1. Q: Is it too late to be included in the Respirator Fit Testing-Train the Trainer grant?

2. Q: How can we get the information provided in today's call?

A: The call recordings, Key Guidance and Agendas, and Q&A documents are posted on the LTC COVID-19 Provider Calls and Q&As webpage by the end of the following week, usually on Wednesday. You may also contact LTC if you have any questions.

- 3. Q: If a resident is moving in as a new resident, and there are no positive cases of COVID, they test on day 1, 3 and 5, correct? Do they quarantine for that time frame?
 - A: The current recommendations can be located in the CDC Interim Infection Prevention and Control Recommendations for Healthcare Personnel During the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) Pandemic, revised 09/23/22. They updated the recommendations for testing frequency to detect potential for variants with shorter incubation periods and to address the risk for false negative antigen tests in people without symptoms. It was also updated to note that, in general, asymptomatic patients no longer require empiric use of Transmission-Based Precautions following close contact with someone with SARS-CoV-2 infection. The Perform SARS-CoV-2 Viral Testing section reads in parts, "...
 - Asymptomatic patients with close contact with someone with SARS-CoV-2 infection should have a series of three viral tests for SARS-CoV-2 infection. Testing is recommended immediately (but not earlier than 24 hours after the exposure) and, if negative, again 48 hours after the first negative test and, if negative, again 48 hours after the second negative test. This will typically be at day 1 (where day of exposure is day 0), day 3, and day 5...
 - The yield of screening testing for identifying asymptomatic infection is likely lower when performed on those in counties with lower levels of SARS-CoV-2 community transmission.



However, these results might continue to be useful in some situations (e.g., when performing higher-risk procedures or for HCP caring for patients who are moderately to severely immunocompromised) to inform the type of infection control precautions used (e.g., room assignment/cohorting, or PPE used) and prevent unprotected exposures. If implementing a screening testing program, testing decisions should not be based on the vaccination status of the individual being screened. To provide the greatest assurance that someone does not have SARS-CoV-2 infection, if using an antigen test instead of a NAAT, facilities should use 3 tests, spaced 48 hours apart..."

The Duration of Empiric Transmission-Based Precautions for Asymptomatic Patients following Close Contact with Someone with SARS-CoV-2 Infection section reads in part,

"In general, asymptomatic patients do not require empiric use of Transmission-Based Precautions while being evaluated for SARS-CoV-2 following close contact with someone with SARS-CoV-2 infection. These patients should still wear source control and those who have not recovered from SARS-CoV-2 infection in the prior 30 days should be tested as described in the testing section..."

- 4. Q: Is testing required on a resident returning to ALF from SNF or admitting from LTC?
 - A: Consider what your policies say. Would this resident be considered an admission or readmission? What is the facility's testing policy for admissions or readmissions?
- 5. Q: COVID variant XBB.1.5 and other strains circulating in Oklahoma. Something to be concerned about in adult day care facilities?
 - A: These are all COVID-19 variant strains. XBB.1.5 is believed to be highly transmissible and many expect it to be become the dominant variant in the United States. Monitoring the CDC County Transmission Levels of your county should help you determine your risks.
- 6. Q: Can the aides go to OKC OSDH building to renew their licenses?
 - A: Yes, an aide can come to the Central office and <u>turn in</u> an application with fee to the finance window (open daily between 2:30pm-4:00pm). Our finance department processes payments only and then delivers the application to Nurse Aide Registry for certification renewal. This process can take anywhere from 3-5 business days depending on holiday schedule, office closures etc. It is important to note that the certification will NOT be processed the day it is delivered to OSDH like it has been historically.
- 7. Q: If we have done the training in the past, do we need to repeat the IDR training?
 - A: If you have currently been an active participant in the IDR process, you should not have to retake the training. If you have not currently been an active participant in the IDR process, you may need



to retake the training. If interested in participating on the IDR panel, send an email to LTC@health.ok.gov and we can discuss your training needs.
