BURDEN OF ELECTRONIC VAPOR PRODUCTS IN OKLAHOMA YOUTH

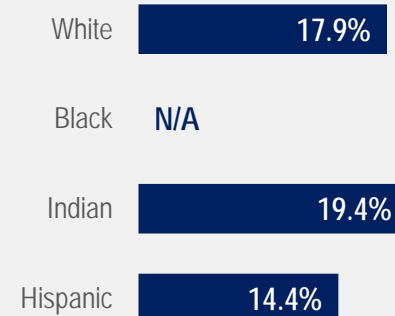


In 2017, approximately 26,000 high school students in Oklahoma were using electronic vapor products (EVP)

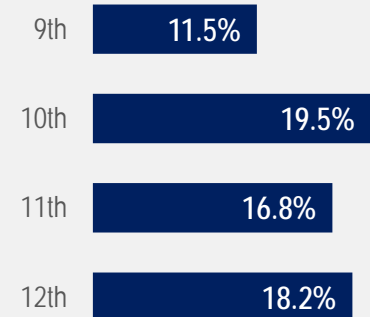
That's about 1 out of every 6 youth



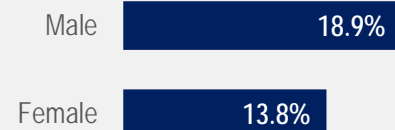

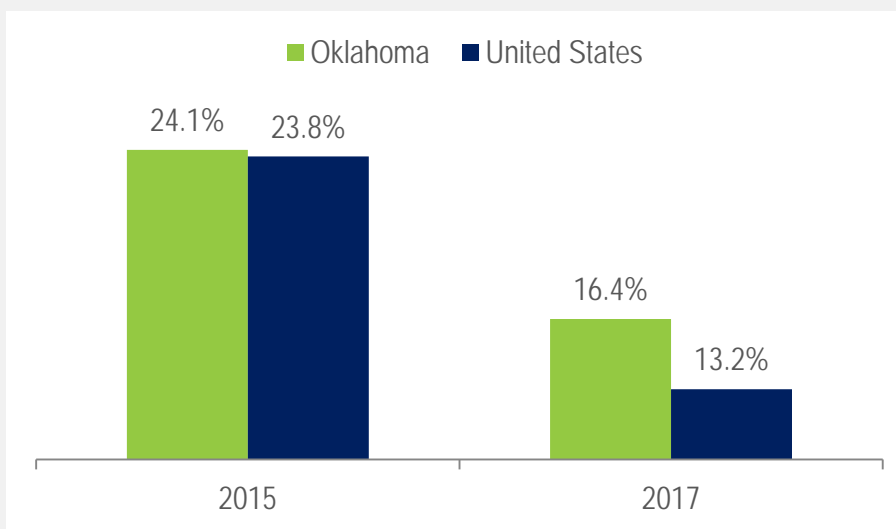

YRBS 2019 DATA: BURDEN OF EVP IN OKLAHOMA YOUTH

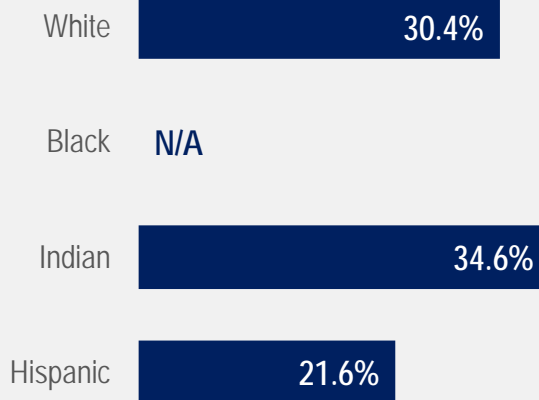
In 2019, **27.8%** of Oklahoma high school students reported using electronic vapor products

Note: National 2019 YRBS has not been released yet, hence US comparison and ranking data is not currently available. However, the current use of EVPs nationally is also expected to go up from 13.2% in 2017 to align with the national trend (27.5%) that was seen in another school-based survey, National Youth Tobacco Survey (NYTS) 2019 data [released](#) by the CDC earlier in December 2019.

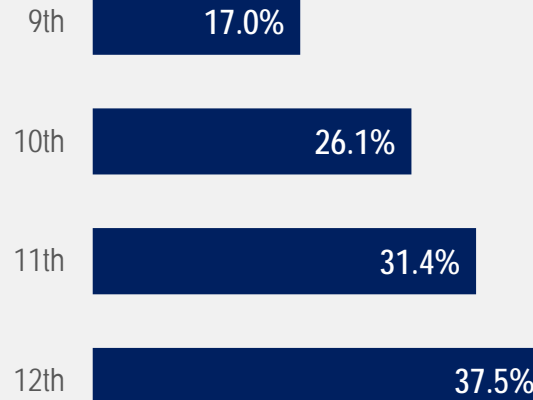
