PURPOSE: The United States Department of Health and Human Services has released updated poverty guidelines. The following table incorporates the updated figures that may be used to calculate income levels to determine eligibility for participation in various state and federally funded programs and to prioritize services.

MESSAGE:

The poverty guidelines are a simplified version of the poverty thresholds that the Census Bureau uses to prepare its estimates of the number of individuals and families in poverty.

The LLSIL is used for several purposes under the WIOA. Specifically, WIOA Section 3(36) defines the term "low-income individual" for eligibility purposes, and Sections 127(b)(2)(C) and 132(b)(1)(B)(IV) define the terms "disadvantaged youth" and "disadvantaged adult" in terms of the poverty line or LLSIL for State formula allotments.

The Governor and state and local workforce development boards (LWDBs) use the LLSIL for determining eligibility for WIOA youth and for determining low-income status for the statutory priority for adult funds.

The 100% LLSIL is used to determine self-sufficiency as noted at Section 3 (36)(A)(ii) and Section 3 (36)(B) of WIOA.

METROPOLITAN STATISTICAL ANALYSIS COUNTIES INCLUDED: Canadian, Comanche, Cleveland, Cotton, Creek, Garfield, Grady, Lincoln, Logan, McClain, Oklahoma, Okmulgee, Osage, Pawnee, Rogers, Sequoyah, Tulsa, and Wagoner.

These poverty guidelines are effective May 28, 2024.
