### EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

### Oklahoma Department of Rehabilitation Services EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT April 10, 2023

### Remembrance

**Mr. James Cooper**, who was a long-time DRS employee, passed away on March 23<sup>rd</sup> in Ada. He was a teacher in the public school system from 1966 until 1972, when he came to work for Visual Services, which was, at that time, under the DHS umbrella. He was a field supervisor in the Ada VS office, and then a counselor for Vocational Rehabilitation. He worked in the field of rehabilitation until he retired in 2002.

James was an insightful person who inspired countless clients and mentored many agency staff throughout his years in the field, including Field Coordinators Alisa Proctor and Teresa McDermott. James is remembered by all as a person who "told it like it was" but had a genuine helping heart. His passions included hunting and spending time with his children and grandchildren. He was always committed to providing quality services to Oklahomans with disabilities. James was very active with Boy Scouts and served as Scoutmaster of Troop 12 in Ada for over 20 years.

Local Boy Scouters had planned to present long-time Mr. Cooper the Golden Eagle award at a special dinner on Friday, March 31, in recognition of his contribution to local scouting. Now, that event will instead be a celebration of the life of this dedicated scouter. The Golden Eagle Award that was to be presented to him will be presented to his family in his honor.

James is survived by his wife Kay and 2 sons, Steven, and Jeremy. He was also blessed with 12 grandchildren and was preceded in death by his son, Jimmy.

### RSA Monitoring and Technical Assistance – VR/SBVI

The Rehabilitation Services Administration will be conducting an on-site visit to Oklahoma the week of May 8.

### Scope of Review

Pursuant to Section 107(a) of the Rehabilitation Act, RSA must conduct periodic onsite monitoring and annual reviews to determine whether a VR agency is complying substantially with the provisions of its State Plan under Section 101 and the State Plan Supplement under Section 606 of the Rehabilitation Act and with the evaluation standards and performance indicators established under Section 106 of the Rehabilitation Act (which are subject to the performance accountability measures in Section 116(b) of WIOA and 34 C.F.R. part 361, subpart E).

The specific programs covered include—

- The State Vocational Rehabilitation Services program (VR program), established under Title I of the Rehabilitation Act (Title 1, 34 C.F.R. part 361); and
- The State Supported Employment Services program (Supported Employment program), authorized under Title VI of the Rehabilitation Act (Title VI, 34 C.F.R. part 363).

The return of a substantial amount of unused Federal funds for the VR and Supported Employment programs has generated the attention and concern of RSA, Congress, and stakeholders. Thus, RSA will focus FFY 2023 monitoring on identifying the root causes for the return of unused Federal funds and determining strategies and steps VR agencies may employ to reverse this trend. Importantly, during the programmatic and fiscal monitoring, RSA will ensure designated State units are complying with the nondelegable responsibilities for the administration of the VR and Supported Employment programs described in 34 C.F.R. § 361.13(c)(1). These responsibilities include—

- All decisions affecting eligibility for VR services, the nature and scope of available services, and the provision of these services;
- The determination to close the record of services of an individual who has achieved an employment outcome in accordance with 34 C.F.R. § 361.56;
- Policy formulation and implementation;
- The allocation and expenditure of VR funds; and

• Participation as a partner in the one-stop service delivery system established under Title I of WIOA, in accordance with 20 C.F.R. part 678.

RSA anticipates providing substantial technical assistance during the reviews and limiting compliance findings generally to those focus areas under review.

### Accessibility Professionals Association - Charles Watt

The accessibility training offered by the Accessibility Professionals Association (APA) is what initially drew the interest of our DRS ADA Coordinator, Charles Watt, and in 2015 he made his first trip to Plano to attend one of their regional trainings. He eventually became a Professional Member of the APA in 2017 and began serving on the Communication and Membership Committee in 2019. In 2022, he was nominated and elected to the Board of Directors in 2022.

In 2023, Charles was nominated and elected to the office of President-Elect of the APA. He will serve in 2023 as President-Elect, in 2024 as President, and 2025 as a Past President. It is an exciting time for the Accessibility Professionals Association and he is excited to be an integral part of the push to extend its notoriety, relevance, and reach. **Charles took and passed the national certification test.** 

<u>More on how the APA came about</u>... In 1994, Texas created their own Accessibility Standards, taking the federal government's ADA Standards for Accessible Design and adopting them, along with some additional standards which went beyond the federal ones.

The following year, the Texas Department of Licensing and Registration (TDLR) created an Independent Contractor Program in order to train and test individuals to become Registered Accessibility Specialists (RAS, pronounced Razz) who would conduct plan reviews and inspections to ensure compliance with the Texas Accessibility Standards. As the ADA Standards changed over the years, TAS also changed so they would stay aligned with federal requirements. The contractor program had requirements for continuing education so every RAS would stay up-to-date with any changing requirements.

Ultimately, in 1999, a group for RAS's was formed which would ultimately become known as the Accessibility Professionals Association. It is a group which is "an association of professionals focusing on accessibility in the built environment." They "offer quality training on the national ADA Standards and other current and upcoming accessibility codes and standards for any accessibility specialists, architects, designers, engineers, contractors, building owners, and other professionals" and are "a registered Continuing Education provider with the Texas Department of Licensing & Regulation, the Florida Department of Business and Professional Regulation, the International Code Council, the American Institute of Architects, and the ADA Coordinator Training Certification Program." The APA is in the process of transforming itself from a Texas-based organization into one of national reach. A new chapter was established in Colorado and ongoing discussions are being held to start another in Florida. For the last couple of years, they've been working on establishing a certification program which will offer interested individuals an opportunity to test and obtain a certification in their knowledge of accessibility in the built environment. The first certification test was offered at the 2023 APA Annual Conference at the end of January.

### OSB Parent Engagement Program

Parent Engagement/Weekend with the Experts. OSB Staff spent two weekends in Oklahoma City where they were provided specialized training for parents and grandparents in techniques for working with their blind/visually impaired children. Training sessions included Pre-Braille/Fine Motor Skills; Independent Living Skills; Sensory Integration; Orientation and Mobility Awareness; and Sighted Guide Basics.

### Process Improvement (PI) AWARE

The AWARE team is collaborating with Alliance Enterprises and the University of Missouri on a project to retrieve data entered by Pre-ETS trainers working for the OU Pre-ETS program. This data is currently collected and stored on a Pre-ETS site hosted by the University of Missouri. Our objective is to import this data into the AWARE system, which will facilitate reporting of Pre-ETS activities to RSA.

Currently uploading Pre-ETS data for the third quarter of PY 2022. This data has been reported by the OU Pre-ETS trainers and is being uploaded manually.

Working with the Professional Development unit to produce content for a statewide training for Rehab Techs scheduled this month.

Collecting data to assist the Financial Services Division, as DRS is currently undergoing a state audit.

Involved in developing responses and reports in preparation for the RSA Monitoring visits.

### **Case Review**

The QA team is currently working on a closed case audit for March. 290 cases qualified for auditing, 233 were closed in "other" status while 57 were closed "successfully". The goal is to audit 15%, approximately 44 cases per Reviewer.

In February the QA Team completed a targeted caseload audit per the request of the Division Administration (DA), Field Coordinator (FC) and Program Manager (PM). A specific instrument was developed and reviewed with Administration prior to implementation. Twenty five percent (25%) of both open and closed cases since

8/1/2022 were pulled for audit of caseload VR-066. A report was submitted to the PM along with the audit results.

### Program Standards, Statistical Research

The research staff is working on the analysis portion of the 2023 Open Case Satisfaction survey.

The research staff assisted the ESS staff with a survey of counselors regarding knowledge of Supplemental Employment Services.

Members of the data team are attending virtual Power BI training and have begun building reports replicating Tableau dashboards. These reports can be used for accessibility testing.

The research staff continues to work with SBVI staff on VIBE and Center surveys.

### Problem being addressed:

Many districts have been graduating these students with a regular high school diploma, prior to ageing out due to accountability purposes. When this occurs, the schools are no longer required to provide a free appropriate public education (FAPE) even when some students may need additional services. The change will provide a meaningful diploma option to students with the most significant cognitive disabilities. It will allow students to qualify for a FAPE until the school year in which they turn 22. Allowing districts to include these students as graduated (with no penalty) for accountability purposes.

<u>SB 154</u> <u>Stanley, Brenda(R)</u> <u>Lawson, Mark (R)</u> Provides an exception from the Reading Sufficiency Act (RSA) to ASL & braille students, replacing with a formative evaluation.

Note: This is a joint request with the OK. Dept. of Ed.

### Problem being addressed:

The current requirements do not address an infrastructure that ensures equity practices. The Reading Sufficiency Act evaluation was designed for hearing and sighted students. Allowing the exemption would reduce time consuming testing and allow educators to measure benchmarks by utilizing a formative evaluation system. The replacement method would use authentic reading and writing skills unlike the current RSA evaluation method. The intention is not to reduce requirements for these student groups but offer a meaningful alternative assessment that will provide educators with the best information to make data-driven decisions for each student. For students receiving an exemption, the school must report on measures of proficiency and language attainment through alternative means.

The State Board of Education will promulgate rules to determine measures of proficiency for students receiving exemptions.

#### Their story

Removing obstacles and optimizing profitability are compatible goals for Amy Jenkins, a process improvement consultant for ONE Gas.

Jenkins, from Shawnee, was hired at ONE Gas as a temporary customer service representative in 2005. She was promoted to a series of jobs with increasing responsibility over 17 years, including contract analyst and helping commercial and industrial customers purchase natural gas.

Jenkins, who uses a wheelchair, has a form of Muscular Dystrophy called Charcot-Marie-Tooth disease that causes peripheral nerve damage and loss of sensation in arms and legs.

She qualified for career counseling, tuition assistance and other employment services from Vocational Rehabilitation, a division of Oklahoma Department of Rehabilitation Services that provides employment, education and independent living programs serving more than 184,000 people in 2022.

Jenkins was recognized in October as an award winner at the 35th Governor's Disability Employment Awards of Excellence at the Governor's Mansion in Oklahoma City.

"As a person with a disability, you're constantly finding a different way, a different



approach," Jenkins said. "My brain just works like 'What is the easiest way to get this done?' to find a better way, but also (deliver) a great product in the end."

Vocational Rehabilitation helped fund Jenkins' education at Eastern Oklahoma State College in Wilburton, her undergraduate degree in agricultural communications from Oklahoma State University. ONE Gas funded her master's degree in business administration from Oklahoma Christian University. "Vocational Rehabilitation was also great in helping me evaluate my skills and figure out what kinds of employment I wanted to do," Jenkins said.

In 2019 and 2020, when she was transitioning from walking with crutches to being in a wheelchair, Vocational Rehabilitation opened a new case to assist with modifications to her van and home to accommodate her new wheelchair. "VR hired Jonathan Howard of Howard's Construction to widen internal doors and door frames to give me more room to maneuver in my small house and put an awning over my back door, so I have time to get in and out in bad weather," Jenkins said. "The home modifications wound up being incredibly nice because I spend so much more time there," Jenkins said, adding that she teleworks more since the COVID-19 pandemic began.

#### Instructional Program

- Students under the guidance of the teachers and leadership of Karen Standifer and Kristen Akerman performed our annual Winter Program: "Christmas Through the Decades". All students from PrK-12th grade participated in some type of fashion. Participation included: performing, creating the program, operating, and managing the stage lights, behind the scenes stage crew, and being involved with the Master of Ceremony - MC.
- The week of Jan 2 Lynn Dunn from NSRC came to campus where a two-day ACT Prep workshop was provided to our OSD Jr and Sr. She also provided additional training for our teachers in support of our Bi-Lingual program focusing on English print and writing skills in all areas of content.
- RISE program participated in a Winter games Special Olympic opportunity on January 13 and 14

- Middle school students attended the OKC Blue STEM program in OKC on February 28. Special thanks to our OSD Foundation. Kelsey Jones wrote a grant for the MS students to participate in this opportunity.
- Monday, March 6 We will have Justin Loncar on the campus to provide two shows. He is a Deaf comedian. He is known for the Some Deaf Guy where he has funny skits related to his experiences as a Deaf person. First show at 1pm will be for the students and staff then open to the public at 7pm.
- March 7 3 Student Ambassadors have appointments set to visit with Legislators before PWDAD and a group of about 10 high school students

#### **Outreach Department**

- Sarah Jameson and Traci Prince hosted Leadership Murray County in January. Participants toured the campus, met students, observed in classrooms, and attended a presentation in which they learned about services provided by OSD, both on campus and off campus.
- The LINKS to Literacy program is underway. With the grant money we received (\$12,000), we are serving 7 public school students in mostly rural areas who are without deaf ed support. We have 5 Deaf language models/mentors. The language models will meet with the students weekly through August. Post assessments will be done to document language growth.
- The statewide deaf ed conference will not be held on campus due to ongoing renovations on the campus but will be held at the Chickasaw Retreat Center in Sulphur June 5-8. Registration opened February 21st. There will be tracks for early developmental specialists/early intervention, educational interpreters, and teachers of the deaf.
- Outreach and FEELS are working together planning two family events: April 15th in the OKC area, and April 29th in Tulsa. These events, "Oklahoma Family Connection" will provide parents of deaf or hard of hearing children the opportunity to engage with other families, will provide a place for children to interact with other children with a hearing loss, and provide insight to successes of Deaf and hard of hearing adults.
- The state department of education has asked OSD to establish a teacher training institute for Oklahoma special education teachers who would like to work with students who are deaf or hard of hearing, and

potentially pursue deaf ed certification. A program overview and scope of work has been submitted to OSDE for review. If approved, the institute will start in July.

- Our 3 Educational Consultants are currently serving 321 students in 114 public school districts. They continue to host roundtable discussions over various topics for public school teachers monthly.
- The state department of education educational interpreter registry is updated monthly. The EIPA CEU program calendar year ended in December. Any interpreter who did not attain their CEUs (10 hours) were removed from the registry per OSDE instruction. Interpreters have the option of being reinstated by contacting the Outreach office, submitting a request in writing, and completing their CEUs. There were 7 interpreters removed from the registry.

- Spring is coming and students are ready for outdoor activities. We are working on putting new looks on the five basketball half-courts with

new nets. This is a way for our students to enjoy playing different games such as basketball, 4-square, hopscotch, etc since they could not play in the gym due to the damaged floor from December when the pipe broke during freezing.

#### 2. DRS Switchboard

As DRS switchboard operator, Customer Service Representative Brett Freeman is the voice of DRS. He is the first contact many people have with the agency. Brett also routes many calls to other state agencies, especially DHS Developmental Disabilities Services. During the COVID years, Brett never stopped answering the DRS phone Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. – 5 p.m. while other agencies stopped using live operators and never returned to providing that service.

#### 3. Client Success Stories

Administrative Assistant Cathy Martin tracks and posts success stories submitted by DRS staff to the Communications Team. Cathy researches each person's state senator and representative so that the Communications Team can deliver the success stories to lawmakers during PWDAD. Jody Harlan uses the database to research clients for media stories.

#### 4. Top 21 Legislative Leaders

In 2022, External Relations Coordinator Jen Hardin identified 21 key legislative leaders serving in the Oklahoma Senate and House. We sometimes compare the Top 21 list with client success stories and leads from other sources. In May 2022, Jody Harlan wrote a story about Audrey Church, a successful SBVI client from Okemah who is employed as education coordinator for Okmulgee and Okfuskee County Youth Services. Her senator Roger Thompson serves as chair of the Senate Joint Committee on Budget and Appropriations. He also owns the Okemah News Leader newspaper, which published Audrey's hometown success story.

#### 5. Commission Client Success Stories

In 2022, the Commission, assisted by Carol Brown, began selecting featured clients or students whose stories are presented at each Commission meeting. Communications Officer III Brett Jones researches and writes a story about each client and submits a photograph for the Commission packet.

#### 6. Western Oklahoma Workforce Development Board Newsletter

Western Oklahoma Workforce Development Board asked Brett Jones to research and write a quarterly article about DRS clients, services and programs for their quarterly newsletter. His work helps to strengthen DRS' partnership with our partner Oklahoma Works and private businesses community colleges, training providers, elected officials and other workforce program leaders.

#### 7. Social Media Scheduling and HootSuite

Communications Officer II Rachel McLemore schedules dozens of posts on DRS Facebook pages, Twitter, LinkedIn and Instagram every week. She uses a new social media scheduling platform called HootSuite to keep up with expanding demands for additional posts. Rachel writes many posts for DRS, but also rewrites or shares posts related to disability from outside DRS. She makes all the posts accessible, tracks social media comments and shares her own "Fiction Friday" book feature.

#### 8. govDelivery.com

Communications Manager Dana Tallon uses the email service govDelivery.com to reach out to the public and DRS staff who sign themselves up for topics such as: General Information, Meeting Notices, Press Releases, Transition newsletters, Career Opportunities and Oklahoma Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped. From March 2022 to February 2023, the number of a new subscribers grew by 157.42%. We had a 69.4% engagement rate for our emails, meaning recipients opened or clicked on links. We sent 95 emails to more than 114,000 recipients.

# OKLAHOMA SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND REPORT

#### OSB Commission Report April 10, 2023

Oklahoma School for the Blind has had a busy year. Each month brought a variety of events.

We held parent teacher conferences on October 11, January 10, and March 7.

National School Lunch week, October 10 – 14, was recognized and Muskogee Mayor Marlon Coleman ate lunch with our students on October 12.

October 12 was also the day that we recognized White Cane Day. Students went downtown to walk and demonstrate proper cane usage. Senior Rayce Phillips spoke to discuss the importance of this day.

Our FCCLA has sponsored two blood drives this year, October 17, and January 17. They have another one scheduled for April 18.

Our annual Fall Festival was held on October 25<sup>.</sup> This week also was Red Ribbon Week that promotes the dangers of drug use.

OSB middle and high school students attended the Sports Extravaganza in Texas October 28-30. The teams competed in goalball, archery, races, long jump and shotput.

November started off with our Spaghetti Dinner, silent auction, and dessert auction fundraiser. This was held on November 1 and along with the matching funds from the Masonic Lodge, we raised \$15,000.00.

The 10<sup>th</sup> Annual Oklahoma Regional Cane Quest was held on November 2. There were 36 cane users from across the state that competed. OSB students did an excellent job with many placing in the gold, silver, and bronze categories.

November 12 OSB held the 2022 Panther Pride 5K sponsored by our Student Council. Race day was a very cold one, but we still had 35 runners. Many of our staff participated and placed in the race. We also had one of our students place in his age division.

Mississippi School for the Blind traveled to our campus on November 11-13 for wrestling and cheerleading clinics. It was a fun weekend and enjoyed by all.

We had 53 of our students participate in World Stack Up Day. This event took place November 15-17 with people from all over the world participating. Each

person had to spend at least 30 minutes "cup stacking" to be counted towards the goal. With they help of our students a new world record was set of 737,863.

Through our ESSER afterschool grant we hosted our first "Weekend with the Experts" on our campus December 2-3. Our Outreach Department worked with five families to teach them techniques to assist their blind or visually impaired child. We held our second event in Oklahoma City on February 24-25 and have one other one scheduled in Lawton on April 21-22.

FCCLA students participated in STAR events. Two OSB members received first place in their division and advanced to regional competition. The girls represented OSB in the FCCLA Region STAR Events on February 8-9. The girls qualified to participate at the next level in the Children's Literature category. FCCLA leadership team also had the opportunity to attend the Get SET conference in Owasso in December. STAR stands for Students Taking Action for Recognition.

A special project was sponsored by our 7<sup>th</sup> grade Character Education class. They collected books and toys and delivered these to the Saint Francis Children's Hospital on December 13.

Homecoming was held on January 10 with Kaylie Minter being crowned 2022-23 Homecoming Queen. The ceremony was followed by wrestling matches between OSB and Hulbert High School. After all the events, the students attended a reception in the REC.

On January 26-29, wrestlers, cheerleaders, and band students traveled to Talladega, Alabama for SCASB. Our students all did an amazing job and we had two students, William Winston, and Katelynn Zampella place first in their divisions.

The 2023 Spelling Bee was held on January 24. This year we had 20 students from 1<sup>st</sup> – 8<sup>th</sup> grade. Two of our students will proceed to the Eastern Oklahoma State Spelling Bee on April 21.

Middle school students participated in the Math and Engineering Competition held in Muskogee on February 9. These students represented themselves and the school well.

The 21<sup>st</sup> Annual Oklahoma Regional Braille Challenge was held on our campus on March 1. We had 31 contestants compete. Students worked hard to prepare for the contest. Many of our student received gold, silver, or bronze medals. Muskogee Mayor Coleman came to present medals to our winners. On March 7<sup>th</sup>, students and staff were in OKC to meet with legislators and attend PWDAD.

March 22 was a busy day for students. Many of them attended Special Olympics that day. In the afternoon we had a mobile dairy visit, and the students had an opportunity to go outside and visit the dairy trailer.

Our Junior/Senior prom is March 29. The students will be treated to a delicious dinner and then a DJ will play for the remainder of the evening.

Upcoming events include: SCASB track in Austin, Texas April 19-23; Spring concert May 9; Graduation May 18.

Our afterschool program that we have in large part to the ESSER grant we received is going extremely well. In addition to tutoring students, we have many specialized clubs. Mr. Miller has a 3-D printing club. Mrs. Hargrove holds a beading club and Braille club. Ms. Leatherman and Mrs. Eckerson have the Mileage club, which helps students log how many miles they walk each week. They then receive tokens for those miles. The OSU HOP Program (High Obesity Program) has partnered with us on different events. In February they taught elementary students how to make healthy snacks out of waffles, fruit, and other toppings. In March students were treated to making homemade hummus.

#### **COMMISSION MEETING MINUTES**

Commission Vice-Chair Hilliard asked for a motion and vote to approve the February 13, 2023, Commission for Rehabilitation Services regular Meeting Minutes. Commission Assistant Brown stated there was a correction to these minutes, removal of unnecessary wording in last paragraph of Jody Harlan's Longevity information.

## PROPOSED CHANGES TO COSTS AT TRADE SCHOOLS

#### NEW RATES FOR PRIVATE TRADE, BARBER, & COSMETOLOGY SCHOOLS EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

On behalf of the VR and SBVI Divisions, we are requesting approval to increase the current rates for Private Trade, Barber, and Cosmetology schools by 10 percent. The current rates have been in place since May 8, 2000, and are as follows:

Private Trade Schools	\$6.50 per clock hour or \$104 per credit hour
Barber Schools	\$3688 for 1500 hours/\$2.46 per hour
Cosmetology Schools	\$3315 for 1500 hours/\$2.21 per hour

Tuition rates at public and private schools have increased over the past 23 years and raising the rates by 10 percent will close the gap a little bit for those clients who are attending a private school for training that may not be available at a public school and is feasible for the client. The proposed tuition rates will not exceed the public schools' tuition rates. If approved the new rates will be in effect July 1, 2023 for Fiscal Year 2024.

The DRS administrative rule in place for setting and approving rates for private school contracts is 612:10-7-161, which states that tuition at a privately owned vocational schools will be paid at the rates approved by the Oklahoma Commission for Rehabilitation Services sitting as the Rates and Standards Committee.

New proposed rates are as follows:

Private Trade Schools	\$7.15 per clock hour or \$114.40 per credit hour
Barber Schools	\$4056.80 for 1500 hours/\$2.70 per hour
Cosmetology Schools	\$3646.50 for 1500 hours/\$2.43 per hour

Financial Impact:

A 10 percent increase would impact the budget by approximately \$10,000 per year.

Authorization history shows that expenditures for private trade, barber, and cosmetology schools in FY 2022 was \$108,083. In FY 2023 there has only been \$66,785 authorized to date.

## PROPOSED CHANGES TO RATES FOR PRIVATE CONTRACTED VOCATIONAL EVALUATORS

#### **Executive Summary**

#### Request to increase Rates for Private Contracted Vocational Evaluators

On behalf of the VR and SBVI Divisions, we request approval to increase the current rates for contracted Vocational Evaluators.

The current rates for Contractor Vocational Evaluators to Administer Vocational Testing to our DRS clients, were established and approved by the DRS Commission and the State Purchasing Director in 2009. There has not been an increase in these Evaluator rates for 14 years.

We would like to increase the rate of the Contractor Vocational Evaluators from \$450.00 per evaluation to \$750.00 per evaluation. DRS has been supplying the testing materials for the Evaluators and will stop providing these materials and Contracted Vocational Evaluators will be responsible for the purchase of their own testing materials, with DRS input as to tests used during evaluations. This cost is approximately \$800.00 per year.

#### Total paid in 2022 = \$71,810.65

**Financial impact to the DRS Budget** = \$43,800 less cost of testing materials for the contractors to begin bearing, in the amount of \$800 for an impact of \$43,000.

In the Oklahoma Department of Rehabilitation Services, Internal Acquisition Procedures, it states:

6.8 FIXED RATE CONTRACTS. This contract method is utilized only when the services are provided directly to persons benefiting from the services and shall not be used for consultants or to purchase items.

6.8.1 Fixed Rate Hearing Process. The Central Departmental Services reviews and determines if a rate should be presented to the DRS Commission for consideration and/or approval. Upon a decision to present the issue to the DRS Commission for approval, a notice of hearing is published at least 30 days prior to the meeting. An agenda item is included for discussion of the proposed fixed rate at least 30 days prior to the meeting where approval/disapproval is voted upon by the Commission. A service qualification is also presented to the State Purchasing Director at least 30 days prior to the hearing date. All documents supporting the fixed rate are submitted to the State Purchasing Director at this time, and the State Purchasing Director may submit written comments prior to the hearing or oral comments at the hearing. The State Purchasing Director shall advise DRS if he/she determines the fixed rate proposed is excessive. If the State Purchasing Director provides written comments and is absent from the hearing, the comments shall be presented orally during the hearing. The State Purchasing Director comments, whether written or oral, shall be included in the hearing minutes.

6.8.2 Fixed Rate Approval. Upon approval of the rate by the DRS Commission, the State Purchasing Director is notified in writing and the rate is considered approved.

DRS has an exemption from the Central Purchasing Act for client services, and we are not required to have these rates approved by the State Purchasing Director. DRS will only need to request approval from the DRS Commission to set new rates.

There will be identified rates for each type of evaluation that the Commission would approve, along with future increases as the market bears. Eliminating the process for requesting approval by the State Purchasing Director will be more effective and efficient.

Until new rates are established and approved by the DRS Commission, we will continue to pay the current rates. The current rates are as follows:

- Vocational Evaluation
   \$450.00 plus testing materials
- Self-Employment Evaluation \$450.00 plus testing materials

Upon the DRS Commission's approval, the new rate will be in effect July 1, 2023, for Fiscal Year 2024.
