiated and unsubstantiated incidents of sexual abuse; and (11) Any other relevant factors. This was verified during interviews with the Warden and the PREA Compliance Manager.
- (b) As evidenced by the PAQ, observations of supervision practices made during the site review, and in an interview with the Warden, the facility has not had to deviate from staffing plan.
- (c) As evidenced by a review of staffing plan annual reviews for multiple years and interviews with the PREA Coordinator, once each year, for each facility the agency operates, in consultation with the PREA Coordinator, the agency assesses,

determines, and documents whether adjustments are needed to: (1) The staffing plan (2) The facility's deployment of video monitoring systems and other monitoring technologies; and (3) The resources the facility has available to commit to ensure adherence to the staffing plan.

(d) The agency has implemented policy OP-030601 and a practice of having intermediate-level or higher-level supervisors conduct and document unannounced rounds to identify and deter staff sexual abuse and sexual harassment. Such policy and practice are implemented for night shifts as well as day shifts. The policy prohibits staff from alerting other staff members that these supervisory rounds are occurring unless such an announcement is related to the legitimate operational functions of the facility. This was evidenced by a review of the PREA unannounced rounds documented in the logbooks and verified during an interview with staff responsible for conducting PREA unannounced rounds.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.14	Youthful inmates

115.15	Limits to cross-gender viewing and searches

	(a) The facility does not conduct cross-gender strip searches or cross-gender visual body cavity searches except in exigent circumstances or when performed by medical practitioners, as evidenced by the PAQ, policy OP-040102 and observations made during the site review.
	(b) As noted in the PAQ and observations made during the site review, the facility does not have female inmates.
	(c) The facility would document any cross-gender strip searches and cross-gender visual body cavity searches, as evidenced by policy OP-040110. This is an all-male inmate facility.

- (d) The facility policy OP-030601 enables inmates to shower, perform bodily functions, and change clothing without nonmedical staff of the opposite gender viewing their breasts, buttocks, or genitalia, except in exigent circumstances or when such viewing is incidental to routine cell checks, as evidenced by observations made during the site review. Such policies and procedures require staff of the opposite gender to announce their presence when entering an inmate housing unit. Observations made during the site review indicate that the facility takes extra precautions to reduce the risk of incidental opposite gender viewing. Not only do staff announce themselves when entering the housing units, clear signage is posted to remind staff to announce when entering, and staff signs a unit logbook indicating their presence. Inmates stated that the inmates and male correctional officers announce when they see a female staff member entering the unit. This was verified during interviews with random inmates and staff.
- (e) As evidenced by policy OP-030601, the facility does not search or physically examine a transgender or intersex inmate for the sole purpose of determining the inmate's genital status. If the inmate's genital status is unknown, it may be determined during conversations with the inmate, by reviewing medical records, or, if necessary, by learning that information as part of a broader medical examination conducted in private by a medical practitioner. This was verified during interviews with random staff and three inmates that identified as transgender or intersex.
- (f) The agency trains security staff in how to conduct cross-gender pat-down searches, and searches of transgender and intersex inmates, in a professional and respectful manner, and in the least intrusive manner possible, consistent with security needs, as evidenced by a review of the training curriculum and staff training attendance rosters and verified through interviews with random staff.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility exceeds compliance with this standard due to the multiple processes the facility has in place to prevent cross-gender viewing.

115.16

Inmates with disabilities and inmates who are limited English proficient

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

(a) The agency takes appropriate steps to ensure that inmates with disabilities have an equal opportunity to participate in or benefit from all aspects of the agency's efforts to prevent, detect, and respond to sexual abuse and sexual harassment. In addition, the agency ensures that written materials are provided in formats or through methods that ensure effective communication with inmates with disabilities, including inmates who have intellectual disabilities, limited reading skills, or who are blind or have low vision. This is evidenced by policy OP-030601, In-service training

tracking sheet, new arrival paperwork, protocol testing, and observations made during the site review. Interviews with the General Counsel designee and inmates with disabilities or who are limited English proficient verified this practice.

- (b) The agency takes reasonable steps to ensure meaningful access to all aspects of the agency's efforts to prevent, detect, and respond to sexual abuse and sexual harassment to inmates who are limited English proficient, including steps to provide interpreters who can interpret effectively, accurately, and impartially, both receptively and expressively, using any necessary specialized vocabulary, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, the inmate Spanish handbook, Spanish acknowledgement form, Oklahoma DOC interpreter list, observations made during the site review of postings in English and Spanish, and during interviews with inmates with disabilities or who are limited English proficient.
- (c) The agency does not rely on inmate interpreters, inmate readers, or other types of inmate assistants except in limited circumstances where an extended delay in obtaining an effective interpreter could compromise the inmate's safety, the performance of first-response or the investigation of the inmate's allegations, as evidenced by policy OP-030601 and interviews with random staff and inmates with disabilities or who are limited English proficient.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.17 Hiring and promotion decisions

Auditor Overall Determination: Exceeds Standard

- (a) Per policy, OP-110235, the agency does not hire or promote anyone who may have contact with inmates, and does not enlist the services of any contractor who may have contact with inmates, who (1) Has engaged in sexual abuse in a prison, jail, lockup, community confinement facility, juvenile facility, or other institution; (2) Has been convicted of engaging or attempting to engage in sexual activity in the community facilitated by force, overt or implied threats of force, or coercion, or if the victim did not consent or was unable to consent or refuse; or (3) Has been civilly or administratively adjudicated to have engaged in the activity described in paragraph (a)(2) of this section. This was evidenced by a review of staff hired or promoted within the last twelve months roster and a review of staff hired or promoted within the last 12 months files. The facility does not contract with any contractors currently, however, the facility does conduct background records checks on all volunteers, exceeding this standard, as evidenced by volunteer background record check file reviews.
- (b) The agency considers any incidents of sexual harassment in determining whether to hire or promote anyone, or to enlist the services of any contractor, who may have contact with inmates, as evidenced by policy OP-110235 and verified through

interviews with HR staff. The facility does not contract with any contractors currently.

- (c) Before hiring new employees who may have contact with inmates, the agency (1) Performs a criminal background records check; and (2) Consistent with Federal, State, and local law, make its best efforts to contact all prior institutional employers for information on substantiated allegations of sexual abuse or any resignation during a pending investigation of an allegation of sexual abuse, as verified by policy OP-110210, a review of employee hired in the past 12 months files and verified during interviews with HR staff.
- (d) The facility does not contract with any contractors currently, however, the facility does conduct background records checks on all volunteers, exceeding this standard, as evidenced by volunteer background record check file reviews.
- (e) The agency conducts criminal background records checks at least every five years of current employees who may have contact with inmates, in addition to having a state rap-back system under the National Background Check Program that allows the agency to be immediately informed of any new criminal history record information against an employee that arises after the latest criminal history background record check is completed, which exceeds this standard. to be instantly notified, as evidenced by policy OP-110210, a review of background checks of current employees at five-year intervals, a listing of employees employed longer than five years, and during interviews with HR staff.
- (f) The agency asks all applicants and employees who may have contact with inmates directly about previous misconduct in written applications or interviews for hiring or promotions and in any interviews or written self-evaluations conducted as part of reviews of current employees. The agency also imposes upon employees a continuing affirmative duty to disclose any such misconduct, as verified through interviews with HR staff.
- (g) Material omissions regarding such misconduct, or the provision of materially false information, are grounds for termination, as evidenced by policy OP-110210.
- (h) The agency provides information on substantiated allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment involving a former employee upon receiving a request from an institutional employer for whom such employee has applied to work, as verified by interviews with HR staff.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility exceeds compliance with this standard, due to having a state rap back system in addition to conducting background record checks on employees every five years, and for conducting background record checks on all volunteers.

115.18	Upgrades to facilities and technologies
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

- (a) As noted in the PAQ and during interviews with the General Counsel designee and the Warden, the facility has not acquired a new facility or made a substantial expansion since the last PREA audit.
- (b) As noted in the PAQ and during interviews with the General Counsel designee and the Warden, the facility has not installed or updated a video monitoring system, electronic surveillance system, or other monitoring technology since the last PREA audit.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.21 Evidence protocol and forensic medical examinations

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

- (a) The agency follows a uniform evidence protocol that maximizes the potential for obtaining usable physical evidence for administrative proceedings and criminal prosecutions, as evidenced by a review of "A National Protocol for Sexual Assault Medical Forensic Examinations" manual and interviews with random staff.
- (b) The facility does not house youthful inmates. The protocol was adapted from or otherwise based on the most recent edition of the U.S. Department of Justice's Office on Violence Against Women publication, "A National Protocol for Sexual Assault Medical Forensic Examinations, Adults/Adolescents," or similarly comprehensive and authoritative protocols developed after 2011, as verified by a review of the unform evidence protocol.
- (c) Per policy OP-140118, the agency offers all victims of sexual abuse access to forensic medical examinations at an outside facility, without financial cost, where evidentiarily or medically appropriate. Such examinations are performed by Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANEs), as evidenced by an MOU with Jackson County Memorial Hospital. As noted in the PAQ, there has been one forensic medical exam conducted during the past twelve months by a SANE examiner.
- (d) The agency makes available to the victim a victim advocate from the Safe Haven Domestic Violence Shelter. An MOU is in place. This was verified by the community questionnaire and during interviews with the PREA Compliance Manager and three inmates who reported sexual abuse.
- (e) During an interview with the PREA Compliance Manager and inmates who reported sexual abuse, and review of the MOU with Safe Haven Domestic Violence Shelter, the shelter will accompany and support the victim through the forensic medical examination process and investigatory interviews and will provide emotional

support, crisis intervention, information, and referrals 24-hours a day. This practice is included in policy OP-030601.

- (f) As noted in the PAQ, the agency/facility is responsible for conducting criminal and administrative sexual abuse investigations.
- (h) The agency always makes a victim advocate from a rape crisis center available to victims, as evidenced by the community questionnaire.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.22 Policies to ensure referrals of allegations for investigations Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard **Auditor Discussion** (a) The agency ensures that an administrative or criminal investigation is completed for all allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment, as evidenced by policy OP-040117, a review of investigation files, and during an interview with the General Counsel designee. According to the PAQ, in the past twelve months, the facility received 18 allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment, of which, 6 resulted in an administrative investigation and 12 were referred for criminal investigations. (b) The agency has in place a policy, OP-030601, to ensure that allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment are referred for investigation to an agency with the legal authority to conduct criminal investigations, unless the allegation does not involve potentially criminal behavior. The agency publishes the policy on its website. The agency documents all such referrals. This was evidenced through interviews with investigators and a review of the agency website. (c) The agency is responsible for conducting criminal investigations. The agency publishes its investigation policy on its website, as verified through a website review.

115.31	Employee training

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

free from sexual abuse and sexual harassment; (4) The right of inmates and employees to be free from retaliation for reporting sexual abuse and sexual harassment; (5) The dynamics of sexual abuse and sexual harassment in confinement; (6) The common reactions of sexual abuse and sexual harassment victims; (7) How to detect and respond to signs of threatened and actual sexual abuse; (8) How to avoid inappropriate relationships with inmates; (9) How to communicate effectively and professionally with inmates, including lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, intersex, or gender nonconforming inmates; and (10) How to comply with relevant laws related to mandatory reporting of sexual abuse to outside authorities. This was evidenced by policy OP-030601, PREA for New Employees curriculum, and review of employee training records, and verified during interviews with random staff.

- (b) Training is tailored to the gender of the inmates at the employee's facility. The employee receives additional training if the employee is reassigned from a facility that houses only male inmates to a facility that houses only female inmates, or vice versa, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, training curriculum and a review of employee training records.
- (c) All current employees are provided with a full, comprehensive PREA training annually or more frequently when policy changes to ensure that all employees know the agency's current sexual abuse and sexual harassment policies and procedures. This was noted in the PAQ and evidenced by a review of employee training records and curriculum.
- (d) The agency documents, through employee signature, that employees understand the training they have received as evidenced by a review of employee training records.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility exceeds compliance with this standard, due to providing staff with a full, comprehensive PREA training on an annual basis.

115.32 Volunteer and contractor training

Auditor Overall Determination: Exceeds Standard

- (a) The agency ensures that all volunteers and contractors who have contact with inmates have been trained on their responsibilities under the agency's sexual abuse and sexual harassment prevention, detection, and response policies and procedures. Volunteers must re-certify PREA training every two years, as evidenced by a review of the PREA training curriculum for contractors and volunteers and volunteer training records. This was verified during interviews with volunteers. The facility does not have any contractors currently.
- (b) All volunteers and contractors who have contact with inmates are notified of the

agency's zero-tolerance policy regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment and informed how to report such incidents, regardless of the services they provide, as evidenced by a review of the PREA training curriculum for contractors and volunteers, and volunteer training records. This was verified during interviews with volunteers.

(c) The agency maintains documentation confirming that volunteers understand the training they have received, as evidenced by a review of training files.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility exceeds compliance with this standard, due to volunteers receiving PREA training every two years.

115.33 Inmate education

Auditor Overall Determination: Exceeds Standard

- (a) During the intake process, inmates receive information explaining the agency's zero-tolerance policy regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment and how to report incidents or suspicions of sexual abuse or sexual harassment, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, observations made during the site review, protocol testing, PREA handbook in English and Spanish, signed acknowledgement forms and verified during interviews with intake staff and random inmates.
- (b) Within 30 days of intake, the agency provides comprehensive education to inmates either in person or through video regarding their rights to be free from sexual abuse and sexual harassment and to be free from retaliation for reporting such incidents, and regarding agency policies and procedures for responding to such incidents, as evidenced by observations made during the site review and signed acknowledgement forms, and verified during interviews with intake staff and random inmates.
- (c) All current inmates have received such education. All inmates receive education upon transfer to a different facility to the extent that the policies and procedures of the inmate's new facility differ from those of the previous facility, as evidenced by policy OP-030601 and review of inmate acknowledgement forms in English and Spanish and verified through interviews with intake staff.
- (d) The agency provides inmate education in formats accessible to all inmates, including those who are limited English proficient, deaf, visually impaired, or otherwise disabled, as well as to inmates who have limited reading skills, as evidenced by policy OP-303601, observations made during the site review, inmate handbooks in English and Spanish, Inmates Guide to Sexual Misconduct, and a review of various inmate education materials. Materials are available in English and Spanish and can be interpreted as needed. PREA information is posted in the window of every cell door for the inmates to view at any time.

- (e) The agency maintains documentation of inmate participation in these education sessions, as evidenced by a review of signed acknowledgement forms.
- (f) In addition to providing such education, the agency ensures that key information is continuously and readily available or visible to inmates through posters in English and Spanish, inmate handbooks in English and Spanish, and Break the Silence PREA information in English and Spanish posted in the window of every cell door for the inmates to view at any time as evidenced by observations made during the site review.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility exceeds compliance with this standard, due to inmates having immediate access to PREA information that is posted in the window of every cell door for the inmates to view at any time.

115.34 | Specialized training: Investigations

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

- (a) In addition to the general training provided to all employees pursuant to § 115.31, the agency ensures that, to the extent the agency itself conducts sexual abuse investigations, its investigators have received training in conducting such investigations in confinement settings, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, investigative staff training curriculum, investigative staff training records, and verified during interviews with investigative staff.
- (b) Specialized training includes techniques for interviewing sexual abuse victims, proper use of Miranda and Garrity warnings, sexual abuse evidence collection in confinement settings, and the criteria and evidence required to substantiate a case for administrative action or prosecution referral, as evidenced by investigative staff training curriculum, investigative staff training records and verified during interviews with investigative staff.
- (c) The agency maintains documentation that agency investigators have completed the required specialized training in conducting sexual abuse investigations, as evidenced by a review of training records.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.35 Specialized training: Medical and mental health care Auditor Overall Determination: Exceeds Standard Auditor Discussion

- a) The agency ensures that all full- and part-time medical and mental health care practitioners who work regularly in its facilities have been trained in (1) How to detect and assess signs of sexual abuse and sexual harassment; (2) How to preserve physical evidence of sexual abuse; (3) How to respond effectively and professionally to victims of sexual abuse and sexual harassment; and (4) How and to whom to report allegations or suspicions of sexual abuse and sexual harassment, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, a review of medical and mental health staff training records and interviews with medical and mental health staff.
- (b) As noted in the PAQ and through interviews with medical staff, medical staff employed by the agency do not conduct forensic examinations.
- (c) The agency maintains documentation that medical and mental health practitioners have received the training, as evidenced by a review of training records. Additionally, medical and mental health staff receive this training annually, exceeding this standard. Medical utilizes a PREA binder that contains all PREA materials, a flow chart to follow during incidents, and the agency policy.
- (d) Medical and mental health care practitioners also receive the training mandated for employees under § 115.31 as evidenced by a review of training records.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility exceeds compliance with this standard, due to medical and mental staff receiving annual training and the development and utilization of the PREA binder.

115.41 Screening for risk of victimization and abusiveness

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

- (a) All inmates are assessed during an intake screening and upon transfer to another facility for their risk of being sexually abused by other inmates or sexually abusive toward other inmates, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, observations made during the site review, and interviews with staff responsible for risk screenings and random inmates.
- (b) Policy OP-030102 states that intake screening takes place upon arrival, as evidenced by a review of intake records and interviews with staff responsible for risk screenings and random inmates.
- (c) Such assessments are conducted using objective screening instruments, as evidenced by a review of cell assessments and self-report forms.
- (d) The intake screening considers, at a minimum, the following criteria to assess inmates for risk of sexual victimization: (1) Whether the inmate has a mental, physical, or developmental disability; (2) The age of the inmate; (3) The physical build

of the inmate; (4) Whether the inmate has previously been incarcerated; (5) Whether the inmate's criminal history is exclusively nonviolent; (6) Whether the inmate has prior convictions for sex offenses against an adult or child; (7) Whether the inmate is or is perceived to be gay, lesbian, bisexual, transgender, intersex, or gender nonconforming; (8) Whether the inmate has previously experienced sexual victimization; (9) The inmate's own perception of vulnerability; and (10) Whether the inmate is detained solely for civil immigration purposes. This was evidenced by a review of the risk screening instruments, medical intake follow-up case notes, observations made during the site review and interviews with staff responsible for risk screenings.

- (e) The initial screening considers prior acts of sexual abuse, prior convictions for violent offenses, and history of prior institutional violence or sexual abuse, as known to the agency, in assessing inmates for risk of being sexually abusive, as evidenced by a review of the risk screening instrument, observations made during the site review and interviews with staff responsible for risk screenings.
- (f) Within a set time period, not to exceed 30 days from the inmate's arrival at the facility, the facility reassesses the inmate's risk of victimization or abusiveness based upon any additional, relevant information received by the facility since the intake screening, as evidenced by policy OP-030102, a review of risk screens and 30-day risk screens, and interviews with staff responsible for risk screenings and random inmates.
- (g) An inmate's risk level is reassessed when warranted due to a referral, request, incident of sexual abuse, or receipt of additional information that bears on the inmate's risk of sexual victimization or abusiveness, as evidenced by policy OP-030102 and cell assessments. This was verified during interviews with staff responsible for risk screenings and random inmates.
- (h) Inmates may not be disciplined for refusing to answer, or for not disclosing complete information in response to, questions asked as evidenced by policy OP-030102 and interviews with staff responsible for risk screenings.
- (i) The agency implements appropriate controls on the dissemination within the facility of responses to questions asked pursuant to this standard in order to ensure that sensitive information is not exploited to the inmate's detriment by staff or other inmates, as evidenced by observations made during the site review and interviews with the PREA Coordinator, PREA Compliance Manager and staff responsible for risk screenings.

115.42	Use of screening information
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion

- (a) The agency uses information from the risk screening required by § 115.41 to inform housing, bed, work, education, and program assignments with the goal of keeping separate those inmates at high risk of being sexually victimized from those at high risk of being sexually abusive, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, risk based housing decisions documents, and interviews with the PREA Compliance Manager and staff responsible for risk screenings.
- (b) The agency makes individualized determinations about how to ensure the safety of each inmate, as evidenced by policy OP-030601 and interviews with staff responsible for risk screenings.
- (c) In deciding whether to assign a transgender or intersex inmate to a facility for male or female inmates, and in making other housing and programming assignments, the agency considers on a case-by-case basis whether a placement would ensure the inmate's health and safety, and whether the placement would present management or security problems, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, bi-yearly assessments, and an interview with the PREA Compliance Manager and transgender inmates.
- (d) Placement and programming assignments for each transgender or intersex inmate is reassessed at least twice each year to review any threats to safety experienced by the inmate, as evidenced by reassessments, interviews with the PREA Compliance Manager and staff responsible for risk screenings.
- (e) A transgender or intersex inmate's own view with respect to his or her own safety is given serious consideration, as evidenced by interviews with the transgender inmates, PREA Compliance Manager and staff responsible for risk screenings.
- (f) Transgender and intersex inmates are given the opportunity to shower separately from other inmates, as evidenced by observations made during the site review, cell assignment documents, and interviews with the transgender inmates, PREA Compliance Manager and staff responsible for risk screenings.
- (g) The agency does not place lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or intersex inmates in dedicated facilities, units, or wings solely on the basis of such identification or status, unless such placement is in a dedicated facility, unit, or wing established in connection with a consent decree, legal settlement, or legal judgment for the purpose of protecting such inmates, as evidenced by observations made during the site review and interviews with the PREA Coordinator, PREA Compliance Manager and transgender inmates.

115.43	Protective Custody
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion

- (a) Inmates at high risk for sexual victimization are not placed in involuntary segregated housing unless an assessment of all available alternatives has been made, and a determination has been made that there is no available alternative means of separation from likely abusers. If a facility cannot conduct such an assessment immediately, the facility may hold the inmate in involuntary segregated housing for less than 24 hours while completing the assessment, as evidenced by policy OP-030601. The PAQ notes that there have not been any inmates at risk of sexual victimization held in involuntary segregated housing in the past 12 months. According to an interview with the Warden, inmates at high risk of sexual victimization are not placed in involuntary segregated housing.
- (b) Inmates placed in segregated housing for this purpose would have access to programs, privileges, education, and work opportunities to the extent possible. If the facility restricts access to programs, privileges, education, or work opportunities, the facility will document (1) The opportunities that have been limited; (2) The duration of the limitation; and (3) The reasons for such limitations. According to an interview with the Warden and staff who supervise inmates in segregated housing, inmates at high risk of sexual victimization are not placed in involuntary segregated housing.
- (c) According to the PAQ and an interview with the Warden and staff who supervise inmates in segregated housing, inmates at high risk of sexual victimization are not placed in involuntary segregated housing.
- (d) According to the PAQ and an interview with the Warden and staff who supervise inmates in segregated housing, inmates at high risk of sexual victimization are not placed in involuntary segregated housing.
- (e) Policy OP-030601 states that every 30 days, the facility will afford each such inmate a review to determine whether there is a continuing need for separation from the general population.

115.51 Inmate reporting

Auditor Overall Determination: Exceeds Standard

Auditor Discussion

(a) The agency provides multiple internal ways for inmates to privately report sexual abuse and sexual harassment, retaliation by other inmates or staff for reporting sexual abuse and sexual harassment, and staff neglect or violation of responsibilities that may have contributed to such incidents, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, inmate handbook in English and Spanish, Inmates Guide to Sexual Misconduct, observations made during the site review, protocol testing, and interviews with random staff and inmates. The facility places a PREA reporting card in each cell window to provide inmates with instant access on how to report a sexual abuse or

sexual harassment, exceeding this standard.

- (b) The agency also provides at least one way for inmates to report abuse or harassment to a public or private entity or office that is not part of the agency, and that is able to receive and immediately forward inmate reports of sexual abuse and sexual harassment to agency officials, allowing the inmate to remain anonymous upon request, as evidenced by policy OP-090124, policy OP-030601, an MOU with Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation (OSBI), observations made during the site review, protocol testing, and interviews with the PREA Compliance Manager and random inmates.
- (c) Staff accept reports made verbally, in writing, anonymously, and from third parties and will promptly document any verbal reports on an incident report, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, observations made during the site review and interviews with random staff and inmates.
- (d) The agency provides a method for staff to privately report sexual abuse and sexual harassment of inmates, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, Sexual Misconduct and Harassment pamphlet, and "Are you in Jeopardy Know PREA" flyers. This was verified by protocol testing and interviews with random staff.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility exceeds compliance with this standard due to placing a PREA reporting card in each cell window to provide inmates with instant access on how to report a sexual abuse or sexual harassment.

115.52 Exhaustion of administrative remedies

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

- (a) The agency has an administrative procedure to address inmate grievances regarding sexual abuse, as evidenced by policy OP-090124.
- (b) Policy OP-090124 allows an inmate to submit a grievance regarding an allegation of sexual abuse at any time, regardless of when the incident is alleged to have occurred. Inmates receive an Inmate Handbook available in English and Spanish that explains the grievance process.
- (c) The agency ensures that (1) An inmate who alleges sexual abuse may submit a grievance without submitting it to a staff member who is the subject of the complaint, and (2) Such grievance is not referred to a staff member who is the subject of the complaint. This was evidenced by policy OP-090124.
- (d) (1) The agency issues a final agency decision on the merits of any portion of a grievance alleging sexual abuse within 90 days of the initial filing of the grievance.
- (2) Computation of the 90-day time period does not include time consumed by

inmates in preparing any administrative appeal. (3) The agency may claim an extension of time to respond, of up to 70 days, if the normal time period for response is insufficient to make an appropriate decision. The agency will notify the inmate in writing of any such extension and provide a date by which a decision will be made. (4) At any level of the administrative process, including the final level, if the inmate does not receive a response within the time allotted for reply, including any properly noticed extension, the inmate may consider the absence of a response to be a denial at that level. This was evidenced by policy OP-090124 and interviews with inmates who reported sexual abuse. According to the PAQ, there have not been any grievances filed that alleged sexual abuse in the past 12 months.

- (e) Policy OP-090124 addresses (1) Third parties, including fellow inmates, staff members, family members, attorneys, and outside advocates, are permitted to assist inmates in filing requests for administrative remedies relating to allegations of sexual abuse, and are permitted to file such requests on behalf of inmates. (2) If a third party files such a request on behalf of an inmate, the facility may require as a condition of processing the request that the alleged victim agree to have the request filed on his or her behalf and may also require the alleged victim to personally pursue any subsequent steps in the administrative remedy process. (3) If the inmate declines to have the request processed on his or her behalf, the agency will document the inmate's decision. This was evidenced by observations made during the site review and protocol testing.
- (f) (1) The agency established procedures, policy OP-090124, for the filing of an emergency grievance alleging that an inmate is subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse. (2) After receiving an emergency grievance alleging an inmate is subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse, the agency immediately forwards the grievance (or any portion thereof that alleges the substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse) to a level of review at which immediate corrective action may be taken, will provide an initial response within 48 hours, and will issue a final agency decision within 5 calendar days. The initial response and final agency decision documents the agency's determination whether the inmate is a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse and the action taken in response to the emergency grievance. The PAQ notes that there have not been any grievances alleging substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse filed in the past 12 months.
- (g) The agency has a written policy, OP-090124 that limits its ability to discipline an inmate for filing a grievance alleging sexual abuse to occasions where the agency demonstrates that the inmate filed the grievance in bad faith. As noted in the PAQ, in the past 12 months, the facility has not received any inmate grievances alleging sexual abuse that resulted in disciplinary action by the agency against the inmate for having filed the grievance in bad faith.

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

- (a) The facility provides inmates with access to outside victim advocates for emotional support services related to sexual abuse by giving inmates mailing addresses and telephone numbers, including toll-free hotline numbers where available, victim advocacy or rape crisis organizations. The facility enables reasonable communication between inmates and these organizations and agencies, in as confidential a manner as possible, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, Inmate Handbook in English and Spanish, Advocacy Services Posting, OSP Advocacy Brochure, observations made during the site review, protocol testing, community questionnaire, MOU with Safe Haven Domestic Violence Shelter, MOU with Jackson County Memorial Hospital, and interviews with random inmates and inmates who reported sexual abuse. PREA phone numbers do not require inmates to enter PIN numbers.
- (b) The facility informs inmates, prior to giving them access, of the extent to which such communications will be monitored and the extent to which reports of abuse will be forwarded to authorities in accordance with mandatory reporting laws, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, observations made during the site review and interviews with random inmates and inmates who reported sexual abuse.
- (c) The agency maintains an MOU with Safe Haven Domestic Violence Shelter and an MOU with Jackson County Memorial Hospital to provide inmates with confidential emotional support services related to sexual abuse.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard Auditor Discussion (a) The agency has an established method to receive third-party reports of sexual abuse and sexual harassment, as evidenced by a third-party reporting poster, observations made during the site review and protocol testing. The agency also posts on their website information on how to report sexual abuse and sexual harassment on behalf of an inmate, as evidenced by a review of the agency's website. Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.61	Staff and agency reporting duties
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

- (a) The agency requires all staff to report immediately and according to agency policy any knowledge, suspicion, or information regarding an incident of sexual abuse or sexual harassment that occurred in a facility, whether or not it is part of the agency; retaliation against inmates or staff who reported such an incident; and any staff neglect or violation of responsibilities that may have contributed to an incident or retaliation, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, Break the Silence Poster, observations made during the site review, protocol testing and interviews with random staff.
- (b) Apart from reporting to designated supervisors or officials, staff are not to reveal any information related to a sexual abuse report to anyone other than to the extent necessary, as specified in agency policy OP-030601, to make treatment, investigation, and other security and management decisions, as evidenced by interviews with random staff.
- (c) Medical and mental health practitioners are required to report sexual abuse and to inform inmates of the practitioner's duty to report, and the limitations of confidentiality, at the initiation of services, as evidenced by interviews with medical and mental health staff and review of medical and mental health supporting documentation.
- (d) The facility does not detain inmates under the age of 18.
- (e) The facility reports all allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment, including third-party and anonymous reports, to the facility's designated investigators, as evidenced by an interview with the Warden and a review of investigation reports.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.62 Agency protection duties

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

(a) When the agency learns that an inmate is subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse, it takes immediate action to protect the inmate, as evidenced by policy OP-030601. As noted in the PAQ, there have been no instances in the last 12 months where the facility has determined that an inmate was subject to a substantial risk of imminent sexual abuse. This was evidenced by interviews with the General Counsel designee, the Warden and random staff, and a review of investigation files.

115.63 Reporting to other confinement facilities

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

- a) Upon receiving an allegation that an inmate was sexually abused while confined at another facility, the head of the facility that received the allegation will notify the head of the facility or appropriate office of the agency where the alleged abuse occurred, as evidenced by policy OP-030601. The PAQ notes that in the past 12 months there have been no allegations received that an inmate was abused while confined at another facility.
- (b) Such notification will be provided as soon as possible, but no later than 72 hours after receiving the allegation, as evidenced by policy OP-030601.
- (c) According to the PAQ, the agency would document that it has provided such notification, should the situation arise.
- (d) The facility head or agency office that receives such notification will ensure that the allegation is investigated in accordance with these standards, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, PREA notification email correspondence and interviews with the General Counsel designee and the Warden.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.64 Staff first responder duties

Auditor Overall Determination: Exceeds Standard

Auditor Discussion

(a) Upon learning of an allegation that an inmate was sexually abused, the first security staff member to respond to the report are required to: (1) Separate the alleged victim and abuser; (2) Preserve and protect any crime scene until appropriate steps can be taken to collect any evidence; (3) If the abuse occurred within a time period that still allows for the collection of physical evidence, request that the alleged victim not take any actions that could destroy physical evidence, including, as appropriate, washing, brushing teeth, changing clothes, urinating, defecating, smoking, drinking, or eating; and (4) If the abuse occurred within a time period that still allows for the collection of physical evidence, ensure that the alleged abuser does not take any actions that could destroy physical evidence, including, as appropriate, washing, brushing teeth, changing clothes, urinating, defecating, smoking, drinking, or eating. This is evidenced by policy OP-030601, investigation reports, and interviews with security staff and non-security staff first responders and inmates who reported sexual abuse. During interviews with staff first responders, staff produced a PREA response card that they carry on their possession that contain first responder

duties, exceeding this standard.

(b) If the first staff responder is not a security staff member, the responder is required to request that the alleged victim not take any actions that could destroy physical evidence, and then notify security staff, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, review of incident reports and interviews with security and non-security staff first responders and random staff.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility exceeds compliance with this standard, due to providing staff with a first responder duties wallet card that provides staff with an instant response to a sexual abuse allegation.

Auditor Overall Determination: Exceeds Standard Auditor Discussion (a) The facility developed a written institutional plan to coordinate actions taken in response to an incident of sexual abuse, among staff first responders, medical and mental health practitioners, investigators, and facility leadership, as evidenced by a review of the OSR PREA coordinated response plan, OSR PREA local procedure and an interview with the Warden. The coordinated response plan and local procedures are updated annually or upon staff changes, and the plan and procedure are very detailed and specific to position and duty, exceeding this standard. Based on the evidence presented, the facility exceeds compliance with this standard, due to the coordinated response plan and local procedures being updated annually or upon staff changes, and the plan and procedure are very detailed and specific to

Preservation of ability to protect inmates from contact with abusers Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard Auditor Discussion (a) The agency has not entered into any collective bargaining agreements, as evidenced during an interview with the General Counsel designee. Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.67 Agency protection against retaliation

position and duty.

Auditor Overall Determination: Exceeds Standard

Auditor Discussion

- (a) The agency has established a policy, OP-030601, to protect all inmates and staff who report sexual abuse or sexual harassment or cooperate with sexual abuse or sexual harassment investigations from retaliation by other inmates or staff. The agency has designated a staff member, the Deputy Warden, that is charged with monitoring retaliation.
- (b) The agency employs multiple protection measures, such as housing changes or transfers for inmate victims or abusers, removal of alleged staff or inmate abusers from contact with victims, and emotional support services for inmates or staff who fear retaliation for reporting sexual abuse or sexual harassment or for cooperating with investigations, as evidenced by interviews with the General Counsel designee, Warden, designated staff charged with monitoring retaliation and inmates who reported sexual abuse. Investigation files were reviewed.
- (c) For at least 90 days following a report of sexual abuse, the agency will monitor the conduct and treatment of inmates or staff who reported the sexual abuse and of inmates who were reported to have suffered sexual abuse to see if there are changes that may suggest possible retaliation by inmates or staff and will act promptly to remedy any such retaliation. The agency will continue such monitoring beyond 90 days if the initial monitoring indicates a continuing need. This was evidenced by policy OP-030601 and interviews with the Warden and designated staff charged with monitoring retaliation. The PAQ notes that in the past 12 months no retaliation has occurred. In review of investigation files, it became evident that the facility monitors for retaliation on every allegation made even if retaliation is not suspected.
- (d) In the case of inmates, such monitoring will also include periodic status checks, as evidenced by an interview with the designated staff charged with monitoring retaliation and a review of investigation files.
- (e) If any other individual who cooperates with an investigation expresses a fear of retaliation, the agency will take appropriate measures to protect that individual against retaliation, as evidenced by interviews with the General Counsel designee and the Warden.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility exceeds compliance with this standard due to the facility monitoring for retaliation on every allegation made even if retaliation is not suspected.

115.68	Post-allegation protective custody
	Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard
	Auditor Discussion

(a) Any use of segregated housing to protect an inmate who is alleged to have suffered sexual abuse is subject to the requirements of § 115.43. The agency policy OP-030601 prohibits the placement of inmates who allege to have suffered sexual abuse in involuntary segregated housing unless an assessment of all available alternatives has been made and a determination has been made that there is no available alternative means of separation from likely abusers, as evidenced by a review of investigation files and interviews with the Warden and staff who supervise segregated housing. At time of audit, there were no inmates being held in segregated housing for risk of sexual victimization or who allege to have suffered sexual abuse. As noted in the PAQ, no inmates who alleged to have suffered sexual abuse were held in involuntary segregated housing in the past 12 months.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.71 Criminal and administrative agency investigations

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

- (a) The agency conducts its own investigations into allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment promptly, thoroughly, and objectively for all allegations, including third-party and anonymous reports, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, a review of investigation files and through interviews with investigators. The investigators are highly trained sworn law enforcement officers.
- (b) During the interview, investigators stated that when sexual abuse is alleged, the agency uses investigators who have received special training in sexual abuse investigations pursuant to § 115.34, as evidenced by a review of training certificates found in 115.34.
- (c) Investigators stated during interview that they gather and preserve direct and circumstantial evidence, including any available physical and DNA evidence and any available electronic monitoring data; interview alleged victims, suspected perpetrators, and witnesses; and review prior complaints and reports of sexual abuse involving the suspected perpetrator. This was evidenced by a review of investigation reports.
- (d) When the quality of evidence appears to support criminal prosecution, the agency conducts compelled interviews only after consulting with prosecutors as to whether compelled interviews may be an obstacle for subsequent criminal prosecution, as evidenced by an interview with investigators and a review of investigation files.
- (e) During interviews with investigators and inmates who reported sexual abuse, the credibility of an alleged victim, suspect, or witness is assessed on an individual basis and will not be determined by the person's status as inmate or staff. The agency will not require an inmate who alleges sexual abuse to submit to a polygraph examination

or other truth-telling device as a condition for proceeding with the investigation of such an allegation.

- (f) Investigators stated that administrative investigations (1) will include an effort to determine whether staff actions or failures to act contributed to the abuse; and (2) will be documented in written reports that include a description of the physical and testimonial evidence, the reasoning behind credibility assessments, and investigative facts and findings. This was evidenced by observations made during the site review and a review of administrative investigation reports.
- (g) Criminal investigations are documented in a written report that contains a thorough description of physical, testimonial, and documentary evidence and attaches copies of all documentary evidence where feasible, as evidenced by interviews with investigators, observations made during the site review and a review of criminal investigation reports.
- (h) Substantiated allegations of conduct that appear to be criminal are referred for prosecution. According to the PAQ, one substantiated allegation of conduct that appeared to be criminal was referred for prosecution. This was evidenced by a review of investigation files and interviews with investigators.
- (i) The agency retains all written reports for as long as the alleged abuser is incarcerated or employed by the agency, plus five years, as evidenced by policy OP-040117, observations made during the site review and a review of investigation files.
- (j) The departure of the alleged abuser or victim from the employment or control of the facility or agency will not provide a basis for terminating an investigation, as evidenced by interviews with investigators.
- (I) The agency does not use outside investigators to conduct administrative or criminal sexual abuse investigations.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.72 Evidentiary standard for administrative investigations

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

(a) The agency imposes no standard higher than a preponderance of the evidence in determining whether allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment are substantiated, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, a review of investigation files and interviews with investigators.

115.73 Reporting to inmates

Auditor Overall Determination: Exceeds Standard

Auditor Discussion

- (a) Following an investigation into an inmate's allegation that he or she suffered sexual abuse in an agency facility, the agency informs the inmate as to whether the allegation has been determined to be substantiated, unsubstantiated, or unfounded. Additionally, the facility provides a notification of outcome not only to the victim, but to the alleged aggressor and witnesses as well, exceeding this standard, as evidenced by a review of notification of investigation status reports contained within the investigation files. This was verified by interviews with the Warden, investigators and inmates who reported sexual abuse.
- (b) The agency is responsible for conducting administrative and criminal investigations.
- (c) Following an inmate's allegation that a staff member has committed sexual abuse against the inmate, the agency will subsequently inform the inmate (unless the agency has determined that the allegation is unfounded) whenever (1) The staff member is no longer posted within the inmate's unit; (2) The staff member is no longer employed at the facility; (3) The agency learns that the staff member has been indicted on a charge related to sexual abuse within the facility; or (4) The agency learns that the staff member has been convicted on a charge related to sexual abuse within the facility as evidenced by policy OP-030601, Notification of Investigation Status forms, a review of investigation reports, and interviews with inmates who reported sexual abuse.
- (d) Following an inmate's allegation that he or she has been sexually abused by another inmate, the agency will subsequently inform the alleged victim whenever (1) The agency learns that the alleged abuser has been indicted on a charge related to sexual abuse within the facility; or (2) The agency learns that the alleged abuser has been convicted on a charge related to sexual abuse within the facility, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, notification of outcome forms and interviews with inmates who reported sexual abuse.
- (e) All such notifications or attempted notifications are documented, as evidenced by policy OP-030601 and a review of notification of Investigation Status forms.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility exceeds compliance with this standard due to providing all victims, alleged aggressors and witnesses with a notification of outcome.

115.76 Disciplinary sanctions for staff Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

- (a) Staff will be subject to disciplinary sanctions up to and including termination for violating agency sexual abuse or sexual harassment policy OP-030601.
- (b) Termination will be the presumptive disciplinary sanction for staff who have engaged in sexual abuse. According to the PAQ, in the past 12 months, one staff from the facility violated agency sexual abuse or sexual harassment policies. Investigation file was reviewed.
- (c) Disciplinary sanctions for violations of agency policies relating to sexual abuse or sexual harassment (other than actually engaging in sexual abuse) will be commensurate with the nature and circumstances of the acts committed, the staff member's disciplinary history, and the sanctions imposed for comparable offenses by other staff with similar histories, as evidenced by policy OP-030601. According to the PAQ, in the past 12 months, no staff from the facility has been disciplined, short of termination, for violation of agency sexual abuse or sexual harassment policies.
- (d) All terminations for violations of agency sexual abuse or sexual harassment policies, or resignations by staff who would have been terminated if not for their resignation, will be reported to law enforcement agencies, unless the activity was clearly not criminal, and to any relevant licensing bodies, as evidenced by policy OP-030601. According to the PAQ, in the past 12 months, one staff from the facility have been reported to law enforcement or licensing boards following their termination (or resignation prior to termination) for violating agency sexual abuse or sexual harassment policies. Investigation file was reviewed.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.77 Corrective action for contractors and volunteers

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

Auditor Discussion

- (a) Any contractor or volunteer who engages in sexual abuse will be prohibited from contact with inmates and be reported to law enforcement agencies (unless the activity was clearly not criminal) and to relevant licensing bodies, as evidenced by policy OP-030601. The PAQ notes that in the past 12 months, no contractors or volunteers were reported to law enforcement for engaging in sexual abuse of inmates.
- (b) The facility will take appropriate remedial measures and consider whether to prohibit further contact with inmates, in the case of any other violation of agency sexual abuse or sexual harassment policies by a contractor or volunteer, as evidenced by policy OP-030601 and an interview with the Warden.

115.78 **Disciplinary sanctions for inmates** Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard **Auditor Discussion** (a) Inmates will be subject to disciplinary sanctions pursuant to a formal disciplinary process following an administrative finding that the inmate engaged in inmate-oninmate sexual abuse, as evidenced by policy OP-030601. According to the PAQ, in the past 12 months, no administrative or criminal findings of inmate-on-inmate sexual abuse have occurred at the facility. (b) Sanctions will be commensurate with the nature and circumstances of the abuse committed, the inmate's disciplinary history, and the sanctions imposed for comparable offenses by other inmates with similar histories, as evidenced by a review of investigation reports and an interview with the Warden. (c) The disciplinary process will consider whether an inmate's mental disabilities or mental illness contributed to his or her behavior when determining what type of sanction, if any, should be imposed, as evidenced by a review of investigation reports and an interview with the Warden. (d) The facility offers therapy, counseling, or other interventions designed to address and correct underlying reasons or motivations for the abuse. The facility does not require the offending inmate to participate in such interventions as a condition of access to programming or other benefits, as evidenced by interviews with medical and mental health staff. (e) According to the PAQ, the agency may discipline an inmate for sexual contact with staff only upon a finding that the staff member did not consent to such contact. (f) For the purpose of disciplinary action, a report of sexual abuse made in good faith based upon a reasonable belief that the alleged conduct occurred will not constitute falsely reporting an incident or lying, even if an investigation does not establish evidence sufficient to substantiate the allegation, as evidenced by policy OP-030601.

(g) Per policy OP-060125, the agency prohibits all sexual activity between inmates and may discipline inmates for such activity. The agency may not, however, deem such activity to constitute sexual abuse if it determines that the activity is not coerced.

- (c) This provision does not apply as the facility is not a jail.
- (d) According to policy OP-030601, any information related to sexual victimization or abusiveness that occurred in an institutional setting will be strictly limited to medical and mental health practitioners and other staff, as necessary, to inform treatment plans and security and management decisions, including housing, bed, work, education, and program assignments, or as otherwise required by Federal, State, or local law, as evidenced by observations made during the site review.
- (e) Medical and mental health practitioners will obtain informed consent from inmates before reporting information about prior sexual victimization that did not occur in an institutional setting, as evidenced by interviews with medical and mental health staff.

115.82 Access to emergency medical and mental health services

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

- (a) Inmate victims of sexual abuse will receive timely, unimpeded access to emergency medical treatment and crisis intervention services, the nature and scope of which are determined by medical and mental health practitioners according to their professional judgment, as evidenced by a review of additional medical/mental health secondary materials describing access to emergency medical treatment and crisis intervention services, and interviews with medical and mental health staff and inmates who reported sexual abuse.
- (b) If no qualified medical or mental health practitioners are on duty at the time a report of recent abuse is made, security staff first responders will take preliminary steps to protect the victim pursuant to § 115.62 and will immediately notify the

appropriate medical and mental health practitioners, as evidenced by a review of investigation files and interviews with security and non-security staff first responders.

- (c) Inmate victims of sexual abuse while incarcerated will be offered timely information about and timely access to emergency contraception and sexually transmitted infections prophylaxis, in accordance with professionally accepted standards of care, where medically appropriate, as evidenced by a review of additional medical/mental health secondary materials and interviews with medical and mental health staff and inmates who reported sexual abuse.
- (d) Treatment services will be provided to the victim without financial cost and regardless of whether the victim names the abuser or cooperates with any investigation arising out of the incident, as evidenced by policy OP-140118.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

115.83

Ongoing medical and mental health care for sexual abuse victims and abusers

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

- (a) The facility offers medical and mental health evaluation and, as appropriate, treatment to all inmates who have been victimized by sexual abuse in any prison, jail, lockup, or juvenile facility, as evidenced by policy OP-030601 and observations made during the site review.
- (b) The evaluation and treatment of such victims will include, as appropriate, followup services, treatment plans, and, when necessary, referrals for continued care following their transfer to, or placement in, other facilities, or their release from custody, as evidenced by interviews with medical and mental health staff and a review of secondary documentation.
- (c) The facility will provide such victims with medical and mental health services consistent with the community level of care, as evidenced by interviews with medical and mental health staff and a review of secondary documentation.
- (d) This provision does not apply as the facility is an all-male facility.
- (e) This provision does not apply as the facility is an all-male facility.
- (f) Inmate victims of sexual abuse while incarcerated will be offered tests for sexually transmitted infections as medically appropriate, as evidenced by policy OP-140118, a review of secondary documentation that demonstrate victims were offered tests for sexually transmitted infections as medically appropriate, and interviews with inmates who reported sexual abuse.

- (g) Treatment services will be provided to the victim without financial cost and regardless of whether the victim names the abuser or cooperates with any investigation arising out of the incident, as evidenced by policy OP-140118 and interviews with inmates who reported sexual abuse.
- (h) The facility will attempt to conduct a mental health evaluation of all known inmate-on-inmate abusers within 60 days of learning of such abuse history and offer treatment when deemed appropriate by mental health practitioners, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, review of secondary documentation, and interviews with medical and mental health staff.

115.86 Sexual abuse incident reviews

Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard

- (a) The facility will conduct a sexual abuse incident review at the conclusion of every substantiated and unsubstantiated sexual abuse investigation, including where the allegation has not been substantiated, unless the allegation has been determined to be unfounded, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, incident reviews and a review of completed investigation reports. According to the PAQ, in the past 12 months, there have been 18 criminal and/or administrative investigations of alleged sexual abuse completed at the facility, excluding unfounded incidents.
- (b) Such a review will ordinarily occur within 30 days of the conclusion of the investigation, as evidenced by sexual abuse incident reviews.
- (c) The review team will include upper-level management officials, with input from line supervisors, investigators, and medical or mental health practitioners, as evidenced by policy OP-030601, a review of completed incident reviews, and an interview with the Warden.
- (d) According to interviews with the Warden, PREA Compliance Manager and incident review team members, the review team will (1) Consider whether the allegation or investigation indicates a need to change policy or practice to better prevent, detect, or respond to sexual abuse; (2) Consider whether the incident or allegation was motivated by race; ethnicity; gender identity; lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or intersex identification, status, or perceived status; or gang affiliation; or was motivated or otherwise caused by other group dynamics at the facility; (3) Examine the area in the facility where the incident allegedly occurred to assess whether physical barriers in the area may enable abuse; (4) Assess the adequacy of staffing levels in that area during different shifts; (5) Assess whether monitoring technology should be deployed or augmented to supplement supervision by staff; and (6) Prepare a report of its findings, and any recommendations for improvement and submit such

report to the Warden and PREA Compliance Manager, as evidenced by a review of sexual abuse incident reviews.

(e) According to the PAQ, the facility will implement recommendations for improvement or will document its reasons for not doing so, as evidenced by a review of incident reviews.

Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.

(d) The agency maintains, reviews, and collects data as needed from all available incident-based documents, including reports, investigation files, and sexual abuse incident reviews, as evidenced by policy OP-030601. (e) The agency does not contract with private facilities for the confinement of its inmates. (f) The agency has provided the Department of Justice (DOJ) with data from the previous calendar year upon request, as evidenced by annual reports. Based on the evidence presented, the facility is in compliance with this standard.
