Advanced Placement Score Overview

- AP exams are scored on a scale from 1-5.
- AP scores are correlated to letter grades in the corresponding introductory college course.
- The College Board and the American Council on Education (ACE) recommend granting credit/placement for scores of 3 and higher, which correlate to letter grades of C or better.
- Most colleges recognize transfer credit with scores of 3 or better.

Reporting Requirements

The State Department of Education shall report the following annually (70 O.S. §1210.701):

- The number of students taking an Advanced Placement exam and the number of exams taken;
- The number of exams that receive a score of three or better;
- The number of school sites offering Advanced Placement courses and the number of school sites with students taking an Advanced Placement exam;
- The number of school sites which have received funding and the amount of awards, by type of award;
- The number of students who receive assistance with the test fee and the average amount of assistance; and
- An evaluation of the cost versus the benefits of this program.



\$29 fee reduction per test from OSDE: Students who did not qualify as low income 2 or more AP exams in one year




Student cost \$70 per exam

- Beginning with the 2024-2025 school year, all public high schools in the state shall make a minimum of four Advanced Placement courses available to students. (70 O.S. § 1210.704)
- A list of Advanced Placement courses offered can be found on the OSDE Advanced Placement website.





- Public and private high school students earned 17,026 qualifying AP scores of 3, 4, or 5 in 2023.
- These scores translate into an estimated 51,078 potential college credits.
- At a cost of \$313 per college credit, the potential tuition and fee savings to Oklahoma students and families is \$15,987,414.
