The Home and Community Based ADvantage Waiver program provides alternatives to placement in a nursing facility for eligible adults. The program helps older adults and adults with disabilities stay independent and close to family and friends. ADvantage promotes individual choice and self-direction. To be eligible for ADvantage program services, a person must: *Be financially qualified for SoonerCare Medicaid *Meet medical Level of Care (LOC) criteria *Be 65 years of age or older; or *Be 19 to 64 years of age with a physical disability; or *Be 19 to 64 years of age with a developmental disability, provided he or she does not have an intellectual disability or cognitive impairment related to the developmental disability *Require 1 or more of the services offered in the waiver, at least monthly, to avoid institutionalization *Reside in an eligible living arrangement as defined in policy *Have needs that can be safely met with waiver services, and family or community supports, as determined through the service plan approval process

State Plan Personal Care (SPPC)		
Information/Services Available	Referral Point	Misc. Info about Program
State Plan Personal Care is a Medicaid service that helps individuals, from children through aging adults, with daily living activities at home. A personal care attendant helps the individual with things like bathing, grooming, getting in and out of bed, toileting, meals, eating, laundry tasks, shopping/errand tasks and light housekeeping. Skilled nursing services include assessment of need and development and oversight of a care plan. <i>SPPC services do not include technical services such as suctioning, tracheal care, gastrostomy-tube feeding or care, specialized feeding due to choking risk, applying compression stockings, bladder catheterization, colostomy irrigation, wound care, applying prescription lotions or topical ointments, range of motion exercises, or operating equipment of a technical nature, such as a patient lift or oxygen equipment.</i> <u>Skilled Nursing</u> *Assess a member's needs *Develop a care plan to meet the member's identified personal care needs *Manage care plan oversight *Periodically reassess and update the care plan when necessary <u>Personal Care Attendant (PCA)</u> *Personal Care *Meal preparation *Housekeeping *Laundry *Shopping/Errands *Specified special tasks <i>PCA's are not CPR certified.</i>	Medicaid Services Unit 1-800-435-4711 or Submit an online application at www.okdhs.org. Developmental Disability Services (DDS)

Waiver Services Assists individuals who are 3 years of age or older who have been diagnosed with an intellectual disability to lead healthy, independent and productive lives to the fullest extent possible. Services may include home support, training, psychological services, professional therapies, vocational services, etc. Community Waiver- <i>*No cost cap on service plan, should be able to meet all needs without other program assistance.</i> In-Home Supports Waiver for Adults (Ages 18 and older) In-Home Supports Waiver for Children (Ages 3-17) State Funded Services Group Home-provides supervision, residential accommodations, food services, and training/skill development for adults with intellectual disability to help with increasing independence. Assisted Living-provides limited staff support for adults with an intellectual disability to help with services coordination, advocacy, assistance with transportation and emergency response. Sheltered Workshop-paid work and training, including contract work and volunteer work, for individuals 16 years of age and over when school is not in session. Community Integrated Employment (CIE)-promotes independence through paid work and training activities in the community. Family Support Assistance Program Provides cash assistance to lower income families who have minor children diagnosed with a significant developmental and/or intellectual disability. (Family's annual adjusted gross income cannot exceed \$45,000.) Respite Voucher Program Provides vouchers to the caregiver of an individual diagnosed with a developmental and/or intellectual disability to help pay for respite, which is defined as temporary relief for the caregiver. (Caregiver must have an adjusted gross income of less than \$75,000, reside with the Care Recipient, and does not receive respite services through another federal or state program.)	Questions? DDS provides services to people with a primary diagnosis of intellectual disabilities through Home and Community-Based Waivers. People served may also have developmental disabilities such as autism, cerebral palsy and Down syndrome. Service delivery is provided through private agencies and individuals who have signed contracts to provide Home and Community-Based Waiver services. Developmental Disability (DD): a mental or physical impairment, or a combination of both, such as an intellectual disability, cerebral palsy, or Autism with an onset date before the age of 22. Intellectual Disability (ID): an IQ of 70 +/-, including impairment in adaptive functioning, with an onset during the individual's developmental years. Eligibility for community based services: *Oklahoma resident *At least 3 years old *Meet SoonerCare financial eligibility (available at OKHCA.org) *An IQ of 70 or below *A qualify diagnosis from a licensed psychologist *Meet Medicaid eligibility *Disability determination from Social Security Administration or Oklahoma Health Care Authority

Program of All-inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE)

The Program of All-inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE) is a managed care model of acute and long-term care that integrates the provision and financing of medical and long-term care services. The PACE model is centered on the belief that it is better for the well-being of seniors with chronic care needs and their families to be served in the community whenever possible. Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHC)

Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics, commonly referred to as CCBHCs, are a new provider type in Medicaid being offered across Oklahoma. CCBHCs are replacing the old Community Mental Health Center (CMHC) model. CCBHCs are designed to provide a comprehensive range of mental health and substance use disorder services to vulnerable individuals. In return, CCBHCs receive an enhanced Medicaid reimbursement rate based on their costs of services to meet the needs of these populations. *Provide easy access to integrated services for all individuals regardless of pay sources or ability to pay. *Provide a full array of mental health and substance use disorder services available in every certified location and provide or coordinate with primary care services. *Provide quality-driven services as demonstrated through data reports and outcomes reports generated by ODMHSAS or its contractors. *Provide enhanced integration and coordination of mental health and substance use disorder services and supports for people across their lifespans. Living Choice

The Living Choice Project is Oklahoma's name for the Money Follows the Person (MFP) grant and is administered by the Oklahoma Health Care Authority (OHCA). The program promotes community-based services instead of institutional services. Eligible individuals who transition from an institutional setting to a home in the community will receive a range of necessary medical and home and community-based services for one year. COVERED SERVICES MAY INCLUDE: - Case management - Personal care - Prescription drugs - Self-direction services - Home-delivered meals - Adult day care - Assisted living - Skilled nursing - Transportation - Private-duty nursing - Therapy (physical, occupational and speech) - Transitional funds to help facilitate the move (one-time benefit of up to \$2,400) - Additional services may be available based on need *NOTE: Members can only receive Living Choice services for 365 days. Towards the end of the Living Choice cert period, an application for ADvantage will be submitted and the member will be assessed to determine eligibility for possible transition to ADvantage Waiver. Oklahoma's Living Choice program offers services to individuals with physical disabilities aged 19-64, individuals with chronic illnesses aged 65 and older, and individuals with intellectual disabilities aged 19 and older. In addition to these categorical age requirements, individuals must meet the following requirements: •Have resided in an institutional setting (nursing home, intermediate care facility) continuously for a minimum of 60 days. •Qualify for SoonerCare for at least one day before the transition. •Have a desire to transition back into the community. •Be willing to actively participate in their plan of care. •A family member, health care professional or any other interested party may make program referrals.

Medically Fragile Waiver

Information/Services Available	Referral Point	Misc. Info about Program
A medically fragile condition is defined as a chronic physical condition, which results in prolonged dependency on medical care for which daily skilled (nursing) intervention is medically necessary and is characterized by one or more of the following: (1) There is a life-threatening condition characterized by reasonably frequent periods of acute exacerbation which requires frequent medical supervision, and/or physician consultation and which in the absence of such supervision or consultation would require hospitalization. (2) The individual requires frequent, time consuming administration of specialized treatments which are medically necessary. (3) The individual is dependent on medical technology such that without the technology a reasonable level of health could not be maintained. Examples include but are not limited to dependence on ventilators, dialysis machines, enteral or parenteral nutrition support and continuous oxygen. Services may include: • Advanced Supportive/Restorative Assistance • Case Management • Environmental Modifications • Home-Delivered Meals • Institutional Transition Case Management • Personal Care • Prescription Drugs • Personal Emergency Response System (PERS) • Private Duty Nursing • Respite • Skilled Nursing • Self-Directed Goods and Services • Specialized Medical Equipment and Supplies • Therapy Services (Occupational, Physical, Respiratory or Speech) • Transitional Case Management	Medicaid Services Unit 1-800-435-4711 or Submit an online application at www.okdhs.org. This program allows Medicaid eligible persons who meet institutional level of care requirements to remain at home or in the residential setting of their choosing while receiving the necessary care. To be eligible, the following requirements must be met: *Be at least 19 years of age; *Meet hospital and/or skilled nursing level of care; *Meet SoonerCare financial eligibility; *Must be living at home or a residential setting.

Oklahoma Cares is a partnership of the Oklahoma State Department of Health (OSDH), the Oklahoma Health Care Authority (OHCA), the Cherokee Nation, the Kaw Nation of Oklahoma, and the Oklahoma Department of Human Services (OKDHS) to provide treatment for breast and cervical cancer and pre-cancerous conditions to eligible women. Oklahoma Cares was established as a result of the National Breast and Cervical Cancer Prevention and Treatment Act of 2000. Services: *Breast and cervical cancer and pre-cancer diagnosis and treatment; *Medicaid coverage that includes the full range of services (not only cancer treatment); *Medicaid eligibility continues until the woman no longer need of breast or cervical cancer treatment. To qualify under this program, a woman must: *be screened under the Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program (BCCEDP) and have an abnormal screen, requiring further diagnosis and/or treatment services; *have qualifying low income; *have no creditable insurance covering Breast and Cervical Cancer (BCC) diagnosis or treatment (Note: medical care programs of the Indian Health Services (IHS) or tribal organizations are not considered creditable insurance); *be under the age of 65; *be an Oklahoma resident who is a U.S. citizen or eligible qualified alien; *declare a Social Security number; *assign her rights to Third Party Liability if she has insurance that is not creditable; *declare her income for the purpose of determining that she is not otherwise eligible for Medicaid. If you have been previously diagnosed with breast or cervical cancer and are still undergoing treatment and meet all of the other eligibility criteria, you may be eligible for this program. Call the Oklahoma State Department of Health to find out how.

SoonerCare Health Management Program (HMP)

The SoonerCare HMP is an innovative, comprehensive program which aims to benefit SoonerCare Choice members who have or are at risk for developing chronic conditions as well as the SoonerCare Choice primary care providers who care for them. Program Goals: *To improve member health outcomes, *To improve quality of care, and *To reduce long-term health care spending What services do HMP members receive? *In-person and telephonic health coaching by a registered nurse at participating providers' offices; *Educational materials and support regarding their health condition; *Behavioral health screening and access to behavioral health resources; and *Help with locating community resources.	How do I enroll in the HMP? If you have been selected to participate in the HMP, you will get a letter in the mail and a phone call telling you that you are in the program. The program is free. You will never be asked to pay for any of the services the Health Coach provides. What if I have a chronic condition but am not in the HMP? If your doctor has told you that you have a chronic condition such as diabetes, asthma, high blood pressure or heart disease and you would like help managing your health please call 1-877-252-6002 and ask to speak with our chronic care unit who may be able to assist you.	Who receives services through the Health Management Program? SoonerCare Choice members: *with or at risk for developing chronic disease(s), *at high risk for adverse outcomes, and *who have an increased likelihood of experiencing a health care crisis.

Adult Day Health Services (State Funded)

Adult day health services meet the physical, social and emotional needs of older adults and those adults with disabilities. DHS contracts with adult day health centers across the state to support the health, nutritional, social and daily living needs of adults in a professionally staffed, group setting. Services provided include health monitoring and medication administration; socialization, leisure, recreational and educational activities; assistance with personal care; nutritious lunches and snacks; transportation and counseling. Adult Day Services is a community-based program designed to meet the needs of functionally impaired older persons, generally those age 60 and over, through an individualized plan of care. The program assists participants to remain in the community, enabling families and other caregivers to continue caring for an impaired member at home. Eligibility: Applicants for adult day services are referred to the ADvantage Waiver or the Developmental Disabilities Services (DDS) Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS) Waiver, as appropriate. DHS State funded Adult day services may be received for four months while the application for waiver services is pending. All adult day services participants must be determined ineligible for either the ADvantage Waiver or the DDS HCBS Waiver or be placed on the DDS waiting list to receive state funded Adult Day Services beyond the four month determination period. *If the participant is not determined ineligible in four months, the participant may not continue in Oklahoma Department of Human Services (OKDHS) funded adult day services. The authorization is closed and services are terminated. <i>*An exception or extension of the four months rule must be requested.</i> *Applicants aged 19-59, determined disabled by Social Security or placed on the DDS waiting list may qualify for an age waiver for State funded Adult Day Services and will need to contact a center to apply for services.

Nursing services and home health aide services are covered services on a per visit basis. Thirty-six (36) visits per calendar year of nursing and/or home health aide services for any member do not require prior authorization; however, any visit surpassing the thirty-sixth (36) visit will require prior authorization and medical review. <i>Therapy (PT/OT/ST) are not covered under Medicaid Home Health and would have to be inpatient or outpatient services.</i>	*Physician makes referral to a Medicaid Certified Home Health agency.	*Medicaid is members only insurance coverage. *Only allowed 36 visits per calendar year. *Physician face to face visit required per OHCA.
Private Duty Nursing (PDN) - Children		
Information/Services Available	Referral Point	Misc. Info about Program
PDN is medically necessary care provided on a regular basis by a licensed practical nurse or registered nurse. PDN is the level of care that would routinely be provided by the nursing staff of a hospital or skilled nursing facility. PDN services are provided: (1) In the member's primary residence, unless it is medically necessary for a nurse to accompany the individual in the community. (A) The individual's place of residence is wherever the individual lives, whether the residence is the individual's own dwelling, a relative's home, or other type of living arrangement. The place of residence cannot include a hospital, nursing facility, or intermediate care facility for individuals with intellectual disabilities (ICF/IID). (B) The place of service in the community cannot include the residence or business location of the provider of PDN services unless the provider of PDN is a live-in caregiver. (2) To assist during transportation to routine, Medicaid-compensable health care appointments and/or to the nearest appropriate emergency room. (A) The private duty nurse may not drive the vehicle during transportation. (B) PDN services are not available for non-routine extended home absences unrelated to medically necessary treatment or medical care.	Primary Care Physician initiates Referral requesting evaluation for Private Duty Nursing with agency contracted for PDN. OHCA Population Care Management 1-877-252-6002 or Email: PopulationCareMgmtAdminAssistants@okhca.org An assessment by an OHCA care management nurse is required prior to the authorization for services. The assessment will be conducted by the OHCA through one (1) of the following: (A) Telephone (B) Virtually; or (C) Face-to-face. In person face-to-face assessments are completed when determined by OHCA to be the most appropriate assessment method. A face-to-face assessment is not completed at the parent or caregiver's request.	SoonerCare does cover children (under 21 years of age) if: (1) The member is eligible for SoonerCare; and (2) The Oklahoma Health Care Authority, in its discretion, deems the services medically necessary. Medical necessity is determined in accordance with OAC 317:30-5-560.1. <i>*Services are authorized by OHCA *May be approved for up to 16 hr. day up to 7 days per week. *Periodic re-evaluations are completed and may modify these hours as member's condition changes. *PDN is responsible for all care needs (ADL/IADL) while in the home.</i>

Do you have limited resources or income? Do you have to choose between your monthly prescriptions and other expenses? Oklahoma Human Services offers programs to help low-income seniors and persons with disabilities to apply for two programs that help pay for their Medicare expenses: Get help from your state paying your Medicare Part A (Hospital Insurance) and Part B (Medical Insurance) premiums through a Medicare Savings Program. If you qualify, Medicare Savings Programs might also pay your Part A and Part B deductibles, coinsurance, and copayments. When you apply, your state determines which program(s) you qualify for. Even if you don't think you qualify, you should still apply. Extra Help Assistance (Low Income Subsidy-LIS) - Helps pay Medicare Part D Premiums, Deductibles, Copays. Beneficiaries could save thousands of dollars a year by reducing their monthly prescription drug costs. Medicare Savings Programs (MSP) – Helpspay Part A and Part B Premiums, Deductibles, Copays. Helps cover Medicare premiums and cost-sharing for those with Medicare who have limited incomes and resources and don't qualify for full Medicaid. These benefits, available through the state Medicaid agency, may help pay for your hospital and doctor visits by reducing or eliminating your copay and/or deductibles. What is Respite Care? Respite service can provide a much-needed, temporary break from the often exhausting challenges faced by family caregivers. Respite vouchers let caregivers hire another person (respite provider) to temporarily care for their loved ones. Respite care strengthens families, helps keep caregivers healthy, and forestalls the need for individuals requiring full-time care to move into state-financed institutions or expensive nursing home living. Lifespan Respite Grant Voucher Program is operated by Sooner SUCCESS : Eligibility Guidelines The Caregiver: Is 18 or older and is a full-time, unpaid caregiver; or, Is a grandparent or other relative age 54 or younger raising a child as a full-time parent; and, Does not receive respite services or payments from other programs including, but not limited to foster care, Family Support Assistance Payment, OAA Title III-E, or ODMHSAS Systems of Care funding. Has an annual household adjusted gross income limit of \$125,000. The Care Receiver is an Oklahoma resident: Age birth to 59 who needs help with activities of daily living (ADL) in order to stay at home in the community or who has neurological and organic brain dysfunction such as multiple sclerosis, muscular dystrophy or traumatic brain injury; and, Does not qualify for respite services or payments through any other program including, but not limited to, DHS Developmental Disability Services, SSI-DCP, OAA Title III-E, ADvantage waiver program, Medicare-funded home health services or hospice. The respite care provider must: •Be age 18 or older; •Have a social security number and social security card; and •Not live in the caregiver's home. *No income restrictions apply. *Cannot receive respite vouchers if member is on a Waiver program that allows respite as a service option. National Family Caregiver Support Program (NFCSP) operated through Area Agencies on Aging (AAA) for: *Grandparents or other relatives age 55 or older raising a child; or *Primary caregivers caring for someone age 60 or older who needs assistance with at least two activities of daily living or who is limited by Alzheimer's disease or dementia.
