

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

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

It's important to remove crop residues, weeds, thatch and volunteer plants by either disposing of them in a compost pile or by spading them into the soil to deter pest buildup. This also will eliminate food and shelter for many insects and diseases.

Hillock said soil solarization is another option of cultural control. A clear plastic sheet spread over the soil traps solar heat, which kills soilborne diseases, insects, nematodes and many weed seeds.

"Because of the well-known "Waiting two years to plant the Oklahoma heat, this treatment should occur during summer's high air temperatures and intense solar radiation. Keep the soil damp during the solarization process, and keep the plastic in place for several weeks," he said.

Early planting and harvesting also may help avoid heavy pest infestations, but still allow for achieving a full yield. If you plant early, gardeners may have to make use of cold frames or hot caps to protect seedlings from the weather while they get a head start on growing. Stronger, older plants have a better competitive edge over pests. Gardeners also need to be familiar with the emergence times and life cycles of the pests needing to be controlled.

"One of the easiest things to do is simply buy seeds or plants with built-in resistance to diseases and nematodes. When shopping for plants, be sure to check for plants labeled certified or grown and inspected under sterile or quarantined conditions. These plants may cost a little more, but they're worth it," Hillock said.







The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) hereby gives notice to the public of its intent to reimburse eligible applicants for eligible costs to repair and/or replace facilities damaged by Severe Winter Storms, occurring January 13, 2017 to January 16, 2017. This notice applies to the Public Assistance (PA) and Hazard Mitigation Grant (HMGP) programs implemented under the authority of the Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. §§ 5121-5206.

Under a major disaster declaration (FEMA-4299-DR-OK) signed by the President on February 10, 2017, the following Counties have been designated eligible for PA: Beaver, Beckham, Dewey, Ellis, Harper, Major, Roger Mills, Texas, Woods, and Woodward counties. Additional counties may be designated at a later date. All counties in the State of Oklahoma are eligible for HMGP

This public notice concerns activities that may affect historic properties, activities that are located in or affect wetland areas or the 100-year floodplain, and critical actions within the 500-year floodplain. Such activities may adversely affect the historic property, floodplain or wetland, or may result in continuing vulnerability to flood damage.

Presidential Executive Orders 11988 and 11990 require that all federal actions in or affecting the floodplain or wetlands be reviewed for opportunities to relocate, and evaluated for social, economic, historical, environmental, legal and safety considerations. Where there is no opportunity to relocate, FEMA is required to undertake a detailed review to determine what measures can be taken to minimize future damages.

FEMA has determined that for certain types of facilities there are normally no alternatives to restoration in the floodplain/wetland. These are facilities that meet all of the following criteria: 1) FEMA's estimate of the cost of repairs is less than 50% of the cost to replace the entire facility, and is less than \$100,000; 2) the facility is not located in a floodway; 3) the facility has not sustained major structural damage in a previous Presidentially declared flooding disaster or emergency; and 4) the facility is not critical (e.g., the facility is not a hospital, generating plant, emergency operations center, or a facility that contains dangerous materials). FEMA intends to provide assistance for the restoration of these facilities to their pre-disaster condition, except that certain measures to mitigate the effects of future flooding or other hazards may be included in the work. For example, a bridge or culvert restoration may include a larger waterway opening to decrease the risk of future washouts.

For routine activities, this will be the only public notice provided. Other activities and those involving facilities that do not meet the four criteria are required to undergo more detailed review, including study of alternate locations. Subsequent public notices regarding such projects will be published if necessary, as more specific information becomes available

In many cases, an applicant may have started facility restoration before federal involvement. Even if the facility must undergo detailed review and analysis of alternate locations, FEMA will fund eligible restoration at the original location if the facility is functionally dependent on its floodplain location (e.g., bridges and flood control facilities), or the project facilitates an open space use, or the facility is an integral part of a larger network that is impractical or uneconomical to relocate, such as a road. In such cases, FEMA must also examine the possible effects of not restoring the facility, minimize floodplain/wetland impacts, and determine both that an overriding public need for the facility clearly outweighs the Executive Order requirements to avoid the floodplain/wetland, and that the site is the only practicable alternative. State of Oklahoma and local officials will confirm to FEMA that proposed actions comply with all applicable State and local floodplain management and wetland protection requirements

FEMA also intends to provide HMGP funding to the State of Oklahoma to mitigate future disaster damages. These projects may include construction of new facilities, modification of existing, undamaged facilities, relocation of facilities out of floodplains, demolition of structures, or other types of projects to mitigate future disaster damages. In the course of developing project proposals, subsequent public notices will be published if necessary, as more specific information becomes available

The National Historic Preservation Act requires federal agencies to take into account the effects of their undertakings on historic properties. Those actions or activities affecting buildings, structures, districts or objects 50 years or older or that affect archeological sites or undisturbed ground will require further review to determine if the property is eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (Register). 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

Rex N. & Diana F. Hoover of PO Box 289, Booker, TX 79005 have filed an application, #2016-582, with the Oklahoma Water Resources Board (Board) for a permit to use 480 acre feet of groundwater per year. The groundwater is proposed to be used for irrigation and taken from 480 acres located as follows: 160 acs. in the NE, 160 acs. in the SE and 160 acs. in the SW of Section 10, T1N, R24ECM, Beaver County. The water is to be withdrawn from two (2) wells located in the SW SW SE and SE SW SE of same Section 10, and used in Beaver County, Oklahoma, as more specifically described in the application. Board rules require that the well be located a distance of at least 1,320 feet from existing wells or proposed well locations on lands of another unless a well location exception is granted. One such well location exception provides that the exception may be granted if no objection is received from any landowner having a well located within 1,320 feet of the well requested to be authorized. Use of groundwater is governed by Sections 1020.1 and following of Title 82 of the Oklahoma Statutes and rules of the Board, Oklahoma Administrative Code (OAC), Title 785, Chapter 30.

Protests to the application must be in writing and received by the Board at the address listed below and by the applicant at the address listed above no later than April 17, 2017, and contain the following: (1) name, address, and telephone number of the interested person; (2) the particular application number to which the protest relates; (3) specific information to show how approval of the application proposed may directly and adversely affect legally protected interests of the person filing the protest; and (4) a statement of the relief sought by the interested person. A person who sends a letter containing only a general objection or comment will not be deemed to be a party, but the letter will be made part of the permanent record.

If a protest that meets the requirements listed in the paragraph above is filed with both the applicant and Board, a hearing on this application will be scheduled and the applicant and protestant(s) will be advised of the hearing date. Protestants or their representatives must appear at the hearing and present the protest to be considered. Hearings are governed by Section 309 of Title 75 and Section 1020.8 of Title 82 of the Oklahoma Statutes, and the rules of Board, OAC Title 785, chapters 4 and 30. Most participating companies charge around \$10 per month, with no contract and no equipment fee. However, for non-income qualifiers, there may be a one-time setup/equipwill vary too.

Dear Looking,

If you plan to enroll in original Medicare, getting a supplemental policy (also known as Medigap insurance) too is a smart idea because it will help pay for things that aren't covcopayments, coinsurance and deductibles. Here are some tips to help you choose an appropriate plan.

Medigap Plans

In all but three states (Mas-Also note that in addition to sachusetts, Minnesota, and Wisconsin), Medigap plans, Plan F is the most popular policy followed by plan C because they provide comprehensive coverage. Plans K and L are high-deductible policies that have lower premiums but impose higher out-of-pocket costs. Plan F also offers a highdeductible version in some states. And a popular middle ground policy that attracts many healthy beneficiaries is plan N.

How to Choose

To pick a Medigap policy that works best for you, consider your health, family medical history and your budget. The differences among plans can be small and rather confusing.

To help you choose, visit *Medicare.gov*, and click on "Supplements & Other Insurance" at the top of the page, To qualify, you'll need to then on "Find a Medigap policy" and type in your ZIP code. This will give you a list of the plans available in your area, their price ranges and the names, and contact information of companies that sell them. (Continued From Page 1) basis, usually for an hour during lunch. During the meeting, they were given information on how to make better choices when cooking at home as well as eating at restaurants.

"The biggest thing was accountability. You know you're going to weigh in when you go. It's not a competition with anyone else; it's all about how well you can do yourself," said Mitchell. "I recommend the program to anyone who is ready to make a change. Everyone knows if you have somebody to talk to you're going to be more successful. The group meetings were very important."

While not all counties are offering the national program at the current time, participation is growing.

"The number of programs across the state doubled in 2016. If someone is interested in participating in a program and there isn't one in their area, they can contact the local health department. Some health departments are partnering with established programs and offering classes by video conference, while others are developing their own programs with community partners," said Reeves.
