- The 10th annual OkMOM will be held February 1-2, 2019 at the Oklahoma State Fairground Expo Hall. Doors open at 5am. (*It is first come, first serve so many people get in line the night before.*)
- Previous years OKMOM has been located in Tulsa, OKC, McAlester, Lawton, Enid, Tulsa, OKC, Woodward, Durant, OKC.
 - Up Next: Tulsa, Stillwater
- No insurance. No Payment. No Identification. No Questions asked.
- The event is a fully-functional dental facility, offering a variety of services including: cleanings, fillings, extractions, and anterior root canals.
- Appointments will not be taken.
- Event organizers plan to treat approximately 1,000 children and adults each day, however, this number is subject to change depending on supplies, time and volunteers.
- NO narcotic medications will be dispensed at OkMOM.

- If you enter a home and you think that the animal is being abused or neglected immediately call your local animal control or police department.
- You can remain anonymous
- For assistance with animals such as: animal food, dog houses, low-cost clinics, getting animals spayed or neutered contact your local animal shelter for resources.
- Wal-Mart often gives items that have been damaged in shipment to those requesting them or local animal shelters. You can contact your local Wal-Mart for more details.
- To report abuse contact your local animal control/police department or if you are in the OKC metro call 405-297-2255. *Please see attachment*

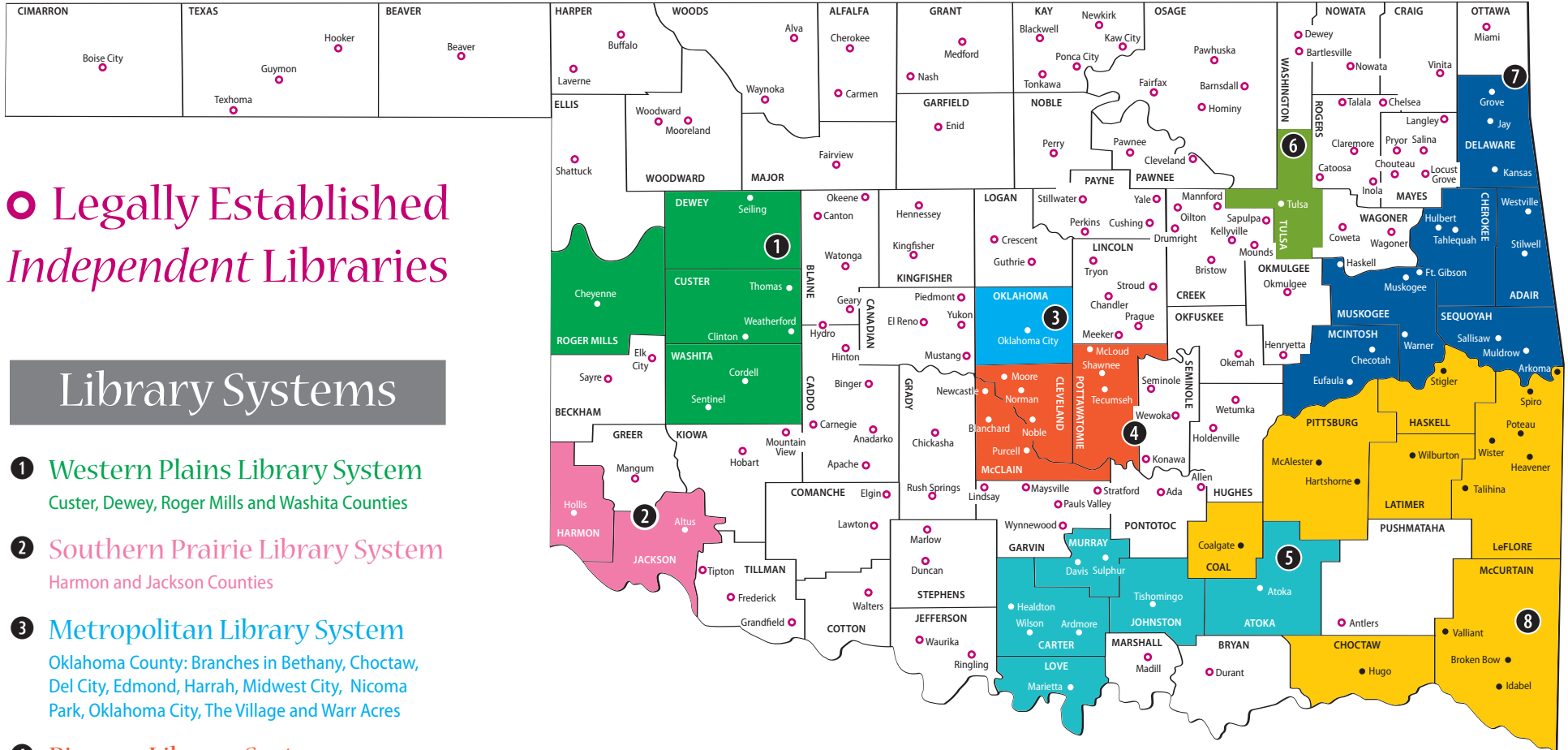

DOGS

- ▶ Types of aggression
 - Dominance Aggression
 - Dogs are social animals and need to belong to a "pack"
 - If a dog perceives his/her hierarchy ranking to be higher than yours
 - Fear Motivated Aggression
 - Is a defensive reaction that occurs when a dog believes he/she is in danger of being harmed
 - Protective, Territorial and Possessive Aggression
 - Is associated with defense of property, the dog's "pack," food, toys or any other item the dog values
 - Redirected Aggression
 - Provoked by someone or something but can't attack it so it turns its aggression to someone or something else

DOGS

▶ What can you do?

- If you aren't scared of dogs:
 - Ask your patient to introduce you to their dog
 - Allow the dog to sniff your hand so they understand you are a friend
 - Have patient remove items that cause aggression (ie: food, toys, other animals or people)
 - Ask patient to muzzle the animal while you are there
 - Ask patient to confine dog to another room or in a kennel during your visit
- If you ARE scared of dogs:
 - Ask patient to confine dog to another room or in a kennel during your visit

Dogs

▶ What you should NOT do

- Do not reach over their heads to pet them
- Do not punish the animal or take his/her toys, food or other item being protected
- Do not try to dominate the dog because it could lead him/her to escalate the negative behavior
- Do not encourage aggressive games such as wrestling or tug-of-war

Dogs

▶ How to protect yourself from an attack

- Stay calm
- Do not yell or kick at the animal
- Avoid direct eye contact
- Stand slightly sideways to make yourself a smaller target
- Place something in between you and the dog
- Examples include: an umbrella, a chair, a cane, your uplifted knee
- Blow a whistle to distract the dog
- Carry / throw treats to distract the dog

CATS

- ▶ Types of aggression
 - Play Aggression
 - Gets too excited while playing and becomes over zealous resulting in scratches and bites
 - Don't pet me anymore Aggression
 - For whatever reason the cat no longer wants to be petted
 - Fearful/Defensive Aggression
 - Cat is scared and believes it needs to defend itself
 - Redirected Aggression
 - Provoked by someone or something but can't attack it so it turns its aggression to someone or something else

CATS

- ▶ What can you do?
 - If you aren't scared of cats:
 - Ask your patient to introduce you to their cat
 - Have patient remove items that cause aggression (ie: food, toys, other animals or people)
 - Ask patient to confine cat to another room or in a kennel during your visit
 - If you ARE scared of cats:
 - Ask patient to confine cats to another room or in a kennel during your visit

CATS

- ▶ What you should NOT do
 - Never try to handle a cat that is agitated or scared
 - Ears back against their head, tail tucked,
 - Do not punish the animal or take his/her toys, food or other item being protected
 - Do not encourage aggressive games such as wiggling of your fingers or feet to try and get them to pounce on you
