Oklahoma Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) 2024 Data

The goal of Oklahoma Early Hearing Detection & Intervention (EHDI) is to improve outcomes through newborn screening, early diagnosis, and intervention for children with hearing loss. To accomplish this, Oklahoma EHDI uses the 1-3-6 guidelines.

1 MONTH

SCREENING

ALL INFANTS SHOULD HAVE A HEARING SCREENING BY 1 MONTH OF AGE

3 MONTHS

EVALUATION

IF THE INFANT DOES NOT PASS TWO HEARING SCREENINGS, A DIAGNOSTIC HEARING EVALUATION IS NEEDED BY 3 MONTHS OF AGE

6 MONTHS

EARLY INTERVENTION

IF A HEARING LOSS IS DETECTED, TREATMENT AND INTERVENTION SHOULD BE STARTED BY 6 MONTHS OF AGE

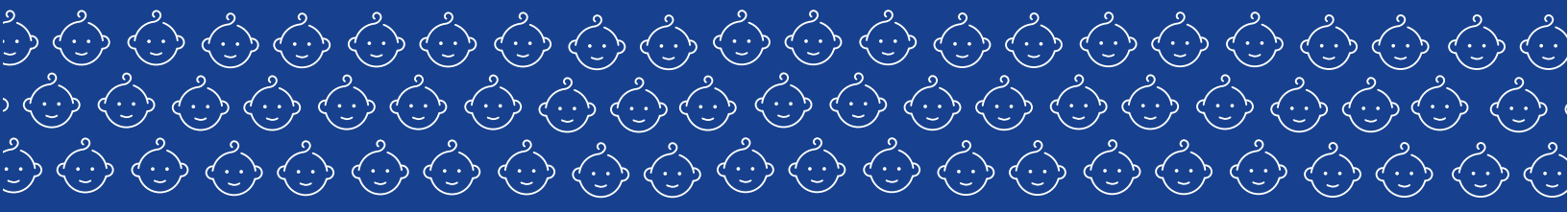

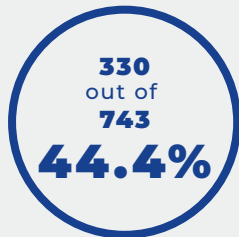
3 MONTHS



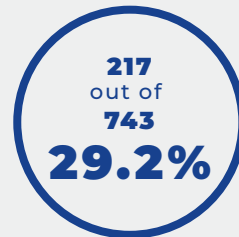
Permanent hearing loss: Infants who did not pass their hearing screen and were diagnosed with permanent hearing loss



Typical hearing: Infants who did not pass their hearing screen but repeat testing indicated normal hearing



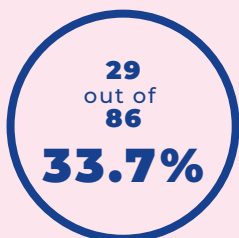
Completed evaluation by 3 months of age: Infants that did not pass their hearing screen and completed a diagnostic evaluation by 3 months of age



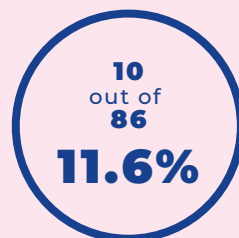
Lost to follow up: Number of infants that did not pass their hearing screen and no repeat testing information was received

* The difference between the number of babies who didn't pass the hearing test and the total number counted in follow-up categories (like typical hearing, permanent hearing loss, or were lost to follow up) may be explained due to the following reasons: infant death, parent refusal for additional testing, unable to complete diagnostic testing due to medical constraints, and testing still in process.

INCIDENCE OF HEARING LOSS PER 1,000 INFANTS SCREENED IN OKLAHOMA: 1.86 PER 1,000
