Connect Communities

Create strong connections among families, schools, tribal nations, and the greater community that are compassionate, culturally sensitive, and designed to meet the needs of the whole child in support of lifelong learning. Meaningful connections reflect diversity within the community. Follow the continuous improvement journey to begin your work.

CONTINUOUS IMPROVEMENT JOURNEY

Family engagement is not a program, activity, or event. The Oklahoma Family Engagement Framework establishes it as a shared responsibility among families, schools, and communities to build relationships that support a child's learning and growth from birth through college and career. With this pathway identified as a priority through your planning process, your next step will be to guide your team through the Do and Review steps.

Pathway in Action

In School, Family, and Community Partnerships: Your Handbook for Action, specific stories about "Collaborating With the Community" show ways to connect with the community from pen pal and mentoring programs to field trips at nature centers. Each story focuses on both sides of the story - the benefit to the families and students **and** the benefit to the community partner. An annual collection of good ideas is published as "Promising Partnership Practices" at www.partnershipschools.org in the section Success Stories. These stories can give you ideas on ways to build your own partnership stories. "Characteristics of successful partnership programs are based on incremental progress. Including more family and community partnerships each year in ways that benefit more students takes time to develop. Schools and districts have shown that some progress can be made immediately, but it tends to take at least three years to demonstrate that a partnership program is a "permanent" component of school and district organization" (Epstein et al., 2009).
