in gymnastics. Meekah loves dogs and Marleigh loves cats. They have three fur-siblings altogether; two dogs and one cat.


Their brother, Amon, seven years old, loves

- 2 cans crescent rolls
- I lb. hamburger meat
- I pkg taco seasoning
- 2 cans tomato sauce
- I medium onion, chopped
- 2 cans pinto beans, drained
- Shredded cheese
- Sour cream
- Lettuce
- Tomatoes, chopped
- Salsa

Preheat oven to 350°

Press crescent rolls in bottom and up sides of a 9 x 13 glass baking dish. Cook hamburger meat and onions, drain. Add taco seasoning, tomato sauce, beans, and simmer for 6—10 minutes. Pour over crescent roll crust. Top with shredded cheese. Bake for 20 -25 minutes. Serve with sour cream, lettuce, tomato,

Preheat oven to 350°. Mix and set aside 1/2 cup of sugar and cinnamon for the top. Mix softened cream cheese, vanilla, I cup of sugar, set aside. You can microwave the filling to make it softer and easier to put into the dish. Lightly spray the bottom of a 9 x 13 pan with cooking spray. Roll out one can of the crescent rolls and place in bottom of pan. Pour filling on top of this layer. Roll out the other can of crescent rolls and place on top of the filling. Melt the stick of butter and pour over the top of all. Sprinkle on the cinnamon and sugar mixture. Bake at 350 for 23—30 minutes. Can be served warm or at room temperature.

Miami, Oklahoma

- Outfitted with a 1960's-style neon sign and housed in a building that looks like a giant ku-ku clock, visitors have been attracted to <u>Waylan's Ku-Ku Burger</u> for decades.
- After enjoying your Ku-Ku Burger stop in at the Coleman Theatre in Miami. Built at the end of the roaring 1920's, the Coleman Theatre defines the era. The theatre hosts concerts, plays and even silent films. Designed in Spanish Mission Revival style, the beautiful building invites visitors to step inside and be transported back in time.

66 Darryl Starbird's National Rod & Custom Car Hall of Fame/Museum in Afton

It wouldn't be right to travel down Route 66 without a stop in Afton to see Darryl Starbird's National Rod & Custom Car Hall of Fame, which houses some of the most inventive cars on display along the Mother Road. There are over 50 vehicles on display as well as plenty of auto memorabilia.

Cherokee Trading Post & Boot Outlet - Clinton



Behind the Scenes...FSU

Summary-based crime reporting captures statistical data and is limited in the offenses that are captured. With

the development of the State Incident-Based Reporting System (SIBRS), the OSBI became certified to report into the National Incident -Based Reporting System (NIBRS) in 2009. That marked the beginning of the effort to transition local Oklahoma law enforcement agencies to incident-based reporting. The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and the state of Oklahoma have now set a deadline of lanuary 2021, after which they will no longer accept summary-based reportLaw enforcement agencies across Oklahoma (state, county, city, and town) are required by law to report to this system. The Field Services Unit (FSU) of the OSBI works with these agencies statewide to meet the transition deadline and reaps the benefits of planning and im-

plementing SIBRS. To that end, FSU employees train agencies in the collection of crime statistics,



ports, and provide ongoing program support. Since 2004, when the unit began transitioning agencies from summary reporting to SIBRS, 88% of all reporting agen-

<u>cies</u> have now made this transition.

SIBRS provides much more information than previous reporting and will benefit social services, law enforcement agencies and many other programs that rely on this information for grants, resource allocation, and planning to make Oklahoma a

safer place to live. Crime statistics are compiled annually and published as *Crime in Oklahoma*. In addition, they are forwarded to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for inclusion in the *Crime*

in the United States publication. The criminal

justice community, educators, and others use these statistics in determining crime trends, solutions, and planning for the future.


