Duties of State Advisory Team (SAT) for Oklahoma System of Care (OKSOC):

- 1. Advise on the development of the systems of care/continuum of care in Oklahoma with a trauma-informed and equity-based lens.
- 2. Maintain the vision of the State Advisory Team to improve the lives of infants, children, youth and families (ICYF) and uphold the values and principles of Systems of Care, establishing them as the accepted mode throughout the state.
- 3. Facilitate cross-sector coalition meetings to increase collaboration among stakeholders, to include the state legislature, federal government, tribal nations, ICYF, providers, agencies, professionals, businesses, and other community leaders.
- 4. Sustaining and enhancing community teams in taking local systems of care statewide through respectful conversations, resources and collaboration.
- 5. Create sustainability by involving communities, youth and family advocacy groups and continuing to seek long-term, stable funding.
- 6. Identify and facilitate the removal of barriers.
- 7. Hold systems of care accountable for meeting high standards for family and youth-driven care through keeping abreast of national trends and advising on needed improvements.
- 8. Hold systems of care accountable for meeting high standards for cultural humility through promotion of the use of CLAS Standards, and through keeping abreast of national trends and advising on needed improvements.
- 9. Promote standards of practice that are evidence-based or nationally acknowledged as best practice.
- 10. Promote development of innovative and promising practices.
- 11. Advise on appropriate expenditure of funds at the state and community levels, such as joint budgets.
- 12. Develop guidelines for continuous quality improvement of services which uses outcomes data to shape future program direction and decisions about policy and practices.
- 13. Seek linkages to all relevant reform efforts in the state.
- 14. Each member will strive to support the systems of care philosophy and activities within the group or agency s/he represents.
- 15. Develop and uphold formal agreements and memoranda of understanding between the collaborating child-serving agencies as needed.
- 16. Promote balanced S.E.L.F. C.A.R.E. among ICYF, staff, leadership, and community: with Sleep, Exercise, Loving relationships, and Food that is nutritious, we are inspired to act with Compassion, Awareness, Respect and feel Empowered.

	the discussions related to their plans, an opportunity to voice their preferences, and
	ultimately to feel empowered to drive the plan.
Three	Trauma-informed services and supports are developed and provided to best promote
	the overall wellness, stability and safety of the ICYF and community
Four	Plans for ICYF are individualized to the unique culture, beliefs, values, strengths, and
	needs of each child and family while promoting best practices.
Five	Services and supports build on the identified strengths of the ICYF and community.
Six	Services and supports are available early to facilitate overall wellness for the family.
Seven	Services are provided in the most appropriate and least restrictive environment in the
	home and community of the infant, child or youth.
Eight	The system of care is community-oriented with management and decision-making at
	the family and community level.
Nine	Services and supports promote healthy boundaries and balanced S.E.L.F. C.A.R.E.

Twelve	ICYF are equal partners with providers and community participants in identifying,
	creating, and evaluating the comprehensive and integrated system.
Thirteen	Services and supports are outcome-based with clear accountability, transparency, and
	cost responsibility. This includes accountability for use of public and private funds and
	the ability to use savings for early intervention.

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
