


# **NOWATA COUNTY** DRUG OVERDOSE HOSPITALIZATIONS<sup>†</sup> (2019-2021)




- **56%** of hospitalizations were unintentional and **39%** due to self harm.
- Drug overdose hospitalization rates decreased 27% from 83.8 per 100,000 (2016-2018) to 61 per 100,000 (2019-2021).
- Non-Hispanic American Indian Nowata County residents had the highest rate of hospitalizations.
