Welcome, Introductions, and Determination of Quorum

 - Chairperson John Schneider called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. with a quorum present.

Public Comment

Review of the Minutes of January 24, 2025, Commission Meeting

Chairperson John Schneider

Commissioner Michaels-Johnson made note that on page one of the minutes the date was incorrectly cited as January 24, 2025, instead of November 22, 2024.

Judge Warren moved to approve the minutes. Commissioner Aaron seconded the motion.

Judge Warren, District Attorney Hicks and Commissioners Aaron, Buettner, Larison, MichaelsJohnson, and Schneider voted in the affirmative. Director Fruendt, Commissioners Tardibono
and Whipp voted to abstain. The motion passed.

- A handout was provided.



Presentation and Approval of OCCY Finance Report

- Mahboob ul Haq, OCCY Business Manager

Mr. ul Haq provided updates on financial status, including budget utilization and cash balances. Some of the highlights of the report include:

- FY2025 total budget: \$6,015.792.00.
- Amount spent by March 31, 2025: \$4.295.761.00 (70% of full-year budget).
- Cash balance as of March 31, 2025: \$91,216.90

<u>Judge Warren moved to approve the OCCY finance report. Commissioner Tardibono seconded</u> the motion. All members present voted in the affirmative. The motion passed.

- A PowerPoint presentation was shown.

OCCY Parent Partnership Board (PPB) Report

- Cierra White, OCCY PPB Member

Ms. White shared she is a foster and biological mother to eight children. She is active with CASA and PARB. Some of the highlights of the report include:

- Shared contrasting DHS cases
- Concerns: Inconsistent application of child welfare policy across countries; lack of responsiveness from CPS and failure to collect evidence; vulnerable children face retraumatization from returning to unsafe homes.
- Recommendations: Uniform enforcement of child welfare policies; Escalation pathways for professionals reporting abuse; inclusion of families in decision-making; continuous program evaluation and climate checks.

Discussion and Possible Vote Regarding House Bill 2030

Sarah Herrian, Executive Director Foster Care and Adoptive Association of Oklahoma

Ms. Herrian presentation highlights include:

- Proposed increase of daily foster care maintenance rate by \$5.00 (from \$22 to \$27).
- HB2030's original fiscal impact: \$18 million covering foster and adoptive families.
- Alternative approaches considered: targeted support for sibling placements or teens;
 DHS support informally expressed, not a formal budget request from DHS.
- Challenges: Legislative uncertainty regarding future appropriations.

There was mixed comfort among the commissioners about endorsing unfunded mandates. No formal vote was taken, but the discussion expressed broad support for increased compensation.

- A PowerPoint presentation was shown.



Report and Discussion on Senate Bill 364: Prohibit the Use of Corporal Punishment on Students Identified with a Disability in accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.

- Dr. Carolynn MacAllister, DVM, OSU Emeriti Associate Professor

Highlights from the presentation included:

- Oklahoma law currently allows corporal punishment unless specifically prohibited.
- Data: 455 incidents in 63 school districts involving students with disabilities.
- Methods include slapping, hair pulling, choking—beyond paddling.
- Students with disabilities are overrepresented in corporal punishment statistics.
- Arguments in favor: Ineffectiveness and trauma of corporal punishment; parents are
 often coerced into giving consent; alternative training exists for positive behavior
 management.
- Opposition concerns: parents' rights and local control.

Discussion and Possible Action Regarding the Annual Performance Review of the Executive Director Annette Wisk Jacobi, Including, but not Limited to, Possible Change in Salary

<u>Judge Warren moved to go into Executive Session. Commissioner Fruendt seconded the motion. All members present voted in the affirmative. The motion passed.</u>

<u>Commissioner Hicks moved to return to regular session. Commissioner Aaron seconded the</u> motion. All members present voted in the affirmative. The motion passed.

Assistant Attorney General Ty Mowdy asked the record to reflect that it was voted to enter the Executive Session at approximately 10:40 am and exit Executive Session at approximately 11:11 am and that no matters were voted on and the Board only discussed agenda item number eight; no votes or actions were taken.

Commissioner Buettner made a motion to authorize Chairperson Schneider to negotiate a salary increase of up to 5% for Executive Director Annette Wisk Jacobi, contingent on FY2026 budget. District Attorney Hicks seconded the motion. All members present voted in the affirmative. The motion passed.

Before proceeding to the next agenda item, Chairperson Schneider took a moment to formally recognize and express the Commission's appreciation for the outstanding contributions of Director Jacobi. He commended her dedication, tenacity, and consistent pursuit of excellence in advancing the Commission's mission. Chairperson Schneider emphasized that the Commission deeply values her hard work and leadership.



Discussion and Possible Vote Credentialing Provisional Candidates for Juvenile Competency Evaluation

- Richard Yahola, OCCY Juvenile Competency Coordinator

Mr. Yahola started his presentation off by giving an overview of the Juvenile Competency Division and what its functions are. Mr. Yahola presentation highlights include:

 Two new candidates presented for provisional status as evaluators: Jennifer Lancaster, Ph.D., and Oyeyemi Adeyiga, Ph.D.

<u>Commissioner Whipp moved to approve provisional candidates. Commissioner Fruendt seconded the motion. All members present voted in the affirmative. The motion passed.</u>

- A PowerPoint presentation was shown.

Before we moved forward with the next agenda item, Chairperson John Schneider informed the Board that two of the Commissioners (Aaron and Buettner) had to leave, but quorum was still established.

Discussion and Possible Vote to Create a Committee Comprised of OCCY Commissioners to focus on Quality Improvement of the Office of Juvenile System Oversight

- John Schneider, OCCY Commission Chairperson
 - Proposal: To establish a commissioner-led committee to evaluate and improve OJSO operations.
 - Members with potential conflicts (e.g., agency directors) may advise, but not lead.

<u>Commissioner Tardibono moved to authorize Chairperson Schneider to appoint members to said committee. Commissioner Whipp seconded the motion. All members present voted in the affirmative. The motion passed.</u>

Report and Discussion: Results of the Second Chance Families Collaborative Project relating to Children of Incarcerated Parents

- Clint Castleberry, Chief Administrator, Department of Corrections
- Shannon Luper, Program Director, Girls Scout of Eastern Oklahoma
- Denise Daniels, Executive Director, OK Messages Project
- Amanda Maxwell, Program Access Navigator, New Hope Oklahoma

Each of the presenters talked a little about the purpose and strengthening connection between incarcerated parents and their children. Some highlights of the presentation include:

 Partner programs: Girl Scouts Beyond Bars (parenting classes); OK Messages Project (video messages and books); New Hope Oklahoma (support for caregivers and children).



- Key Outcomes: 201 parents recorded video messages, impacting 42 children
- Community-based troop participation for children without access to incarcerated parents.
- Reunification and mental health support with measurable improvements in engagement and family well-being.
- Notable story: A father reunited with his daughter in person for the first time in 15 years through this program.
- A PowerPoint presentation was shown.

Before moving forward to the next agenda item, it was noticed there was virtual participant who was not identified. Chairperson John Schneider asked the caller to identify themselves several times and the caller never responded. The meeting moved forward.

Report and Discussion: Legislative Update

Executive Director of OCCY Annette Wisk Jacobi filled in for Marcia Johnson on the legislative update. Highlights of the report include:

- House Bill 1574: Unannounced site visits at private facilities receiving state funds.
- House Bill 2982: Clarifies OSBI authority to act on referrals from OCCY.
- Senate Bill 799: Regulates text message communication between staff and students.
- House Bill 1863: Clarifies MDT roles, terminology, and OCCY's access to confidential data for oversight.
- OCCY to maintain access to full data for quality assurance, despite external pushbacks.

Director's Report and Discussion: A Report Regarding Agency Activities and Personnel Chanes

- Annette Wisk Jacobi, OCCY Executive Director

Director Jacobi's report is a follow-up to Executive Order 2024-29. Highlights of the report include:

- Staff now require at least one day per week in the office.
- The agency is exploring options for additional space due to limited desk capacity.
- Some challenges include additional space is not budgeted for; rotating workspace currently used.

Report to the Commission June 20, 2025

Background

The Children's Endowment Fund of Oklahoma, established in 2019 and administered by the Oklahoma Commission on Children and Youth (OCCY), supports innovative programs to improve child well-being and reduce adverse childhood experiences. To center the voices of those with lived



experience, **the Parent Partnership Board (PPB)** was created to advise OCCY Commissioners and strengthen family-focused systems through parent leadership and engagement.

Key Activities & Outputs: April-May 2025

Legislative & Policy Engagement

- **Meetings with Lawmakers**: PPB members met with Representatives Danny Williams, Erick Harris, and Eric Roberts to share lived experiences related to mental health, substance use, and family systems involvement.
- Advocating for System Equity: At the April OCCY Commissioners' meeting, Cierra
 White shared her experience as a foster parent, emphasizing the need for
 consistent child welfare practices across counties. Dr. Lana Turner Addison and
 Representative Ronald Stewart, Jr. met with ODMHSAS and Family and Children
 Services leadership staff about the importance and future of mental health services
 systems of care.

Community Leadership & Advocacy

Speaking Engagements: Members presented at key events including the P3 Conference and Post Adjudication Review Board (PARB) Institute. Topics ranged public-private partnerships and child welfare reform to substance use and trauma-informed care.



 Testimony & Panels: Members Alice Jeffrey, Heather Monroe, and James Ray provided powerful personal stories with the Oklahoma Partnership for School Readiness Partnership Board, OCCY's Homeless Children and Youth Steering Committee, and OCCY's Post Adjudication Review Board (PARB) Bi-Monthly Parent Voice Series, influencing how programs and policies can be made more responsive and inclusive.

Training, Development & Strategic Planning

- **PPB Retreat**: The May retreat focused on collaboration, refining goals, and advancing the 2025-2026 Strategic Plan, reaffirming the Board's mission and strengthening internal cohesion.
- Leadership Trainings: Members participated in Strategic Sharing Training, Children's Behavioral Health Conference, Trust-Based Relational Intervention (TBRI) Training, Hope for the Journey Conference, Oklahoma Child Abuse and Neglect Conference, and Strengthening Families Together Collaborative Convening, gaining skills in trauma-informed advocacy, behavioral health, and parent storytelling.
- Community of Practice (CoP): Co-hosted by OCCY, Oklahoma State Department of Health, and Oklahoma Family Support Network, the CoP focused on building effective parent advisory committees and deepening family engagement strategies. Sixty-nine participants attended.

Ongoing Involvement & Representation

 Board and Committee Participation: PPB members continue to serve on the Post-Adjudication Review Board (PARB), Strengthening Youth Custody & Transition Services Advisory Committee, 111 Project, ensuring parent perspectives are embedded in review and reform processes.

Recognition & Storytelling:

- James Ray presented at the Parent Leadership Awards event, celebrating outstanding parent leaders.
 - Awardees: Yolanda Galloway, Marques. S. Thomas, and Erica Herrera
- Cierra White was spotlighted as a CASA Volunteer for her dedication to family-centered advocacy.
- Alice Jeffrey shared her story with Truthout, a non-profit news outlet, contributing to a national conversation on homelessness and family instability.
- Alice Jeffrey was selected to represent Oklahoma in the Parent-to-Parent Learning Collaborative through Zero to Three's Safe Babies initiative.



Oklahoma Commission on Children and Youth 2025 LEGISLATIVE SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

APPROPRIATIONS

The general appropriations bill, **HB 2766**, appropriates \$3,103,087 to the commission for FY26, an increase of \$94,268. The increase will be used to fund the 1.0 FTE Community Planner for Parent Leadership position.

COMMISSION-APPROVED LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

HB 1574 restores the authority of the Office of Juvenile System Oversight to periodically inspect privately operated facilities in the children and youth services system that receive state or federal funding.

Status: Became law without the Governor's signature.

HB 1863 clarifies the duties of the Freestanding Multidisciplinary Child Abuse Teams (FSMDT) and requires that teams enter case review information into the commission's secure database.

Status: Became law without the Governor's signature.

HB 2892 clarifies the authority of the Executive Director of OCCY to request an investigation of certain cases by the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation.

Status: Senate General Order.

SB 799 would have allowed an alternate adult to be included in electronic communications between a school employee and a student who is an unaccompanied homeless minor after taking steps to verify the status of the student as unaccompanied.

Status: Vetoed by the Governor.

The veto message states that "[This bill] gives bad actors wide breadth to take advantage of vulnerable youths...[it] lets schools replace parents with 'alternate adults'... It doesn't go far enough in ensuring that an effort is made to find the student's parents or quardians. It's an erosion of parental rights."

HJR 1035 approves the proposed administrative rules of various agencies, including those submitted by OCCY, to clarify the duties and processes of the FSMDTs and to require the use of the secure database to enter case review information.

Status: Became law without the Governor's signature.

CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

HB 1565 requires calls made to the child abuse hotline alleging abuse or neglect, by someone other than the person responsible for the child, to be reported in writing immediately to a local law enforcement agency for the purpose of conducting a possible criminal investigation. Directs the department to maintain a record of each report sent to law enforcement.

Status: Approved by the Governor.

HB 1581 moves the administration of, and funding for, the Freestanding Multidisciplinary Child Abuse Teams from OCCY to an entity identified as a "nationally accredited association of Children's Advocacy Centers."

Status: House A&B Committee.

HB 1848 creates a tax credit equal to 30% of the amount expended by employers to offset the cost of providing child care for employees or assisting employees with the cost of care.

Status: Senate General Order.

HB 1849 requires DHS, until November 1, 2028, to exempt the household income of child care employees, who would otherwise not qualify, in determining eligibility for the child care subsidy program and to waive copayments for those employees who do qualify.

Status: Senate General Order.

HB 1965 directs the court to issue a scheduling order within 30 days of the right to a jury trial being waived in a termination of parental rights case and to commence a bench trial within 90 days, barring an exceptional circumstance supporting a delay. With exceptions, directs the DA to file a petition for termination of parental rights if reunification services have been part of an Individualized Service Plan for the first 15 months of a child being in foster care, and the parent has not corrected the conditions that led to the child being adjudicated deprived. Requires diversion services be provided to a child who has committed a crime that would be considered a misdemeanor if committed by an adult prior to a DA filing a petition. Requires the court to give preference to relatives or those who have a kinship relationship with a child when appointing a guardian for the child.

Status: Became law without the Governor's signature.

HB 2030 establishes foster care maintenance payments for traditional foster parents in the amount of \$22.72/day for a child 0-5 years of age, \$25.42/day for a child 6-12 years of age and \$27.62/day for a child 13 years or older.

Status: Senate General Order.

CHILD HEALTH AND SAFETY

HB 1265 sets various manufacturing, marketing and safety standards for vapor products, including that e-liquid bottles have a child-proof cap. Prohibits products from being labeled or marketed using packaging that appeals to minors.

Status: House Health and Human Services Oversight Committee.

HB 2263 prohibits using or holding a cell phone while operating a motor vehicle on a stretch of roadway that includes a school or construction zone.

Status: Veto overridden.

SB 23 prohibits smoking any substance or vaping in a motor vehicle when a minor is present.

Status: Senate General Order.

SB 117 requires passengers aged 16 years and younger who are riding in the back seat of a vehicle to be secured by a seat belt.

Status: Senate Public Safety Committee.

SB 364 prohibits the use of corporal punishment on any student with a disability in accordance with the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.

Status: Became law without the Governor's signature.

SB 786 makes it a misdemeanor to consume marijuana or to inhale secondhand marijuana smoke while driving. Prohibits drivers from possessing an open container of marijuana in the passenger area of a motor vehicle.

Status: Became law without the Governor's signature.

JUVENILES

HB 1480 provides that no youth who is or has been detained, or their parent or guardian, shall be responsible for detention-related costs.

Status: Senate Judiciary Committee.

SB 870 requires persons working in or around a facility under the supervision of OJA or a county facility that detains juveniles who become aware or suspect sexual misconduct or exploitation to report the incident to the facility supervisor and the Office of Juvenile System Oversight.

Status: Veto overridden.

Also, see HB 1965 in the Children and Families section.

MISCELLANEOUS

HB 1607 requires state agencies, beginning July 1, 2026, and annually thereafter, to report to OMES the number of contract employees, their corresponding pay and the conditions of their contract.

Status: Approved by the Governor.

HB 2095 requires public bodies to respond to an open records request within 30 days of receiving the request.

Status: Senate General Order.

SB 995 requires all proposed, permanent rules promulgated by state agencies to receive legislative approval by joint resolution and repeals the authority of the Governor to declare certain permanent rules to be adopted.

Status: Became law without the Governor's signature.

SB 1024 requires express written approval from the governor or cabinet secretary prior to an agency promulgating rules.

Status: Approved by the Governor.
