The Current Veterans Commission Believes


- Veterans can, and should, be viewed as assets whose skills and talents must be engaged here at home.

An Overview of Today's Veteran Population


THE SHRINKING VETERAN POPULATION (WORLD WAR I - PRESENT)



% of U.S. Adults in each group who have a great deal/fair amount of confience that ______ will act in the best interest of the public.




What is Civic Health?


Post 9/11 Veteran Voting

Chart 2. Voting in the 2020 Presidential Election by Veterans and Non-Veterans Under the Age of 50




Post 9/11 Veteran Volunteering
