

Microgrants FAQ

Updated 3.30.26

1. We are a mobile wound care company based in OK/Tulsa Counties BUT serving the entire state of Oklahoma and we are expanding to add telehealth and/or remote patient monitoring in hopes of partnering with rural hospitals and clinics. We need funding for telehealth software and supplies - would we be eligible to apply for this funding for this purpose?
 - a. Per the NOFO, applicants must be located in a Rural Oklahoma County – or have a branch in a Rural County where said branch is to be the recipient of the microgrant investment. Rural Counties are defined as all counties except for Tulsa County and Oklahoma County (pg. 5).
2. Once the funding has been awarded - how will it be distributed and what would that timeline look like?
 - a. Per the NOFO, this is a reimbursement-based award. Award recipients are expected to cover eligible costs upfront and then submit documentation to OSDH for reimbursement. If there are extenuating circumstances that would prevent the applicant from participating in a reimbursement-based program, please specify them in the body of the application (pg. 4-5).
 - b. Notice of Awards will be issued in late May-early June, and contracts will be executed as soon as possible following NOAs. Once you receive a signed contract, you may begin billing to your award/making purchases.
3. Are there reporting requirements since these are one-time grants? If there are, what would those requirements be and for how long would the reporting need to take place?
 - a. Per the NOFO, please see Attachment B Subrecipient Responsibilities (pg. 3). More details will be shared with applicants once awarded.
4. In collaborating with other states, several have developed a vendor directory of related services, or a means of connecting interested parties to collaborate on joint proposals. If Oklahoma has this, please let us know of the process.
 - a. At this time, we are not providing a vendor directory. This NOFO is open to the public and only to entities within Oklahoma.
5. Is office equipment permissible to purchase? Printer or laminator for printing materials?
 - a. Per the NOFO, Applicants should focus on one-time investments that can make an immediate and meaningful difference in healthcare access, outcomes, and whole-person health. Please see the NOFO: “Funding Uses” (p. 6) for more information on allowable and unallowable costs.

6. If your nonprofit is a mobile unit and goes to multiple counties in the state, can we still apply for those separate counties?
 - a. Per the NOFO, applicants must be currently providing services in Oklahoma, be located in a Rural Oklahoma County – or have a branch in a Rural County where said branch is to be the recipient of the microgrant investment. Rural Counties are defined as all counties except for Tulsa County and Oklahoma County (pg. 6).
 - b. Per the NOFO, if an Eligible Applicant serves more than one Rural County, it may apply for awards for more than one county, up to five counties total, for a maximum aggregate potential award of \$250,000 in base award funds and \$250,000 in supplemental award funds, if applicable. Multi-county applications will be evaluated and awarded on a county-by-county basis. Proposed activities and investments must be able to stand alone within each county in the event an applicant is awarded funding for some, but not all, requested counties (pg. 6)
7. It was mentioned in the overall rural health grant webinar that organizations who aren't located in a rural county may still be eligible if the majority of the people they serve are from rural counties. Does this extend to the microgrants that will be available?
 - a. Per the NOFO, applicants must be located in a Rural Oklahoma County – or have a branch in a Rural County where said branch is to be the recipient of the microgrant investment. Rural Counties are defined as all counties except for Tulsa County and Oklahoma County (pg. 5).
8. Our facility has existing clinical monitoring equipment that requires a one-time perpetual software license upgrade to enable additional clinical parameters. This is a single purchase with a fixed cost, not a recurring subscription, annual renewal, or Software-as-a-Service (SaaS) arrangement. The license upgrade is purchased once and remains with the equipment for its useful life, similar to purchasing a hardware module. Under the Prohibited and Restricted Funding Uses section, the NOFO states that "ongoing maintenance or subscription costs" are not permissible. Would a one-time, perpetual software license upgrade for existing clinical equipment, purchased as a single transaction with no recurring fees, be considered an allowable use of microgrant funds? Or does the restriction on subscription costs extend to all software purchases regardless of payment structure?
 - a. Per the NOFO, Applicants should focus on one-time investments that can make an immediate and meaningful difference in healthcare access, outcomes, and whole-person health. Please see the NOFO: "Funding Uses" (p. 6) for more information on allowable and unallowable costs.

9. Does Data Modernization or electronic case reporting fall under this category?
 - a. Per the NOFO, Applicants should focus on one-time investments that can make an immediate and meaningful difference in healthcare access, outcomes, and whole-person health. Please see the NOFO: “Funding Uses” (p. 6) for more information on allowable and unallowable costs.
10. The NOFA states that OSDH anticipates allocating one award of up to \$50,000 in each of the 75 Rural Counties in Oklahoma. Is this a hard and fast rule, or will the committee break up a grant to several agencies.
 - a. Per the NOFO, OSDH anticipates allocating one award of up to \$50,000 in each of the 75 Rural Counties in Oklahoma; this includes all counties except for Tulsa County and Oklahoma County (pg. 4).
11. Is it acceptable for several agencies to collaborate and submit one grant proposal that may encompass doing several different things?
 - a. Agencies may collaborate and submit one proposal, but the lead applicant must meet all entity requirements (UEI number, insurance, etc.). Please ensure to read the NOFO and follow all application requirements.
12. What is the minimum and Maximum award amount?
 - a. Per the NOFO, \$50,000-\$250,000 in base awards (depending on the number of counties applied for and awarded). Please see the NOFO for further information (pg. 4).
13. If a facility has multiple needs is it advised to send them all as one request or send each individually?
 - a. An entity may submit one or more application(s) based upon their needs. One application can cover up to five counties. Please see the NOFO for more information.
14. Quotes for medical equipment can take a week or more to get back. Is it mandatory to have these quotes sent with the application or can they be attached later? If so, do we use an estimated cost initially?
 - a. Per the NOFO, consistent with 2 CFR § 200.320, successful applicants will be required to obtain price or rate quotations from at least three qualified sources for applicable purchases (pg. 7).
15. Could an eligible municipality who lacks adequate pressure and flow for their water system and is need of a larger water tower apply for a one-time purchase of the construction of a water tower? Better health and wellness outcomes are 1) providing adequate pressure and flow to support the fire suppression system requirements of our school system (inside the municipality), 2) ensuring adequate water supply for citizens of the community.

- a. Per the NOFO, new construction is unallowable. Supplanting (replacing) funding for in-process or planned construction projects or directing funding towards new construction builds is also unallowable (pg. 7).
16. Our health system serves 3 counties and we are seeking funding for PACS integration with our older X-ray machines in our 4 RHC clinics. We estimate the cost will be north of \$80K. This would enable us to more efficiently store X-rays along with improve TAT's for reads. Is this something that could be funded through the Microgrants?
- a. Per the NOFO, if an Eligible Applicant serves more than one Rural County, it may apply for awards for more than one county, up to five counties total, for a maximum aggregate potential award of \$250,000 in base award funds and \$250,000 in supplemental award funds, if applicable. Multi-county applications will be evaluated and awarded on a county-by-county basis. Proposed activities and investments must be able to stand alone within each county in the event an applicant is awarded funding for some, but not all, requested counties (pg. 6).
17. We are seeking to apply for \$15K to purchase a telemedicine cart to support IP Neuro & Cardiology for our CAH (AllianceHealth Madill) is this something that could be covered by a microgrant?
- a. Per the NOFO, Applicants should focus on one-time investments that can make an immediate and meaningful difference in healthcare access, outcomes, and whole-person health. Please see the NOFO: "Funding Uses" (p. 6) for more information on allowable and unallowable costs.
18. We are seeking to bring IP Dialysis to our CAH (AllianceHealth Madill) where we will need 2 Tablo machines to support the program. We estimate the two machines will cost \$120K. Our goal is to improve access to care while at the same time ensuring patients who need dialysis treatment can receive it in their community. Is this something that could be covered under the microgrant?
- a. Per the NOFO, Applicants should focus on one-time investments that can make an immediate and meaningful difference in healthcare access, outcomes, and whole-person health. Please see the NOFO: "Funding Uses" (p. 6) for more information on allowable and unallowable costs.
19. Are State Government agencies eligible for the Microgrants?
- a. Per the NOFO, non-profits, independent healthcare providers, local government entities (including Counties and School Districts), and tribal governments are also eligible to apply (pg. 6).
20. Good afternoon, our Town Administrator is unable to attend. Will a copy of this webinar be available after it is over?

21. We have 2 quotes for Mobile rural health clinics and one quote for a modular unit that would be used for a clinic. Could these count as our 3 required quotes even though they are different options for a moveable type, non-permanent clinic?
- a. Per the NOFO, consistent with 2 CFR § 200.320, successful applicants will be required to obtain price or rate quotations from at least three qualified sources for applicable purchases.
22. You said 50k per county. So, if the county hospital applies for funds and the county EMS applies for funds do we have to split that 50K.
- a. Per the NOFO, OSDH anticipates allocating one award of up to \$50,000 in each of the 75 Rural Counties in Oklahoma; this includes all counties except for Tulsa County and Oklahoma County (pg. 4).
23. When you say you must be "located" in these counties, do you mean registered with the State of Oklahoma, or could a national-based organization maintain a location in the county and be eligible?
- a. Per the NOFO, an entity must be currently providing services in Oklahoma, be located in a Rural Oklahoma County – or have a branch in a Rural County where said branch is to be the recipient of the microgrant investment. Rural Counties are defined as all counties except for Tulsa County and Oklahoma County. Please see NOFO for further eligibility requirements (pg. 5).
24. If your organization is based in Tulsa or Oklahoma County, but you provide services in rural communities, would they be eligible to apply?
- a. Per the NOFO, applicants must be located in a Rural Oklahoma County – or have a branch in a Rural County where said branch is to be the recipient of the microgrant investment. Rural Counties are defined as all counties except for Tulsa County and Oklahoma County (pg. 5).
25. If the top scoring applicant in a county request less than \$50k, would a second award be made, even if partial?
- a. Per the NOFO, OSDH anticipates allocating one award of up to \$50,000 in each of the 75 Rural Counties in Oklahoma.
26. If an organization serves more than 5 counties and since awards are not guaranteed, can an organization apply for more than 5 counties (for example apply for all the counties they serve) but will only be eligible to be awarded up to 5 awards? or is application limited to 5 applications.
- a. An entity may submit more than 1 application; however each application is limited to 5 counties. Per the NOFO, multi-county applications will be evaluated and awarded on a county-by-county basis. Proposed activities and investments must be able to stand alone within each county in the event an

applicant is awarded funding for some, but not all, requested counties (pg. 6).

27. Are indirect / administrative costs allowable? If so, is there a maximum percentage?
 - a. Yes, indirect/administrative costs are allowed. You will need to provide your federally approved indirect rate letter. Per the NOFO, personnel and fringe expenses are unallowable (pg. 7).
28. Would the cost of training associated with the implementation of a new technology be an allowable use of the funds, as long as spent in the time frame proposed?
 - a. Per the NOFO, Applicants should focus on one-time investments that can make an immediate and meaningful difference in healthcare access, outcomes, and whole-person health. Please see the NOFO: “Funding Uses” (p. 6) for more information on allowable and unallowable costs.
29. If my agency provides services to rural clients in their homes and via telehealth but we are located in Tulsa County, can we apply for funding that will support health education in those counties?
 - a. Per the NOFO, applicants must be located in a Rural Oklahoma County – or have a branch in a Rural County where said branch is to be the recipient of the microgrant investment. Rural Counties are defined as all counties except for Tulsa County and Oklahoma County (pg. 5).
30. Is this only available for 5013c non profits?
 - a. No, per the NOFO we anticipate a majority of applicants will be non-profits, we are intentionally not making this a requirement to allow for entities such as independent healthcare provider practices to be eligible to apply. Local government entities, including Counties and School Districts, are eligible to apply. Tribal governments are also eligible to apply (pg. 6). Please refer to the NOFO for further eligibility requirements.
31. Do you have examples of what the funds could be used for?
 - a. Per the NOFO, examples include: purchase or refurbishment of clinical diagnostic equipment, clinical access infrastructure, such as telehealth carts, wellness enablers, such as fitness and sports equipment, Installable equipment or fixtures that can be purchased and attached with minimal labor, health education and promotion materials, targeted sub-contractor support for carrying out the planned investment (e.g., graphic design support for health education or promotion materials) (pg.6-7).
32. Are higher Education entities eligible for the grant?
 - a. Yes, per the NOFO we anticipate a majority of applicants will be non-profits, we are intentionally not making this a requirement to allow for entities such as independent healthcare provider practices to be eligible to apply. Local

government entities, including Counties and School Districts, are eligible to apply. Tribal governments are also eligible to apply (pg. 6). Please refer to the NOFO for further eligibility requirements.

33. Our interest is in applying for the microgrant towards the initial investment of a Mobile Rural Health Clinic van. Does this violate the unallowable clinic services that duplicate billable services? It would be for the actual van not the services provided by the unit.

- a. Per the NOFO, the purchase or refurbishment of clinical diagnostic equipment or Clinical access infrastructure, such as telehealth carts, are allowable (pg.7).
- b. Per the NOFO, Applicants should focus on one-time investments that can make an immediate and meaningful difference in healthcare access, outcomes, and whole-person health. Please see the NOFO: “Funding Uses” (p. 6) for more information on allowable and unallowable costs

34. Will applications from federal facilities be accepted?

- a. Yes, per the NOFO we anticipate a majority of applicants will be non-profits, we are intentionally not making this a requirement to allow for entities such as independent healthcare provider practices to be eligible to apply. Local government entities, including Counties and School Districts, are eligible to apply. Tribal governments are also eligible to apply (pg. 6). Please refer to the NOFO for further eligibility requirements.

36. Can more than one proposal be submitted by the same entity?

- a. An entity may submit more than 1 application; however, each application is limited to 5 counties. Per the NOFO, multi-county applications will be evaluated and awarded on a county-by-county basis. Proposed activities and investments must be able to stand alone within each county in the event an applicant is awarded funding for some, but not all, requested counties (pg. 6).

37. Can you give some examples of what the funds can be used for in equipment?

Dental maybe?

- a. Per the NOFO, examples include: purchase or refurbishment of clinical diagnostic equipment, clinical access infrastructure, such as telehealth carts, wellness enablers, such as fitness and sports equipment, Installable equipment or fixtures that can be purchased and attached with minimal labor, health education and promotion materials, targeted sub-contractor

support for carrying out the planned investment (e.g., graphic design support for health education or promotion materials) (pg.6-7).

38. What is an OK supplier and how do we register?

- a. An entity must be registered as a supplier with the state of Oklahoma to receive funding. To learn more, please visit: [Supplier Portal](#).

39. Where do we apply for UEI?

- a. You can apply for a UEI number on www.SAM.gov.

40. Are Public Schools able to be the applicant?

- a. Yes, per the NOFO we anticipate a majority of applicants will be non-profits, we are intentionally not making this a requirement to allow for entities such as independent healthcare provider practices to be eligible to apply. Local government entities, including Counties and School Districts, are eligible to apply. Tribal governments are also eligible to apply (pg. 6). Please refer to the NOFO for further eligibility requirements.

41. If you are an entity who provides healthcare related services in Oklahoma and has staff in Oklahoma, but whose business entity is not based in Oklahoma, are you still eligible to apply for a microgrant to extend the impact of your work?

- a. Per the NOFO, applicants must be currently providing services in Oklahoma, be located in a Rural Oklahoma County – or have a branch in a Rural County where said branch is to be the recipient of the microgrant investment. Rural Counties are defined as all counties except for Tulsa County and Oklahoma County and provide services to communities with populations of 55,000 or fewer residents (see second tab within Attachment A) (pg. 5). Please see the NOFO for further eligibility requirements.

42. I heard a national speaker says funds had to be allocated by 10/2026 but then actually spent by awardee by 9/30/2027. Is OK choosing a shorter timeframe for this specific NOFO? Will other NOFOs have the same time frame?

- a. Per the NOFO, this is a one-time funding opportunity for RHTP Year One funds. OSDH anticipates future microgrant NOFOs in Years 2-5 and/or renewal periods on awarded microgrants, subject to the availability of funds. Please check the RHT Program Funding webpage for future NOFO possibilities.

43. The Oklahoma Department of Corrections is asking if we can use these funds for health facilities in Oklahoma prisons?

- a. Please refer to the NOFO for allowable and unallowable costs. The funds are intended for one-time purchases that will benefit the broader community's health.

44. Is the funding only available to non-profit organizations?

- a. Per the NOFO, we anticipate a majority of applicants will be non-profits, we are intentionally not making this a requirement to allow for entities such as independent healthcare provider practices to be eligible to apply. Local government entities, including Counties and School Districts, are eligible to apply. Tribal governments are also eligible to apply (pg. 6). Please refer to the NOFO for further eligibility requirements.
45. I understand each county is going to get an award- is that award going to just 1 organization or multiple organizations
- a. Per the NOFO, OSDH anticipates allocating one award of up to \$50,000 in each of the 75 Rural Counties in Oklahoma; this includes all counties except for Tulsa County and Oklahoma County (pg. 4).
46. Was this recorded so I can watch again

47. Would this cover adding ADA compliance gear to a minivan that will be used to shuttle individuals to and from food pantries?
- a. Yes, per the NOFO, Installable equipment or fixtures that can be purchased and attached with minimal labor is allowable (pg. 7).
 - b. Per the NOFO, Applicants should focus on one-time investments that can make an immediate and meaningful difference in healthcare access, outcomes, and whole-person health. Please see the NOFO: “Funding Uses” (p. 6) for more information on allowable and unallowable costs
48. The active certificate of insurance is what kind of insurance? Does that mean liability or physical structure insurance?
- a. Please refer to Attachment E: Subrecipient Terms and Conditions Section 5. To open the Subrecipient Terms and Conditions file, you will need to download Attachment E on the RHT Program Funding webpage. All documents for Attachment E are linked in the “File Access” column.
49. Who do we need to get a letter of support from?
- a. Per the NOFO, applicants should include at least one letter of support from a community organization, association, or local government entity located in the county that the proposed investment will be serving (pg.11).
50. Does the grant permit expenses for healthcare-related education, training programs, professional certifications, or upskilling activities?
- a. Per the NOFO, Applicants should focus on one-time investments that can make an immediate and meaningful difference in healthcare access, outcomes, and whole-person health. Please see the NOFO: “Funding Uses” (p. 6) for more information on allowable and unallowable costs.
51. Will future microgrant opportunities be available in future funding years/rounds?

- a. Per the NOFO, OSDH anticipates future microgrant NOFOs in Years 2-5 and/or renewal periods on awarded microgrants, subject to the availability of funds (pg. 4).
52. What will remainder of \$200 million fed funds be used for in first year if only \$50k per county or \$250K for five counties be used for.
- a. The RHTP Program covers a wide array of initiatives, including this microgrant opportunity. We encourage you to explore our website to learn more about the initiatives and to stay tuned for additional funding opportunities.
53. Would you approve two different applications if the total of both combined is under \$50,000?
- a. Per the NOFO, OSDH anticipates allocating one award of up to \$50,000 in each of the 75 Rural Counties in Oklahoma; this includes all counties except for Tulsa County and Oklahoma County. If an applicant provides services in more than one county, they may apply for awards in up to five counties for a maximum aggregate potential award of \$250,000 in base award funds (see multi-county applications section below) (pg. 4).
54. An OKC-based NPO that serves rural counties can apply for \$50K directly to and for up to 5 counties it serves. Is that correct?
- a. Per the NOFO, if an Eligible Applicant serves more than one Rural County, it may apply for awards for more than one county, up to five counties total, for a maximum aggregate potential award of \$250,000 in base award funds and \$250,000 in supplemental award funds, if applicable. Multi-county applications will be evaluated and awarded on a county-by-county basis. Proposed activities and investments must be able to stand alone within each county in the event an applicant is awarded funding for some, but not all, requested counties (pg. 6)
55. Would improvements to EMS/Fire dispatching and tracking be a considered use for the grant?
- a. Per the NOFO, Applicants should focus on one-time investments that can make an immediate and meaningful difference in healthcare access, outcomes, and whole-person health. Please see the NOFO: “Funding Uses” (p. 6) for more information on allowable and unallowable costs
56. If applying for more than one county, should we submit an application for each county individually or submit one unified application referencing each county to be served?
- a. Per the NOFO, if an Eligible Applicant serves more than one Rural County, it may apply for awards for more than one county, up to five counties total, for a maximum aggregate potential award of \$250,000 in base award funds and

\$250,000 in supplemental award funds, if applicable. Multi-county applications will be evaluated and awarded on a county-by-county basis. Proposed activities and investments must be able to stand alone within each county in the event an applicant is awarded funding for some, but not all, requested counties (pg. 6)

57. If you apply for this portion of the grant, do you still have the option to apply in other areas.
- a. Yes, an entity may apply for microgrant funding and remain eligible to apply for other future RHTP opportunities that are applicable.
58. How does the nonsavable online application support a request/proposal for funding for multiple counties. For example, if one entity has a presence in 5 counties and wants to apply for each, does that entity need to submit 5 separate applications or one that includes all 5. And if just one, is the application set up clearly to accommodate up to 5 separate requests under one application?
- a. Only one application is required to request funding for up to five counties. An entity can outline details for each county in the application. Please refer to the “Multi-County applications” in the NOFO on pg. 6.
59. Do you have to complete full registration for the UEI or the portion to register for financial assistance only.
- a. Per the NOFO, applicants must have an active Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) and maintain an active registration in SAM.gov throughout the application, review, and award period. The registration process is described here: [Entity Registration | SAM.gov](#). Timelines for registration for a UEI vary significantly. Applicants must not be suspended, debarred, or otherwise excluded from participating in federally funded programs or activities (pg. 5). A UEI obtained for financial assistance only is acceptable.
60. If applying for multiple counties, do we submit an application for each county individually or submit one unified application referencing all counties to be served?
- a. Only one application is required to request funding for up to five counties. The application is set-up so that an entity can delineate plans for each county.
61. Is a Public School able to be the lead applicant?
- a. Per the NOFO, we anticipate a majority of applicants will be non-profits, we are intentionally not making this a requirement to allow for entities such as independent healthcare provider practices to be eligible to apply. Local government entities, including Counties and School Districts, are eligible to apply. Tribal governments are also eligible to apply (pg. 6). Please refer to the NOFO for further eligibility requirements.

62. If an organization is applying for funding in two neighboring counties and has two distinct projects (each serving a different county with different activities and equipment), should the organization submit two separate applications (one per project) or submit a single application that includes both counties and clearly differentiates the projects within the narrative and budget? Additionally, if submitting a single application, should the budget be combined or separated by county?
- a. An applicant should submit distinct applications for distinct projects/purchases. If a project/purchase is being replicated in multiple counties, please submit one application. For the latter scenario with a single application, the budget will be separated by county, and the applicant will have the opportunity to delineate within the application.
63. Are animal welfare services a qualifying service that would meet the grant requirements?
- a. Per the NOFO, we anticipate a majority of applicants will be non-profits, we are intentionally not making this a requirement to allow for entities such as independent healthcare provider practices to be eligible to apply. Local government entities, including Counties and School Districts, are eligible to apply. Tribal governments are also eligible to apply (pg. 6). Please refer to the NOFO for further eligibility requirements.
64. How does the non-savable online application support a request/proposal for funding for multiple counties? For example, if one entity has a presence in 5 counties and wants to apply for each, does that entity need to submit 5 separate applications or one that includes all 5. And if just one, is the application set up clearly to accommodate up to 5 separate requests under one application?
- a. Only one application is required to request funding for up to five counties. The application is set-up so that an entity can delineate plans for up to 5 counties.
65. Can the Oklahoma Department of Corrections apply for our medical facilities?
- a. Per the NOFO, we anticipate a majority of applicants will be non-profits, we are intentionally not making this a requirement to allow for entities such as independent healthcare provider practices to be eligible to apply. Local government entities, including Counties and School Districts, are eligible to apply. Tribal governments are also eligible to apply (pg. 6). Please refer to the NOFO for further eligibility requirements.
66. If we purchased a large item prior to the award date, but it was an item that would be financed until October 2026. could funds be used for balance remaining on the equipment?

- a. Per the NOFO, pre-award costs incurred before award date are not allowable (pg. 7).
67. Our service area includes several counties; however, the service we are looking to fund with the microgrant would be housed at one centralized, eligible location for all patients to utilize. Would we be eligible for a funding request for all counties served, or just where the service is located.
- a. Per the NOFO, applicants must be currently providing services in Oklahoma, be located in a Rural Oklahoma County – or have a branch in a Rural County where said branch is to be the recipient of the microgrant investment. 68. Is the Kickapoo Health Care or Kickapoo Tribe eligible to apply directly? Or subaward only?

Should the parent company be the applicant or the LLC which holds the lease where the equipment would be placed?

79. We will be applying for five counties. Could attachments be combined not to exceed 250 MB per file? Thank you.
- a. Yes, they can be combined as long as the file does not exceed 250MB.
80. Will you please share an example or template for the SRQ? Thank you.

- a. Per the NOFO, OSDH anticipates allocating one award of up to \$50,000 in each of the 75 Rural Counties in Oklahoma; this includes all counties except for Tulsa County and Oklahoma County. If an applicant provides services in

more than one county, they may apply for awards in up to five counties for a maximum aggregate potential award of \$250,000 in base award funds (see multi-county applications section below) (pg.4).

86. We are applying for the RHTP Microgrant for a location in Custer County. Our organization operates under two related LLCs. The parent LLC employs all staff, manages all finances, and has an active SAM.gov registration and UEI. The subsidiary LLC holds the lease on the building where the equipment investment would be made. The parent LLC actively provides physical therapy services at this location. Should the parent LLC apply as the entity with a branch in Custer County, or must the application be submitted under the subsidiary LLC as the lease-holder of the building?

- a. Per the NOFO, applicants must have an active Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) and maintain an active registration in SAM.gov throughout the application, review, and award period (pg. 6).
 - b. We serve Mayes County, covering 684 square miles (655 land, 28 water). Through auto mutual aid agreements, we assist Wagoner County EMS in the Younkers Area south of Locust Grove, since our route provides better access. Similarly, we support Cherokee County EMS in a small area east of Locust Grove where we can respond more efficiently.

93. If we apply for more than one county, let say 5. That means we could ask for \$250,000. Suppose that we are only approved for 3 counties, meaning we could only get \$150,000. Will it affect our chances of getting this grant since we turned in a bid for \$250,000. Or do you just submit your proposed budget now and bids later if you are approved?
- a. 94. I would like to know more about the timing and structure of future NOFOs. I have a well-developed idea to improve rural diagnosis of coronary disease that aligns well with overall intention of Oklahoma's RHTP plan but may be better viewed as integrating several Oklahoma RHTP goals rather than fitting neatly into one goal. Specifically, this proposal could be viewed as contributing substantially to 3 goals (value-based care, chronic disease management, and provider collaborative network development) and also contributing to telehealth expansion and as part of the overall project we would need to further develop and facilitate EHR

interoperability. We know that coronary disease is a major problem in rural Oklahoma. So, I would very much like to talk to someone about how to approach optimizing the possibility of funding for this project that aligns well with the overall thrust of the OKLAHOMA RHTP plan. With this project proposal, I am not sure how to deal with the fact that it does not fit easily into one of the goals but could be viewed as serving many goals. Could I talk with someone, please?

Do you agree?
