### **April Gross Receipts to Treasury**


April, there is a 7.1% drop in collections.

#### Other indicators

The U.S. jobless rate remained low at 3.5% in March, down by 0.1 of a percentage point from the prior month, which is counter to the Federal Reserve's goal of slowing inflation. Oklahoma's unemployment rate was unchanged from February through March staying at 3.0%.

As measured by the Consumer Price Index, the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reports the annual inflation rate

ended March at 5.0%. The food index continued to remain high at 8.5% over the last year, but the energy component of the index decreased by 6.4%.



Regional economic trends indicate some economic expansion. For April, the Creighton University Mid-America Business Conditions Index for the nine-state region increased to 54.8 from 50.8 the previous month.

The Oklahoma component of the index fell slightly in April from 55.3, but remained above growth neutral at 54.5.

### **April collections**

April 2023 collections compared to gross receipts from April 2022 show:

- Total monthly gross collections are \$1.9 billion, down by \$144.7 million, or 7.1%.
- Gross income tax collections a combination of individual and corporate income taxes, generated \$964.3 million, a decrease of \$133.2 million, or 12.1%.
  - » Individual income tax collections total \$745.7 million, a reduction of \$96.0 million, or 11.4%.

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- » Corporate collections are \$218.6 million, down by \$37.3 million, or 14.6%.
- Combined sales and use tax collections, including remittances on behalf of cities and counties, total \$612.5 million – up by \$27.9 million – or 4.8%.
  - Sales tax collections are \$515.1 million, an increase of \$22.0 million, or 4.5%.
  - » Use tax receipts, collected on out-of-state purchases including internet sales, generated \$97.4 million, an increase of \$5.8 million, or 6.4%.
- Gross production taxes on oil and natural gas total \$87.4 million, a decrease of \$44.7 million, or
   33.8%
- Motor vehicle taxes produced \$68.1 million, down by \$3.9 million, or 5.4%.


 Other collections composed of some 60 different sources produced \$167.0 million, an increase of \$9.2 million, or 5.8%.



### Twelve-month collections

Combined gross receipts for the past 12 months compared to the prior year show:


- Gross revenue totals \$17.49 billion. That is \$1.07 billion, or 6.5 percent, above collections from the previous 12 months.
- Gross income taxes generated \$6.0 billion, a decrease of \$22.3 million, or 0.4%.
  - » Individual income tax collections total \$5.0 billion, up by \$43.2 million, or 0.9%.
  - » Corporate collections are \$972.0 million, down by \$65.5 million, or 6.3%.



- of \$503.1 million, or 7.7%.
- Gross sales tax receipts total \$5.9 billion, up by \$391.3 million, or 7.1%.

- We tax collections generated \$1.1 billion, an increase of \$111.8 million, or 11.5%.
- Oil and gas gross production tax collections are \$1.98 billion, up by \$612.3 million, or 44.9%.
- Motor vehicle collections total \$876.1 million, a decrease of \$1.9 million, or 0.2%.
- Other sources generated \$1.7 billion, down by \$17.8 million, or 1.1%.

Twelve-month collections comparing March to April Combined gross receipts for the past 12 months in April compared to March show:



Total gross revenue of \$17.49 billion is \$144.7 million, or 0.8%, below collections from the previous 12 months ending in March.

### **About Gross Receipts to the Treasury**

The monthly Gross Receipts to the Treasury report, developed by the State Treasurer's Office, provides a timely and broad view of the state's economy.

It is released in conjunction with the General Revenue Fund report from the Office of Management and Enterprise Services, which provides information to state agencies for budgetary planning purposes.

The General Revenue Fund, the state's main operating account, receives less than half of the state's gross receipts with the remainder apportioned to other state funds, remitted to cities and counties, and paid in rebates and refunds.
