## Minutes of the Oklahoma Corporation Commission State of Oklahoma

March 28, 2023 – 1:30 p.m.

These are the minutes for the Corporation Commission's ("Commission") regular meeting conducted in accordance with the Open Meeting Act on March 28, 2023, in Room 301 of the Commission's principal offices at the Jim Thorpe Office Building, 2101 North Lincoln Boulevard, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73105. Archived Commission meeting recordings may be accessed on the Commission's website.

The notice and agenda for the meeting were publicly posted at the principal offices of the Commission at the Jim Thorpe Office Building, 2101 North Lincoln Boulevard, Oklahoma City, 73105, at 1:30 p.m. March 24, 2023, by Commission employees acting under the direction of Chairman J. Todd Hiett. The notice and agenda are also made available to the public on the Commission's website, oklahoma.gov/occ. A copy of the notice and agenda is attached to these minutes as Appendix A.

Chairman Hiett called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m.

Members present were Chairman Todd Hiett, Vice Chairman Bob Anthony, and Commissioner Kim David. A quorum of the Commission was present. Interested persons participated in the meeting in person or by teleconference/videoconference when and as authorized.

<u>Consideration of and Possible Vote(s) on Proposed or Potential Orders in Cases on 24-hour Signing Agenda Docket</u> The 24-hour signing agenda of proposed orders was presented by Ms. Cummings. The Commissioners unanimously approved the proposed orders.

Summary of and possible discussion on recent Transportation Division activity for motor carrier enforcement, ports of entry, and weigh stations, including the number of vehicles processed and screened, the dollar amounts, numbers, and types of citations issued recently and comparisons to prior periods, and the base jurisdictions involved as listed by state—Deputy General Counsel Darren Ferguson or/and Deputy General Counsel Michael Copeland Commissioner Hiett announced the agenda item. Darren Ferguson, deputy general counsel, was recognized to provide an update.

Ferguson, deputy general counsel, who gave procedural information, reviewed the draft amendments for Chapter 5 Rules of Practice and facilitated the discussion. The forum was open for all those participating to give their input. Discussion was held. Mr. Ferguson requested a motion be made to adopt the proposed final rules with the revisions suggested by Commissioners' staff.

The forum was open for all those participating to give their input. Discussion was held. Ms. Case requested a motion be made to adopt the proposed final rules.

<u>Permanent Rulemaking of the Oklahoma Corporation Commission Amending OAC 165:55</u>, <u>Telecommunications Services</u> Ken Behrens, deputy general counsel, gave procedural information, and made introductions. Mr. Behrens and Mark Argenbright, director of the public utility division, reviewed the draft amendments for Chapter 55 Telecommunications Services and facilitated the discussion. The forum was open for all those participating to give their input. Discussion was held. Mr. Behrens requested a motion be made to adopt the proposed final rules with the exceptions suggested by Commissioners' staff.

Mr. Behrens and Mr. Argenbright reviewed the draft amendments for Chapter 59 Oklahoma Universal Service and Oklahoma Lifeline and facilitated the discussion. The forum was open for all those participating to give their input. Discussion was held. Commissioner Anthony exited the room at 3:13 p.m. and reentered at 3:18 p.m. Mr. Behrens requested a motion be made to adopt the proposed final rules.

#### **Submitted by Corporation Commissioner Bob Anthony:**

Status update, consideration and discussion regarding the First Semi-Annual True-Up Adjustment for Ratepayer-Backed Bonds issued under the OCC's Securitization Order Nos. 722254, 723033 and 723434 in OCC Cause Nos. PUD 202100072, 202100079, and 202100076, respectively.

The Final Financing Orders for Oklahoma Gas & Electric Company, Oklahoma Natural Gas Company and Public Service Company of Oklahoma each specified that "the WES Charge will be adjusted (or trued-up) semi-annually." (See "Frequency of True-Ups and Reconciliation" paragraphs on pages 8, 9 and 8 of the above-referenced orders, respectively.) It has been six months or more since each utility's bonds were issued.

The orders also each specified that "the ODFA and the Utility will submit to the Commission, by submitting to PUD, a final accounting of their respective issuance costs." Depending on whether those "actual issuance costs" were less or more than "the issuance costs included in the principal amount financed," the orders each specified that "the revenue requirement for the first semi-annual true-up adjustment" be corrected accordingly. (See paragraph 58 on page 25, paragraph 13 on page 28, and paragraph 79 on page 25 of the above-referenced orders, respectively.)

OCC PUD received the required "Issuance Advice Letters" signed by the utility and the president of the ODFA reporting that, in total, the "Actual Issuance Costs" for these three utilities' bond sales exceeded \$38 million, all of which are being passed through to ratepayers.

On February 24, 2023, I issued "For Deliberations: Commissioner Bob Anthony Questions Millions in Cost Discrepancies" in OCC Case Nos. PUD 2022-000057, 2022-000077, 2022-000089 and 2022-000093

(https://public.occ.ok.gov/WebLink/DocView.aspx?id=13468654), pointing out inconsistencies, omissions and outright contradictions between the "Actual Issuance Costs"

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for each utility's bond sale as reported in the "Issuance Advice Letters" and the "Statement of Approval of Professional Fees" used by the State Treasurer's Office to officially approve payment of these costs.

I also noted significant and substantial discrepancies between certain banks' and law firms' original RFP bid amounts and what they were actually paid for their services. Specifically, I questioned how the underwriters came to be paid significantly more than their bids to perform the work submitted in their RFP responses, including (by my math) one underwriter that was paid more than \$500,000 more and another that was paid \$1.6 million more than the bid amounts they agreed to work for!

In short, the discrepancies I identified are worth millions of dollars to ratepayers.

Consideration, discussion of and possible vote(s) on potential remedies in the absence of complete and satisfactory explanations to the issues raised above. Commissioner Anthony announced the agenda item. Discussion was held. No action was taken.

New Business There was no new business.
